

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Message from Hon'ble State Election Commissioner

The 73rd and 74th amendments to the Constitution of India in 1992 paved way for creation of the third tier of Governance in the Indian polity, which in turn has deepened the roots of Indian democracy by way of providing a working framework for Panchayati Raj institutions and Urban Local Bodies. Consequent to these amendments, State Election Commissions were set up in States/UTs for ensuring free, fair and transparent elections to the Panchayats and municipalities.

The State Election Commission, Delhi came into existence in October 1993 and is entrusted with the constitutional responsibility for ensuring free, fair and transparent elections to the urban local bodies in NCT of Delhi and UT of Chandigarh. Over the years the State Election Commission has strived to achieve the said constitutional mandate bestowed upon it by the Constitution of India under Article 243ZA.

There is no doubt that the local level democracy is the basic foundation on which the entire edifice of the democracy rests and therefore the elections to these Local Self Government Institutions assume greater significance.

The elections to the erstwhile three Municipal Corporations i.e. North Delhi Municipal Corporation, South Delhi Municipal Corporation and East Delhi Municipal Corporations could not be held in April, 2022 due to then proposed unification of the said three corporations into a single Municipal Corporation of Delhi. Thereupon, after enactment of DMC (Amendment) Act, 2022 on 18.04.2022, a single unified Municipal Corporation of Delhi came into being with a provision to have a maximum of 250 wards.

The change in number of MCD wards necessitated fresh Delimitation of wards for which the Central Government constituted a threemember Delimitation Committee to assist Central Government in carrying out Delimitation of MCD wards. The 250 wards were determined by the Central Government vide Notification No.14011/04/2022-Delhi-II dated 10.09.2022.

The Delimitation Committee after series of discussions/meetings with various stakeholders finalized the draft Delimitation Order which was issued by the Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India on 12.09.2022 and objections/ suggestions were invited on the same from general public and other stakeholders. After consideration of all suggestions / objections so received the Final Delimitation order was issued on 17.10.2022 by Ministry of Home Affairs, which further paved way for conducting elections to the newly constituted unified Municipal Corporation of Delhi consisting of 250 wards.

The Powers relating to Reservation of Wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi as prescribed in Section 3 and 5 of the DMC Act, 1957 have been delegated to the State Election Commissioner by Central Government vide F.No.14011/04/2022-Delhi-II dated 17.10.2022. Accordingly, the reservation order dated 20.10.2022 was issued by the Commission reserving 42 seats for persons of Scheduled Castes including 21 seats for Women of Scheduled Castes and of the remaining 208 seats, 104 seats were reserved for Women.

Since the elections were already overdue, the Commission worked on a war footing basis for preparing itself to conduct elections without any further delay to fulfill its constitutional mandate. In furtherance of this objective, the Commission held a press conference on 04.11.2022 and announced a schedule for holding Municipal Elections with date of poll as 04.12.2022 for 14673847 Voters and counting of votes on 07.12.2022.

The MCD Elections-2022 were driven by use of extensive Information Technology which not only expedited the process but also ruled out manual errors and thus bringing greater efficiency, efficacy and integrity in electoral process. Unique mobile apps for election officers and voters were launched and web version of these apps were also made available on the web portal of the Commission. Special customized election software was got developed by the Commission and all-important election processes and actions were undertaken by the election functionaries through the app and the election software which enabled seamless flow of real-time information between various stakeholders thereby facilitating better co-ordination & control by the Commission.

The electoral management involved huge mobilization of more than 2,00,000 election officials and security personnel. The logistic management involved movement and deployment of Polling Parties/ EVMs/Election material and setting up of Polling stations, strong room/counting centre. The Commission had made elaborate arrangements for ensuring a safe, secure and pleasant voting experience.

Several novel measures such as use of integrated electoral rolls, two -stage randomization of polling parties and EVMs, launch of mobile app for generation of voter slips and to obtain all voter information, facilitating ease of voting by Persons with Disability/Voter of age 80 years and above etc were undertaken by the Commission. Special emphasis was laid down on enforcing adherence to the Model Code of Conduct by the political parties and the candidates. In this endeavour for the first time ever in Municipal elections, Flying Squads, Static Surveillance teams, Video Surveillance teams were deployed by the Commission. Elaborate arrangements for security were made by the Commission in close co-ordination with Delhi Police and Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India. The Commission also arranged for installation of web casting facility at all the 3360 sensitive polling stations and deployment of drones for aerial

surveillance. In view of simultaneous election process going in State of Gujarat and Himachal Pradesh, the Commission had effected ban on exit poll and opinion poll till the polling was over in Gujarat.

At this moment of release of this Election Report on MCD elections-2022, I wish to express my heartfelt gratitude to the Union Home Secretary, the Chief Secretary, Delhi, the Commissioner of Police, Delhi, Additional Secretary (UT) and Joint Secretary (UT) Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India, Commissioner, MCD for facilitating quick deployment of adequate number of poll officials and security officials for smooth conduct of MCD elections. I also wish to thank all District Election Officers, General, Special & Expenditure Observers, Returning Officers, Asstt. Returning Officers, Officers & staff of the Commission and each and every other election officer / official who has worked tirelessly and meticulously for successful culmination of this mammoth exercise.


I also wish to convey my sincere thanks to both the Members of the Delimitation Committee, Member Secretary, Consultant (Delimitation) Consultant (Legal), Geo Spatial Delhi Ltd., Directorate of Census Operations Delhi and IT Cell (SEC) for assisting the Central Government in successfully carrying out the gigantic task of Delimitation of MCD Wards in a historically record minimal time despite innumerable complexities.

This election report published in three volumes is meant to be a record for institutional memory and I sincerely hope that it will be useful in disseminating information to the administrators and the general public at large by providing key insights to the electoral planning and would serve as a guiding source for future elections.

CHAPTER-1

Local Self-Government Institutions in Delhi - A Historical Perspective



Local Self-Government Institutions in Delhi -A Historical Perspective

A NOTE ON THE ORIGIN OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF DELHI (CREATED UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION ACT, 1957 - Narrative by Sh. O.P. Arora (Consultant Legal)

After independence of the country on 15th August, 1947, there were multiple civic agencies functioning in Delhi for specified jobs of sanitary, dealing with properties, taxes and other local administration. DELHI MUNICIPAL COMMITTEE within the urban limits viz. walled city areas and adjoining areas was functioning. There were other NOTIFIED AREA COMMITTEES like NAC Civil Lines, NAC Narela, NAC Mehrauli, NAC Najafgarh and NAC Shahdara in their respective areas but no elections were held in these NACs. For Delhi Municipal Committee comprised of property wards No.1 to 11 within city walls, Ward No.12 - Kamla Nagar, Sabzimandi, Shakti Nagar, Roop Nagar, University area, Malkaganj etc. Ward No.13 - Deputy Ganj, Ward No.14 Pahari Dhiraj-Sadar Bazar, Bara Hindu Rao, Ward 15 - Ram Nagar, Paharganj, Chitra Gupta, Multani Dhanda etc. Ward 16 entire Karol Bagh, Beadonpura, Faiz Road, Adjmal Khan Road, Western Extension Area, Dev Nagar, Rehgarpuras, Sarai Rohilla, Rohtak Road and Ward 17- entire Anand Parbat area.

Periodical elections to Delhi Municipal Committee wards were being held even in British Regime and after Independence, elections to this body were held in 1951 and 1954. The term of the Committee was three years. The body elected in 1954 completed its term in 1957. The Parliament had passed THE DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION ACT, 1957 and the Corporation was formed in 1958 after holding elections to wards. The limits of the Corporation was upto urban limits and the rural areas around the Corporation upto the borders i.e. villages were being looked after by the DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT OF GOVT. OF DELHI. Panchayats were being functioning in rural areas for which elections were regularly held by the Development Department. Due to mal-functioning, the gram panchayats were superseded in 1987-88. The Commissioner, Municipal Corporation of Delhi, was holding elections to MCD prior to

1977. The relevant law was amended to declare the Chief Electoral Officer, Govt. of Delhi, as exofficio "Director of Municipal Elections, Delhi" for arranging and holding periodical election to the said body. As such, first general election to this body was conducted on 12.6.1977 alongwith general election to the Metropolitan Council of Delhi (There was no Assembly in Delhi at that time). Next election to DMC was due and conducted on 5.2.1983. No election took place thereafter perhaps in view of the proposals for 73rd amendments in the Constitution.

The Central Government took it seriously that panchayat and local bodies in the entire country were not functioning in orderly manner and elections were also not being held timely, and institutional framework was created for the third tier of the government by way of 73rd and 74th Amendment Acts in the Constitution, providing better regime, powers to the local bodies and gram panchayats and most particularly, the terms of these bodies was prescribed as '5 years' and that next election to these bodies should be held before expiry of the present term of 5 years to ensure that these bodies functions throughout. A three-tier system of panchayat raj was introduced i.e. Gram Panchayats (for election of Surpanch and Panches) at village level, Panchayat Samiti at Block level and Zila Parishad at District level which is now functioning successfully.

The areas of Delhi Municipal Corporation were extended to borders on all sides including urban and rural areas both except for areas falling under New Delhi Municipal Council and the Delhi Cantonment Board. As such, there is no panchayat system in NCT of Delhi.

Consequent to the 74th Amendment Act 1993 of the Constitution, a State Election Commission headed by a State Election Commissioner was constituted in every State and UT. The State Election Commission in Delhi was constituted on 6th October, 1993 with the appointment of 1st State Election Commissioner, Sh. S.D. Lakhar, IFAS (Retd) with terms of service for 3 years, as the DMC Act, 1957 provided for appointment of SEC after retirement. In the service rules of the SEC in 1993, it was also provided that if a serving officer is posted as SEC he will be deemed to have retired from his present service. Initially, every SEC was appointed for 3 years which terms were extended to 6 years in 2011. As per provisions of section 7 of the DMC Act, 1957 if the SEC has to be removed from office before expiry of his present term, the course of action has to be adopted as is applicable to the Judge of the High Court of Delhi (i.e. by impeachment in Parliament in case of Delhi as no complete Statehood has been provided to Delhi (and the State Assembly). Recently, the other service conditions applicable to the Judge of the High Court of Delhi have also been adopted as applicable to the SEC.

There had been 134 wards in the Delhi Municipal Corporation in 1993 which were delimited on the basis of Census 1991 within a record time of 2 months and final Delimitation Order issued on 30.12.1993 by the Hon'ble L.G., Delhi as the powers to delimit wards were vested in the Central Government and later on the powers were delegated to the L.G., Delhi. The DMC Act was amended in 2007 increasing the number of wards from 134 to 272. And by further amendment in 2011 three Corporations for Delhi Viz North Delhi with 104 wards, South Delhi with 104 wards and East Delhi with 64 wards were created.

The DMC Act, 1957 was also amended to incorporate changes made by 73rd amendments in the Constitution. The term of the Corporation was now 5 years from the date of its first meeting and next election to the body should be held before expiry of the present term of the House. The Constitution and later amendments in the DMC Act, 1957, provided for reservation of wards of the Corporation for 4 specified categories of persons viz. scheduled castes, scheduled castes women, only women and the general category. It was also provided that wards should be delimited on the basis of latest Census and population of each ward should be equal as far as practicable. For the purpose, the entire population of DMC should be divided by number of wards and average population found out. The

number of seats for scheduled castes category of persons was to be based on total population of DMC divided by total population of scheduled castes persons. The percentage of SC population shall be the guiding factor for arriving at total SC wards i.e. the total wards should be divided by the percentage of SC population and exact number of SC wards found out. It is also provided that out of SC wards not less than 50% should be reserved for the SC women and in the remaining wards not less than 50% be reserved for Women and remaining are kept as General. The Commission notified the order for reservation of wards for specified category of persons in March, 1994 but the order was challenged in the High Court. The Hon'ble High Court after long arguments, dismissed the petitions and accepted the order framed by the Commission. Thereafter, all preparations for the first general election commenced. Under the Act and Rules, the Commission has the powers to prepare its own electoral rolls or to adopt the electoral rolls of Assembly constituencies as were in force for the time being for elections to the DMC. With these efforts, the Commission could hold its first general election to the DMC on 24.2.1997. Thereafter, all elections were being held periodically and before expiry of the term of the House at each occasion. Mostly, the elections were held in March/April after every 5 years.

The last election to the three Corporations was held on 23.4.2017 and as such next election became due on expiry of the present term on 22.5.2022. The Central Government had been watching the functioning of the three Corporations but was not satisfied largely on the account of non-earning on the part of North and East Delhi M.Cs and also for mal-functioning. The Central Government brought amendments in the DMC Act unifying the three Corporations as single Corporation. The total number of wards also reduced from 272 to 250 which necessitated delimitation of wards. Fresh Census for 2021 did not take place as yet and therefore, census data for 2011 census was adopted. Delimitation exercise was undertaken by the Central Government and final order notified on 17.10.2022. Immediately thereafter, the Reservation of Wards order was also framed and issued by the SEC under powers delegated to him by the Central Government, on 20.10.2022. All preparations for the next elections to the unified single Corporation were taken up in hand by the SEC, electoral rolls of

ECI with r/o NCT of Delhi in force for the time being, were adopted and general election conducted on 4.12.2022. The results were declared and notified on 8.12.2022. There has been no untoward incident and elections held fairly and peacefully.


It may be pertinent to note that this Commission is also bestowed with the responsibility of holding municipal elections to UT Chandigarh.

The Commission had conducted general election to the Municipal Corporation of UT Chandigarh in December, 1996 and thereafter on expiry of the terms of the House at each occasion i.e. after every 5 years.

As per 73rd amendment in the Constitution, the existing panchayats were not dissolved but given full life and next election would be held only on expiry of the present term of each House i.e. Gram Panchayats at village level, panchayat samiti at block level and zila parishad at District level. There is only

one District in Chandigarh UT. As such, the first panchayat elections were held in 1999. Thereafter, elections to three different bodies of panchayats were being held on expiry of each House as the expiry dates of each House has been different. Due to rapid urbanization in Chandigarh, the panchayat system in Chandigarh was abolished in 2018 and rural areas merged in the Corporation resulting increase in number of wards from 26 to 35. The first election to MC Chandigarh with increased wards was conducted by this Commission in December, 2021.

The office of the State Election Commission of Chandigarh is functioning in the building of Municipal Corporation of Chandigarh on complete first floor of right wing. At the time of an election, the Hon'ble SEC and senior staff stay at Chandigarh for the conduct of election. However, some subordinate staff is there to look after day to day work.

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

CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS

2.1 Article 239AA. Special provisions with respect to Delhi.

- As from the date of commencement of the Constitution (Sixty-ninth Amendment) Act, 1991, the Union territory of Delhi shall be called the National Capital Territory of Delhi (hereafter in this Part referred to as the National Capital Territory) and the administrator thereof appointed under article 239 shall be designated as the Lieutenant Governor.
- a) There shall be a Legislative Assembly for the National Capital Territory and the seats in such Assembly shall be filled by members chosen by direct election from territorial constituencies in the National Capital Territory.

b) The total number of seats in the Legislative Assembly, the number of seats reserved for Scheduled Castes, the division of the National Capital Territory into territorial constituencies (including the basis for such division) and all other matters relating to the functioning of the Legislative Assembly shall be regulated by law made by Parliament.

c) The provisions of articles 324 to 327 and 329 shall apply in relation to the National Capital Territory, the Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory and the members thereof as they apply, in relation to a State, the Legislative Assembly of a State and the members thereof respectively; and any reference in articles 326 and 329 to "appropriate Legislature" shall be deemed to be a reference to Parliament.

3) a) Subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the Legislative Assembly shall have power to make laws for the whole or any part of the National Capital Territory with respect to any of the matters enumerated in the State List or in the Concurrent List in so far as any such matter is applicable to Union territories except matters with respect to Entries 1, 2 and 18 of the State List and Entries 64, 65 and 66 of that List in so far as they relate to the said Entries 1, 2 and 18. **b)** Nothing in sub-clause (a) shall derogate from the powers of Parliament under this Constitution to make laws with respect to any matter for a Union territory or any part thereof.

c) If any provision of a law made by the Legislative Assembly with respect to any matter is repugnant to any provision of a law made by Parliament with respect to that matter, whether passed before or after the law made by the Legislative Assembly, or of an earlier law, other than a law made by the Legislative Assembly, then, in either case, the law made by Parliament, or, as the case may be, such earlier law, shall prevail and the law made by the Legislative Assembly shall, to the extent of the repugnancy, be void:

Provided that if any such law made by the Legislative Assembly has been reserved for the consideration of the President and has received his assent, such law shall prevail in the National Capital Territory:

Provided further that nothing in this sub-clause shall prevent Parliament from enacting at any time any law with respect to the same matter including a law adding to, amending, varying or repealing the law so made by the Legislative Assembly.

4) There shall be a Council of Ministers consisting of not more than ten per cent. of the total number of members in the Legislative Assembly, with the Chief Minister at the head to aid and advise the Lieutenant Governor in the exercise of his functions in relation to matters with respect to which the Legislative Assembly has power to make laws, except in so far as he is, by or under any law, required to act in his discretion:

Provided that in the case of difference of opinion between the Lieutenant Governor and

his Ministers on any matter, the Lieutenant Governor shall refer it to the President for decision and act according to the decision given thereon by the President and pending such decision it shall be competent for the Lieutenant Governor in any case where the matter, in his opinion, is so urgent that it is necessary for him to take immediate action, to take such action or to give such direction in the matter as he deems necessary.

- 5) The Chief Minister shall be appointed by the President and other Ministers shall be appointed by the President on the advice of the Chief Minister and the Ministers shall hold office during the pleasure of the President.
- 6) The Council of Ministers shall be collectively responsible to the Legislative Assembly.
- a) Parliament may, by law, make provisions for giving effect to, or supplementing the provisions contained in the foregoing clauses and for all matters incidental or consequential thereto.

b) Any such law as is referred to in sub-clause (a) shall not be deemed to be an amendment of this Constitution for the purposes of article 368 notwithstanding that it contains any provision which amends or has the effect of amending, this Constitution.

8) The provisions of article 239B shall, so far as may be, apply in relation to the National Capital Territory, the Lieutenant Governor and the Legislative Assembly, as they apply in relation to the Union territory of Puducherry, the administrator and its Legislature, respectively; and any reference in that article to "clause (1) of article 239A" shall be deemed to be a reference to this article or article 239AB, as the case may be.

2.2 Article 239AB. Provision in case of failure of constitutional machinery.

If the President, on receipt of a report from the Lieutenant Governor or otherwise, is satisfied-

- a) that a situation has arisen in which the administration of the National Capital Territory cannot be carried on in accordance with the provisions of article 239AA or of any law made in pursuance of that article; or
- b) that for the proper administration of the National Capital Territory it is necessary or expedient so to do, the President may by order suspend the operation of any provision of article 239AA or

of all or any of the provisions of any law made in pursuance of that article for such period and subject to such conditions as may be specified in such law and make such incidental and consequential provisions as may appear to him to be necessary or expedient for administering the National Capital Territory in accordance with the provisions of article 239 and article 239AA.

2.3 Article 243K. Elections to the Panchayats

The superintendence, direction and control of the preparation of electoral rolls for, and the conduct of, all elections to the Panchayats shall be vested in a State Election Commission consisting of a State Election Commissioner to be appointed by the Governor

- 2) Subject to the provisions of any law made by the Legislature of a State the conditions of service and tenure of office of the State Election Commissioner shall be such as the Governor may by rule determine: Provided that the State Election Commissioner shall not be removed from his office except in like manner and on the like ground as a Judge of a High Court and the conditions of service of the State Election Commissioner shall not be varied to his disadvantage after his appointment
- 3) The Governor of a State shall, when so requested by the State Election Commission, make available to the State Election Commission such staff as may be necessary for the discharge of the functions conferred on the State Election Commission by clause (1)
- Subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the Legislature of a State may, by law, make provision with respect to all matters relating to, or in connection with, elections to the Panchayats.

2.4 Article 243L Application to Union Territories

The provisions of this Part shall apply to the Union territories and shall, in their application to a Union territory, have effect as if the references to the Governor of a State were references to the Administrator of the Union territory appointed under article 239 and references to the Legislature or the Legislative Assembly of a State were references, in relation to a Union territory having a Legislative Assembly, to that Legislative Assembly: Provided that the President may, by public notification, direct that the provisions of this Part shall apply to any Union territory or part thereof subject to such exceptions and modifications as he may specify in the notification.

2.5 Article 243ZA Elections To The Municipalities

- 1) The superintendence, direction and control of the preparation of electoral rolls for, and the conduct of, all elections to the Municipalities shall be vested in the State Election Commission referred to in article 243K.
- 2) Subject to the provisions of this Constitution, the Legislature of a State may, by law, make provision with respect to all matters relating to, or in connection with, elections to the Municipalities.

2.6 Article 243ZB. Application To The Union territories

The provisions of this Part shall apply to the Union territories and shall, in their application to a Union territory, have effect as if the references to the Governor of a State were references to the Administrator of the Union territory appointed under article 239 and references to the Legislature or the Legislative Assembly of a State were references in relation to a Union territory having a Legislative Assembly, to that Legislative Assembly:

Provided that the President may, by public notification, direct that the provisions of this Part shall apply to any Union territory or part thereof subject to such exceptions and modifications as he may specify in the notification.

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

THE DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION ACT, 1957

ACT NO. 66 OF 1957

An Act to consolidate and amend the law relating to the Municipal Government of Delhi. BE it enacted by Parliament in the Eighth Year of the Republic of India as follows:—

CHAPTER I

PRELIMINARY

1. Short title, extent and commencement

- 1) This Act may be called the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957.
- 2) Except as otherwise provided in this Act, it extends only to Delhi.
- The provisions of this Act, except this section which shall come into force at once, shall come into force on such date, as the Central Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoints:

Provided that different dates may be appointed for different provisions of this Act and any reference in any such provision to the commencement of this Act shall be construed as a reference to the coming into force of that provision.

2. Definitions

In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,-

- "Administrator" means the Lieutenant Governor of the National Capital Territory of Delhi;]
- "annual value" means the annual value of any vacant land or covered space of any building determined under section116E;
- 1B) "Appellate Tribunal" means an Appellate Tribunal constituted under section 347A;
- "budget-grant" means the total sum entered on the expenditure side of a budget estimate under a major head and adopted by the Corporation]] and includes any sum by which such budgetgrant may be increased or reduced by transfer from or to other heads in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the regulations made thereunder;
- "building" means a house, out-house, stable, latrine, urinal, shed, hut, wall (other than a boundary wall) or any other structure, whether of masonry, bricks, wood, mud, metal or other

material but does not include any portable shelter;

- "bye-law" means a bye-law made under this Act, by notification in the Official Gazette;
- 5) "casual vacancy" means a vacancy occurring otherwise than by efflux of time in the office of a councillor an alderman or in any other elective office;

"Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Corporation;

"Corporation" means the Municipal Corporation of Delhi established under this Act

- 8) "corrupt practice" means any of the practices specified in section 22;
- 9) "dangerous disease" means—
 - a) cholera, plague, chicken-pox, smallpox, tuberculosis, leprosy, enteric fever, cerebrospinal meningitis and diphtheria; and
 - any other epidemic, endemic or infectious disease which the Commissioner may, by notification in the Official Gazette, declare to be a dangerous disease for the purposes of this Act;
- 10)"Delhi" means the entire area of the Union territory of Delhi except New Delhi and Delhi Cantonment;
- 11)"Delhi Cantonment" means the area for the time being within the local limits of the Delhi Cantonment Board;

15) "drain" includes a sewer, a house drain, a drain of any other description, a tunnel, a culvert, a ditch, a channel and any other device for carrying off sewage, offensive matter, polluted water, waste water, rain water or sub-soil water;

- 15A)"Election Commission" means the Election Commission of the National Capital Territory of Delhi referred to in section 7.
- 15B)"Election Commissioner" means the Election Commissioner of the National Capital Territory of Delhi appointed by the Administrator under section 7;
- "entertainment" includes any exhibition, performance, amusement, game or sport to which persons are ordinarily admitted on payment;
- 17) "factory" means a factory as defined in the Factories Act, 1948 (63 of 1948);
- "filth" includes offensive matter and sewage;
 Clauses 19, 20 omitted
- 21) "goods" includes animals;
- 21A)"Government" means the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi;
- 22) "house-gully" or "service passage" means a passage or strip of land constructed, set apart or utilised for the purpose of serving as or carrying a drain or affording access to a latrine, urinal, cesspool other receptacle for filth or other polluted matter, by municipal employees or other persons employed in the cleansing thereof or in the removal of such matter therefrom;
- 23) "hut" means any building which is constructed principally of wood, bamboo, mud, leaves, grass, cloth or thatch and includes any structure of whatever material made which the Corporation may declare to be a hut for the purposes of this Act;
- 24) "land" includes benefits to arise out of land, things attached to the earth or permanently fastened to anything attached to the earth and rights created by law over any street;
- 25) "licensed architect", "licensed draughtsman", "licensed engineer", "licensed plumber", "licensed surveyor" and "licensed town planner" mean respectively a person licensed under the provisions of this Act as an architect, draughtsman, engineer, plumber, surveyor and town planner;
- 26) "market" includes any place where persons assemble for the sale of, or for the purpose of exposing for sale, meat, fish, fruits, vegetables, animals intended for human food or any other articles of human food whatsoever, with or

without the consent of the owner of such place notwithstanding that there may be no common regulation for the concourse of buyers and sellers and whether or not any control is exercised over the business of, or the persons frequenting, the market by the owner of the place or by any other person;

- 27) "member" in relation to [the Corporation] means a councillor;
- 28) "municipal authority" means any of the municipal authorities specified in section 44;
- 29) "municipal market" means a market vested in or managed by the Corporation;
- 30) "municipal slaughter house" means a slaughter house vested in or managed by the Corporation;
- 30A)"Municipal Taxation Tribunal" means the Municipal Taxation Tribunal constituted under section 169;
- 30B)Municipal Valuation Committee" means the Municipal Valuation Committee constituted under section 116;

- 32) "New Delhi" means the area within the boundaries described in the First Schedule;
- 33) "nuisance" includes any act, omission, place, animal or thing which causes or is likely to cause injury, danger, annoyance or offence to the sense of sight, smell, or hearing or disturbance to rest or sleep, or which is or may be dangerous to life or injurious to health or property;
- 34) "occupier" includes-
 - (a) any person who for the time being is paying or is liable to pay to the owner the rent or any portion of the tent of the land or building in respect of which such rent is paid or is payable;
 - b) an owner in occupation of, or otherwise using his land or building;
 - c) a rent free tenant of any land or building;
 - d) a licensee in occupation of any land or building; and
 - e) any person who is liable to pay to the owner damages for the use and occupation of any land or building;
- 35) "offensive matter" includes animal car cases, kitchen or stable refuse, dung, dirt and putrid

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or putrefying substances other than sewage;

- 36) "Official Gazette" means the Official Gazette of the Union Territory of Delhi;
- 37) "owner" includes a person who for the time being is receiving or is entitled to receive, the rent of any land or building whether on his own account or on account of himself and others or as an agent, trustee, guardian or receiver for any other person or who should so receive the rent or be entitled to receive it if the land or building or part thereof were let to a tenant and also includes—
 - a) the custodian of evacuee property in respect of evacuee property vested in him under the Administration of Evacuee Property Act 1950 (31 of 1950); and
 - b) the estate officer to the Government of India, the Secretary of the Delhi Development Authority, constituted under the Delhi Development Act, 1957 (61 of 1957); the General Manager of a railway and the head of a Government department, in respect of properties under their respective control;
- 38) "premises" means any land or building or part of a building and includes—
 - a) the garden, ground and out-houses, if any, appertaining to a building or part of a building; and
 - b) any fittings affixed to a building or part of a building for the more beneficial enjoyment thereof;
- 39) "private street" means any street, which is not a public street and includes any passage securing access to two or more places belonging to the same or different owners;
- 40) "private market" means a market which is not a municipal market;
- 41) "private slaughter house" means a slaughter house which is not a municipal slaughter house;
- 42) "public place" means any place which is open to the use and enjoyment of the public, whether it is actually used or enjoyed by the public or not;
- (43) "public securities" means any securities of the Central Government or a State Government or any securities guaranteed by the Central Government or a State Government or any securities issued under this Act or any debentures issued by the Bombay, Calcutta or

Madras Municipal Corporation;

- 44) "public street" means any street which vests in the Corporation as a public street or the soil below the surface of which vest in the Corporation or which under the provisions of this Act becomes, or is declared to be, a public street;
- 44A) "public utilities" include water-supply, sewerage and drainage, solid waste management, energy and telecommunication services, gas distribution system, and public transport system, whether managed by Government or otherwise;
- 45) "railway administration" has the meaning assigned to it in the Indian Railway Act, 1890, (9 of 1890);
- 46) "rate layer" means a person liable to pay any rate, tax, cess or licence fee under this Act;

Clause 47 omitted

- 48) "regulation" means a regulation made by the Corporation under this Act, by notification in the Official Gazette;
- 49) "reside"—
 - a person shall be deemed to "reside" in any dwelling house which or some portion of which he sometimes, although not uninterruptedly, uses as a sleeping apartment, and
 - b) a person shall not be deemed to cease to "reside" in any such dwelling house merely because he is absent from it or has elsewhere another dwelling house in which he resides, if there is the liberty of returning to it at any time and no abandonment of the intention of returning to it;
- 50) "rubbish" includes ashes, broken bricks, broken glass, dust, malba, mortar and refuse of any kind which is not filth;
- 51) "rule" means a rule made by the Central Government and the Government under this Act, by notification in the Official Gazette;
- 52) "rural areas" means the areas of Delhi which immediately before the establishment of the Corporation are situated within the local limits of the District Board of Delhi established under the Punjab District Boards Act, 1883, (Punjab Act XX of 1883), but shall not include such portion thereof as may, by virtue of a notification under section 507, cease to be

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included in the rural areas as herein defined;

- 53) "Scheduled Caste" means any of the Scheduled Castes specified in Part I of the Schedule to the Constitution (Scheduled Castes) (Union Territories) Order, 1951;
- 54) "sewage" means night-soil and other contents of latrines, urinals, cesspools or drains, and polluted water from sinks, bathrooms, stables, cattle sheds and other like places, and includes trade effluents and discharges from manufactories of all kinds;
- 55) "shed" means a slight or temporary structure for shade or shelter;
- 56) "slaughter house" means any place ordinarily used for the slaughter of animals for the purpose of selling the flesh thereof for human consumption;
- 57) "street" includes any way, road, lane, square, court, alley, gully, passage, whether a thoroughfare or not and whether built upon or not, over which the public have a right of way and also the roadways or footway over any bridge or causeway;
- 58) "trade effluent" means any liquid either with or without particles of matter in suspension therein, which is wholly or in part produced in the course of any trade or industry carried on at trade premises, and in relation to any trade premises means any such liquid as aforesaid which is so produced in the course of any trade or industry carried on at those premises, but does not include domestic sewage;
- 59) "trade premises" means any premises used or intended to be used for carrying on any trade or industry;
- 60) "trade refuse" means the refuse of any trade or industry;

- 61) "urban areas" means the areas of Delhi which are not rural areas;
- 61A) "vacant land" means the land within a premises excluding the land occupied by the plinth of any building erected thereon.]
- 62) "vehicle" includes a carriage, cart, van, dray, truck, hand-cart, bicycle, tricycle, cyclerickshaw, auto-rickshaw, motor vehicle and every wheeled conveyance which is used or is capable of being used on a street;
- (62A) "Voting machine" means any machine or apparatus whether operated electronically or otherwise used for giving or recording of votes and any reference to a ballot box ballot paper in this Act or the rules made here under shall, save as otherwise provided, be constructed as including a reference to such voting machine wherever such voting machine is used at any election".
- 63) "ward" means a municipal ward provided by order made under section 5 for the purpose of election of councillors;
- 63A) "Wards Committee" means the Wards Committee referred to in section 50;]
- 64) "water course" includes any river, stream or channel whether natural or artificial;

- 66) "workshop" means any premises (including the precincts thereof) other than a factory, wherein any industrial process is carried on;
- 67) "year" means a year commencing on the 1st day of April;
- 68) "Zone" means a Zone referred to in section 3A.

CHAPTER II

ESTABLISHMENT OF MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF DELHI Constitution of Municipal Corporation

3. Establishment of the Corporation

- With effect from such date as the Central Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint, there shall be the Corporation charged with the Municipal Government of Delhi, to be known as the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.
- 2) The Corporation so established shall be a body corporate with the name duly notified by the Central Government having perpetual succession and a common seal with power, subject to the provisions of this Act, to acquire, hold and dispose of property and may by the said name sue and be sued.
- a) The Corporation shall be composed of the councillors;

b) the following persons shall be represented in the Corporation, namely:—

 ten persons, who are not less than 25 years of age and who have special knowledge or experience in municipal administration, to be nominated by the Administrator:

Provided that the persons nominated under this sub-clause shall not have the right to vote in the meetings of the Corporation;

- ii) members of the House of the People representing constituencies which comprise wholly or partly the area of the Corporation and the members of the Council of States registered as electors within the area of the Corporation;
- iii) as nearly as possible one-fifth of the members of the Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory of Delhi representing constituencies which comprise wholly or partly the area of [the Corporation to be nominated by the Speaker of that Legislative Assembly, by rotation every year:

Provided that while nominating such members by rotation the Speaker shall ensure that as far as

possible all the members are given an opportunity of being represented in [the Corporation] at least once during the duration of the Corporation;

- iv) the Chairpersons of the Committees, if any, Constituted under sections 39, 40 and 45, if they are not councillors.]
- Councillors shall be chosen by direct election on the basis of adult suffrage from various wards into which Delhi shall be divided in accordance with the provisions of this Act;
- 5) The total number of seats of councillors and the number of seats reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes in the Corporation, shall, at the time of establishment of Corporation, be as determined by the Central Government by notification in the Official Gazette.
- 6) Upon the completion of each census after the establishment of [the Corporation], the number of seats shall be on the basis of the population of 6 [Delhi] as ascertained at that census and shall be determined by the Central Government by notification in the Official Gazette and the number of seats to be reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes shall, as nearly as may be, bear the same ratio to the total number of seats as the population of Scheduled Castes bears to the total population of Delhi:

Provided that the total number of seats shall in no case be more than two hundred and fifty and the number of seats in the Corporation shall be determined by the Central Government at the time of the establishment of the Corporation:

Provided further that the determination of seats as aforesaid shall not affect the then composition of the Corporation until the expiry of the duration of the Corporation:

Provided also that the seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes may be allotted by rotation to different wards in such manner as the Central Government may, by order published in the Official Gazette, direct.

- 7) Seats shall be reserved for women belonging to the Scheduled Castes, from among the seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes, the number of such seats being determined by the Central Government by order published in the Official Gazette which shall not be less than one-half of the total number of seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes.
- 8) Seats shall be reserved for women, the number of such seats being determined by order published in Official Gazette by the Government which shall not be less than the one-half of total number of seats other than those reserved for the Scheduled Castes:

Provided that such seats reserved for women shall be allotted by rotation to different wards in such manner as the Central Government may, by order published in the Official Gazette, direct in this behalf.

3A. Division of the area of the Corporation into zones and wards.

- The area of the Corporation shall be divided into a number of zones and each zone and into a number of wards as specified in the Fourteenth Schedule.
- 2) The Central Government may, by notification in the official Gazette, after the number or the name, and increase or diminish the area of any zone or ward specified in the Fourteenth Schedule.

4. Duration of the Corporation.

- The Corporation, unless sooner dissolved under section 490, shall continue for five years from the date appointed for its first meeting and no longer:
- 2) An election to constitute the Corporation shall be completed—
 - before the expiry of its duration specified in sub-section (1);
 - ii) before the expiration of a period of six months from the date of its dissolution :

Provided that where the remainder of the period for which the dissolved Corporation would have continued is less than six months, it shall not be necessary to hold any election under this subsection for constituting the Corporation for such period.

Election of councillors

5. Delimitation of wards.

- For the purposes of election of councillors, the area of the Corporation shall be divided into single-Member wards in such manner that the population of each of the wards shall, so for as practicable, be the same throughout the area of the Corporation.
- 2) The Central Government shall, by order in the Official Gazette, determine,
 - a) the number of wards;
 - b) the extent of each ward;
 - c) the wards in which seats shall be reserved for the Scheduled Castes;
 - d) The wards in which seats shall be reserved for women; and
 - e) The manner in which seats shall be rotated under sub-sections (6) and (8) of section 3.

- 6. Power to alter or amend delimitation orders.—The Corporation, with the previous approval of Central Government, may, from time to time by order in the Official Gazette, alter or amend any order made under section 5.
- **7. Elections to the Corporation.**—(1) The superintendence, direction and control of the preparation of electoral rolls for, and the conduct of, all elections to the Corporation shall be vested in the Election Commission of the National Capital Territory of Delhi consisting of an Election Commissioner to be appointed by the Administrator.
 - 2) Subject to the provisions of any law made by the Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory of Delhi, the conditions of service and tenure of office of the Election Commissioner shall be such as the Administrator may by rules determine: Provided that the Election Commissioner shall not be removed from office except in a like manner and on the like grounds as a Judge of a High Court and the conditions of service of the Election Commissioner shall not be varied to his disadvantage after his appointment.
 - 3) The Administrator shall, when so requested by the Election Commission make available to that Commission such

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staff which the Administrator considers necessary for discharge of the functions conferred on the Election Commission by sub-section (1).

7A. Electoral roll for every ward.—For every ward there shall be an electoral roll which shall be prepared in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the rules made thereunder.

7B. Electoral registration officers.—(1) The electoral roll for each ward shall be prepared and revised by an electoral registration officer who shall be such officer of Government or the Corporation as the Election Commission may, in consultation with the Government, designate or nominate in this behalf.

2) To assist the electoral registration officer in the discharge of his functions under sub-section (1) the Election Commission may employ such persons as it thinks fit.

7C. Assistant electoral registration officers.— (1) The Election Commission may appoint one or more persons as assistant electoral registration officers to assist any electoral registration officer in the performance of his functions.

(2) Every assistant electoral registration officer shall, subject to the control of the electoral registration officer, be competent to perform all or any of the functions of the electoral registration officer.

7D. Registration of Electors.—The persons entitled to be registered as electors in the electoral roll of an assembly constituency in Delhi as relates to the area comprised within a ward shall be entitled to be so registered in the electoral roll of that ward and the provisions in this behalf in the Representation of the People Act, 1950 (43 of 1950) shall apply to the registration of electors in the electoral roll of a ward as they apply to the registration of electors in the electors in the electors in the electoral roll of an assembly constituency.

Explanation—In this section, in sub-section (1) of section 7E and in clause (ag) of sub-section (1) of section 31, the expression 6 an assembly constituency has the meaning assigned to it under the Representation of the People Act, 1950 (43 of 1950).

7E. Preparation and revision of electoral rolls.—

(1) The electoral roll for each ward shall be prepared before each general election in such manner as may be prescribed by rules by reference to the qualifying date and shall come into force immediately upon its final publication in accordance with the rules made for the purpose:

Provided that if the [Election Commission] is satisfied that, instead of preparing a fresh electoral roll of a ward before a general election, it would be sufficient to adopt the electoral roll of [the assembly constituency] for the time being in force as relates to the ward, it may, by order, for reasons to be specified therein, direct that the electoral roll of [the assembly constituency] for the time being in force as relates to the ward shall, subject to any rules made for the purpose, be the electoral roll of the ward for the general election.

(2) The electoral roll prepared or adopted, as the case may be, under subsection (1) shall—

- a) unless otherwise directed by the Election Commission, for reasons to be recorded in writing, be revised in the manner prescribed by rules by reference to the qualifying date before each bye-election to fill a casual vacancy in a seat allotted to the ward; and
- b) be revised in any year in the manner prescribed by rules by reference to the qualifying date if such revision has been directed by the Election Commission: Provided that if the electoral roll is not revised as aforesaid, the validity or continued operation of the said electoral roll shall not thereby be affected.

3) Notwithstanding anything contained in subsection (2), the Election Commission may, at any time, for reasons to be recorded in writing, direct a special revision of the electoral roll for any ward or part of a ward in such manner as it may think fit:

Provided that the electoral roll for the ward as in force at the time of the issue of any such direction shall continue to be in force until the completion of the special revision so directed.

Explanation:—In this section, the expression "qualifying date" means such date as the Election Commission may, by order, specify in this behalf.

7F. Correction of entries in electoral roll.—If the electoral registration officer, on an application made to him or on his own motion, is satisfied after such inquiry as he thinks fit, that any entry in the electoral roll for any ward—

- a) is erroneous or defective in any particular; or
- b) should be transposed to another place in the roll on the ground that the person concerned has

changed his place of ordinary residence within such ward; or

c) should be deleted on the ground that the person concerned is dead or has ceased to be ordinarily resident within such ward or is otherwise not entitled to be registered in that the electoral registration officer shall, subject to such general or special directions, if any, as may be given by the Election Commission in this behalf, amend, transpose or delete the entry:

Provided that before taking any action on the ground specified in clause (a) or clause (b) or any action under clause (c) on the ground that the person concerned has ceased to be ordinarily resident within such ward or that he is otherwise not entitled to be registered in the electoral roll of such ward, the electoral registration officer shall give the person concerned a reasonable opportunity of being heard in respect of the action proposed to be taken in relation to him.

7G. Inclusion of names in electoral roll.—(1) Any person whose name is not included in the electoral roll of a ward may apply to the electoral registration officer for the inclusion of his name in that roll.

2) The electoral registration officer shall, if satisfied that the applicant is entitled to be registered in the electoral roll, direct his name to be included therein:

Provided that if the applicant is registered in the electoral roll of any other ward, the electoral registration officer shall inform the electoral registration officer of that other ward and that Officer shall, on receipt of the information, strike off the applicant's name from that roll.

3) No amendment, transposition or deletion of any entry shall be made under section 7F and no direction for the inclusion of a name in the electoral roll of a ward shall be given under this section after the last date for making nominations for an election in that ward and before the completion of that election.

7H. Appeal.—An appeal shall lie within such time and in such manner as may be prescribed by rules to the Election Commission from any order of the electoral registration officer under section 7F or section 7G.

7 I. Jurisdiction of civil courts barred.-No civil

court shall have jurisdiction—

- a) to entertain or adjudicate upon any question whether any person is or is not entitled to be registered in an electoral roll for a ward; or
- b) to question the legality of any action taken by or under the authority of an electoral registration officer or of any decision given by the Election Commission.

8. Qualifications for councillorship.—A person shall not be qualified to be chosen as a councillor unless he has attained the age of twenty-one years and his name is registered as an elector in the electoral roll for a ward:

Provided that in the case of a seat reserved for the Scheduled Castes, a person shall not be so qualified unless he is also a member of any of the said castes:

Provided further that in the case of a seat reserved for woman, no person other than a woman shall be qualified to be chosen as a councillor.

9. Disqualifications for membership of **Corporation.** -(1) A person shall be disqualified for being chosen as, and for being, a councillor,

- a) if he is of unsound mind and stands so declared by a competent court;
- b) if he is an undischarged insolvent;
- c) if he is not a citizen of India, or has voluntarily acquired the citizenship of a foreign State, or is under any acknowledgment of allegiance or adherence to a foreign State;
- d) if he is so disqualified by or under any law for the time being in force for the purposes of elections to the Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory of Delhi;
- e) if he is so disqualified by or under any law made by the Legislative Assembly of the National Capital Territory of Delhi;
- f) if he holds any office of profit under the Corporation;
- g) if he holds any office of profit under the Government 8 or Central Government;
- h) if he is a licensed architect, draughtsman, engineer, plumber, surveyor or town planner or is a partner of a firm of which any such licensed person is also a partner;
- i) if he is interested in any subsisting contract made with, or any work being done for, the Corporation except as a shareholder (other

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than a director) in an incorporated company or as a member of a cooperative society;

- j) if he is retained or employed in any professional capacity either personally or in the name of a firm of which he is a partner or with which he is engaged in a professional capacity, in connection with any cause or proceeding in which [the Corporation or any of the municipal authorities is interested or concerned;
- k) if he, having held any office under the Government, the Corporation or any other authority, has been dismissed for corruption or disloyalty to the State unless a period of four years has elapsed since his dismissal or the disqualification has been removed by the Election Commission;
- if he fails to pay any arrears of any kind due by him, otherwise than as an agent, receiver, trustee or an executor, to the Corporation within three months after a notice in this behalf has been served upon him.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in subsection (1)—

(b) a person shall not be deemed to have incurred any disqualification under clause (f) or clause (g) of that sub-section by reason only of his receiving—

- i) any pension; or
- any allowance or facility for serving as the Mayor or Deputy Mayor or as a councillor or
- iii) any fee for attendance at meetings of any committee of the Corporation;

(c) a person shall not be deemed to have any interest in a contract or works such as is referred to in clause (i) of that sub-section by reason only of his having a share or interest in—

- any lease, sale, exchange or purchase of immovable property or any agreement for the same; or
- any agreement for the loan of money or any security for the payment of money only;

or

- iii) any newspaper in which any advertisement relating to the affairs of the Corporation is inserted; or
- iv) the sale to the Corporation or to any municipal authority or any officer or other

employee of the Corporation on behalf of the Corporation, of any article in which he regularly trades or the purchase from the Corporation or from any such authority, officer or other employee on behalf of the Corporation, of any article of a value in either case not exceeding five thousand rupees in the aggregate in any year during the period of the contract or work; or

- v) the letting out on hire to the Corporation or the hiring from the Corporation of any article of a value not exceeding two thousand rupees in the aggregate in any year during the period of the contract or work; or
- vi) any agreement or contract with the Corporation or any municipal authority for any goods or services which the Corporation may generally supply

(3) If a person sits or votes as a member of the Corporation when he knows that he is not qualified or that he is disqualified for such membership, he shall be liable in respect of each day on which he so sits or votes to a penalty of three hundred rupees to be recovered as an arrear of tax under this Act.

10. Right to vote.—(1) Every person whose name is, for the time being, entered in the electoral roll for a ward shall be entitled to vote at the election of a councillor from that ward.

11. General elections of councillors.—(1) A general election of councillors shall be held for the purpose of constituting the Corporation under section 3.

(3) For the aforesaid purposes the Election Commission shall, by one or more notifications published in the Official Gazette; call upon all the wards to elect councillors in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the rules and orders made thereunder before such date or dates as may be specified in the notification or notifications:

Provided that where in any ward a seat has been reserved for the Scheduled Castes, such notification or notifications shall specify that the person to fill that seat shall belong to one of the said castes:

Provided further that where in any ward a seat has been reserved for woman, such notification or notifications shall specify that the person to fill that seat shall be a woman.

12. Filling of casual vacancies in councillorship.— (1) When a casual vacancy occurs in the office of a

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councillor the Election Commission shall, soon as may be after the occurrence of such vacancy and subject to the provisions of sub-section (2), by a notification in the Official Gazette, call upon the ward concerned to elect a person for the purpose of filling the vacancy in accordance with the provisions of this Act and the rules and orders made thereunder before such date as may be specified in the notification:

Provided that no election shall be held to fill a casual vacancy occurring within six months prior to the holding of a general election under section 11.

(2) If the vacancy be a vacancy in a seat reserved for the Scheduled Castes the notification issued under sub-section (1) shall specify that the person to fill that seat shall belong to one of the Scheduled Castes.

(3) If the vacancy be a vacancy in a seat reserved for women the notification issued under sub-section (1) shall specify that the person to fill that seat shall be a woman.

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14. Publication of result of election—The names of all persons elected as councillors shall, as far as may be, after each election, be published by the Election Commission simultaneously in the Official Gazette.

Disputes regarding elections

15. Election petitions.—(1) No election of a councillor shall be called in question except by an election petition presented to the court of the district judge of Delhi within fifteen days from the date of the publication of the result of the election under section 14.

- An election petition calling in question any such election may be presented under any of the grounds specified in section 17 by any candidate at such election, by any elector of the ward concerned or by any councillor.
- 3) A petitioner shall join as respondents to his petition all the candidates at the election.
- 4) An election petition-

(a) shall contain a concise Statement of the material facts on which the petitioner relies;

(b) shall, with sufficient particulars, set forth the

ground or grounds on which the election is called in question; and

(c) shall be signed by the petitioner and verified in the manner laid down in the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (5 of 1908) for the verification of pleadings.

16. Relief that may be claimed by the petitioner.—(1) A petitioner may claim—

- a) a declaration that the election of all or any of the returned candidates is void, and
- b) in addition thereto, a further declaration that he himself or any other candidate has been duly elected.

(2) The expression "returned candidate" means a candidate whose name has been published in the Official Gazette under section 14.

17. Grounds for declaring elections to be void.—
(1) Subject to the provisions of sub-section (2) if the

- court of the district judge is of opinion—
 a) that on the date of his election a returned candidate was not qualified or was disqualified, to be chosen as a councillor under this Act, or
- b) that any corrupt practice has been committed by a returned candidate or his agent or by any other person with the consent of a returned candidate or his agent, or
- c) that any nomination paper has been improperly rejected, or
- d) that the result of the election, in so far as it concerns a returned candidate, has been materially affected
 - i) by the improper acceptance of any nomination, or
 - ii) by any corrupt practice committed in the interests of the returned candidate by a person other than that candidate or his agent or a person acting with the consent of such candidate or agent, or
 - iii) by the improper acceptance or refusal of any vote or reception of any vote which is void, or
 - iv) by the non-compliance with the provisions of this Act or of any rules or orders made thereunder,

the court shall declare the election of the returned candidate to be void.

(2) If in the opinion of the court, a returned candidate

has been guilty by an agent of any corrupt practice, but the court is satisfied—

- a) that no such corrupt practice was committed at the election by the candidate, and every such corrupt practice was committed contrary to the orders, and without the consent of the candidate;
- b) that the candidate took all reasonable means for preventing the commission of corrupt practices at the election; and
- c) that in all other respects the election was free from any corrupt practice on the part of the candidate or any of his agents; then

the court may decide that the election of the returned candidate is not void.

18. Procedure to be followed by the district judge.—The procedure provided in the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (5 of 1908), in regard to suits shall be followed by the court of the district judge as far as it can be made applicable, in the trial and disposal of an election petition under this Act.

19. Decision of the district judge.—(1) At the conclusion of the trial of an election petition, the court of the district judge shall make an order—

- a) dismissing the election petition; or
- b) declaring the election of all or any of the returned candidates to be void; or
- c) declaring the election of all or any of the returned candidates to be void and the petitioner and any other candidates to have been duly elected.

(2) If any person who has filed an election petition has, in addition to calling in question the election of the returned candidate, claimed declaration that he himself or any other candidate has been duly elected and the court of the district judge is of opinion—

- a) that in fact the petitioner or such other candidate received a majority of the valid votes, or
- b) that but for the votes obtained by the returned candidate the petitioner or such other candidate would have obtained a majority of the valid votes, the court shall, after declaring the election of the returned candidate to be void, declare the petitioner or such other candidate, as the case may be, to have been duly elected.

20. Procedure in case of equality of votes.—If during the trial of an election petition it appears that there is an equality of votes between any

candidates at the election and that the addition of a vote would entitle any of those candidates to be declared elected, then, the court of the district judge shall decide between them by lot and proceed as if the one on whom the lot falls had received an additional vote.

21. Finality of decisions.—(1) An order of the court of the district judge on an election petition shall be final and conclusive.

 An election of a councillor 1*** not called in question in accordance with the foregoing provisions shall be deemed to be a good and valid election.

Corrupt practices and electoral offences

22. Corrupt practices.—The following shall be deemed to be corrupt practices for the purposes of this Act:—

- 1) Bribery as defined in clause (1) of section 123 of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 (43 of 1951).
- 2) Undue influence as defined in clause (2) of the said section.
- 3) The systematic appeal by a candidate or his agent or by any other person, to vote or refrain from voting on grounds of caste, race, community or religion or the use of or appeal to, religious symbols or, the use of or appeal to, national symbols such as the national flag or the national emblem, for the furtherance of the prospects of that candidate's election.
- 4) The publication by a candidate or his agent or by any other person of any Statement of fact which is false, and which he either believes to be false or does not believe to be true in relation to the personal character or conduct of any candidate, or in relation to the candidature, or withdrawal from contest of any candidate being a Statement reasonably calculated to prejudice the prospects of that candidate's election.
- 5) The hiring or procuring whether on payment or otherwise of any vehicle or vessel by a candidate or his agent or by any other person for the conveyance of any elector (other than the candidate himself, and the members of his family or his agent) to or from any polling station provided in accordance with the rules made under this Act:

Provided that the hiring of a vehicle or vessel by an elector or by several electors at their joint costs for the purpose of conveying him or them to or from any such polling station shall not be deemed to be a corrupt practice under this clause if the vehicle or vessel so hired is a vehicle or vessel not propelled by mechanical power:

Provided further that the use of any public transport vehicle or vessel or any tram car or railway carriage by an elector at his own cost for the purpose of going to or coming from any such polling station shall not be deemed to be a corrupt practice under this clause.

Explanation—In this clause the expression "vehicle" means any vehicle used or capable of being used for the purpose of road transport whether propelled by mechanical power or otherwise and whether used for drawing other vehicles or otherwise.

- 6) The holding of any meeting in which intoxicating liquors are served.
- 7) The issuing of any circular, placard or poster having a reference to the election which does not bear the name and address of the printer and publisher thereof.
- 8) Any other practice which the Central Government may by rules specify to be a corrupt practice.

23. Maintenance of secrecy of voting.—(1) Every officer or clerk, agent or other person who performs any duty in connection with the recording or counting of votes at an election shall maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of the voting and shall not (except for some purpose authorised by or under any law) communicate to any person any information calculated to violate such secrecy.

(2) Any person who contravenes the provisions of sub-section (1) shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three months or with fine, or with both.

24. Officers, etc., at elections not to act for candidates or to influence voting.—(1) No person who is a returning officer, or an assistant returning officer or a presiding officer or polling officer at an election, or an officer or clerk appointed by the returning officer or the presiding officer to perform any duty in connection with an election or a member of a police force shall in the conduct or management of the election do any act (other than the giving of votes) for the furtherance of the prospects of the election of a candidate.

2) No such person as aforesaid shall endeavour—

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- a) to persuade any person to give his vote at an election; or
- b) to dissuade any person from giving his vote at an election; or
- c) to influence the voting of any person at an election in any manner.
- Any person who contravenes the provisions of sub-section (1) or sub-section (2) shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months, or with fine, or with both.

25. Prohibition of canvassing in or near polling station and of public meeting on election day.—

(1) No person shall, on the date or dates on which the poll is taken at any polling station, commit any of the following acts within the polling station or in any public or private place within a distance of one hundred yards of the polling station, namely:—

- a) canvassing for votes; or
- b) soliciting the vote of any elector; or
- c) persuading any elector not to vote for any particular candidate; or
- d) persuading any elector not to vote at the election; or
- e) exhibiting any notice or sign (other than an official notice) relating to the election.
 - No person shall convene, hold or attend any public meeting within any ward on the date or dates on which a poll is taken for an election in that ward.
 - Any person who contravenes the provisions of sub-section (1) or sub-section (2) shall be punishable with fine which may extend to two hundred and fifty rupees.
 - 4) An offence punishable under this section shall be cognizable.

26. Penalty for disorderly conduct in or near polling station.—(1) No person shall, on the date or dates on which a poll is taken at any polling station—

- a) use or operate within or at the entrance of the polling station or in any public or private place in the neighbourhood thereof any apparatus for amplifying or reproducing the human voice, such as a megaphone or a loud-speaker; or
- b) shout or otherwise act in a disorderly manner, within or at the entrance of the polling

station or in any public or private place in the neighbourhood thereof; so as to cause annoyance to any person visiting the polling station for the poll, or so as to interfere with the work of the officer and other persons on duty at the polling station.

- 2) Any person who contravenes or wilfully aids or abets the contravention of the provisions of subsection (1), shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three months, or with fine, or with both.
- 3) If the presiding officer of a polling station has reason to believe that any person is committing or has committed an offence punishable under this section, he may direct any police officer to arrest such person, and thereupon the police officer shall arrest him.
- 4) Any police officer may take such step and use such force, as may be reasonably necessary for preventing any contravention of the provisions of sub-section (1), and may seize any apparatus used for such contravention.
- 5) An offence punishable under this section shall be cognizable,

27. Penalty for misconduct at the polling station.—(1) Any person who during the hours fixed for the poll at any polling station, misconducts himself or fails to obey the lawful directions of the presiding officer, may be removed from the polling station by the presiding officer or by any police officer on duty or by any person authorised in this behalf by such presiding officer.

- 2) The powers conferred by sub-section (1) shall not be exercised so as to prevent any elector who is otherwise entitled to vote at a polling station from having an opportunity of voting at that station.
- 3) If any person who has been so removed from a polling station, re-enters the polling station without the permission of the presiding officer, he shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to three months, or with fine, or with both.
 - 4) An offence punishable under sub-section(3) shall be cognizable.

28. Breaches of official duty in connection with election.—

- If any person to whom this section applies, is without reasonable cause guilty of any act or omission in breach of his official duty, he shall be punishable with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.
- 2) No suit or other legal proceeding shall lie against any such person for damages in respect of any such act or omission as aforesaid.
- 3) The persons to whom this section applies are returning officers, assistant returning officers, presiding officers, polling officers and any other person appointed to perform any duty in connection with the election; and the expression "official duty" shall for the purposes of this section be construed accordingly.

29. Removal of ballot papers or a ballot box or a voting machine or a part thereof from polling station to be an offence.—(1) Any person who at an election fraudulently takes or attempts to take a ballot paper out of a polling station, or wilfully aids or abets the doing of any such act, shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to one year, or with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees, or with both.

2) If the presiding officer of a polling station has reason to believe that any person is committing or has committed an offence punishable under sub-section (1), such officer may, before such person leaves the polling station, arrest or direct a police officer to arrest such person and may search such person or cause him to be searched by a police officer:

Provided that when it is necessary to cause a women to be searched, the search shall be made by another woman with strict regard to decency.

- 3) Any ballot paper found upon the person arrested on search or a ballot box or a voting machine or part thereof found being carried away by a person outside the polling station shall be made over for safe custody to a police officer by the presiding officer or when the search is made by a police officer, shall be kept by such officer in safe custody.
- 4) An offence punishable under sub-section (1) shall be cognizable.

29A. Prohibition of going armed to or near a polling station.—(1) No person, other than the returning officer, the presiding officer, any police officer and any other person appointed to maintain

peace and order at a polling station who is on duty at the polling station, shall, on a polling day, go armed with arms, as defined in the Arms Act, 1959 (54 of 1959), of any kind within the neighbourhood of a polling station.

- If any person contravenes the provisions of sub-section (1), he shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two years or with fine, or with both.
- 3) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Arms Act, 1959 (54 of 1959), where a person is convicted of an offence, under this section, the arms as defined in the said Act found in his possession shall be liable to confiscation and the licence granted in relation to such arms shall be deemed to have revoked under section 17 of that Act.
- 4) An offence punishable under sub-section (2) shall be cognizable.

29B. Offence of booth capturing.—Whoever commits an offence of booth capturing shall be punishable with imprisonment for a terms which shall not be less than one year but which may extend to three years and with fine, and where such offence is committed by a person in the service of the Government, he shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which shall not be less than three years but which may extend to five years and with fine.

Explanation:—For the purposes of this section "booth capturing includes, among other things, all or any of the following activities, namely :—

- a) Seizure of a polling station or a place fixed for the poll by any person or persons making polling authorities surrender the ballot papers, used ballot box or boxes or voting machines use and doing of any other act which affects the orderly conduct of elections;
- b) taking possession of a polling station or a place fixed for the poll by, any person or persons and allowing only his or their own supporters to exercise their right to vote and prevent others from free exercise of their right to vote;
- c) coercing or intimidating or threatening directly or indirectly any elector and preventing him from going to the polling station or a place fixed for the poll to cast his vote;
- d) seizure of place for counting of votes by any person or persons making the counting

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authorities surrender the ballot papers or voting machines and the doing of anything which affects the orderly counting of votes;

e) doing by any person in the service of Government of all or any of the aforesaid activities or aiding or conniving at, any such activity in the furtherance of the prospects of the election of a candidate.

29C. Liquor not to be sold, given or distributed on polling day.—(1) No spirituous, fermented or intoxicating liquors or other substances of a like nature shall be sold, given or distributed at a hotel, eating house, lavern, shop or any other place, public or private, within a polling area during the period of forty-eight hours ending with the hour fixed for the conclusion of the poll for any election in that polling area.

2) Any person who contravenes the provisions of sub-section (1) shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term, which may extend to six months or with fine which may extend to two thousand rupees, or with both.

3) Where a person, is convicted of an offence under this section, the spirituous, fermented or intoxication liquors or other substances of a like nature found in his possession shall be liable to confiscation and the same shall be disposed of in such manner as may be prescribed.]

30. Other offences and penalties therefor.—(1) A person shall be guilty of an electoral offence if at any election he—

- a) fraudulently defaces or destroys any nomination paper; or
- b) fraudulently defaces, destroys or removes any list, notice or other document affixed by or under the authority of the returning officer; or
- c) fraudulently defaces or destroys any ballot paper or the official mark on any ballot paper; or
- without due authority supplies any ballot paper to any person or receives any ballot paper from any person or is in possession of any ballot paper; or
- e) fraudulently puts into any ballot box anything other than the ballot paper which he is authorised by law to put in; or
- f) without due authority destroys, takes, opens or otherwise interferes with any ballot box or

ballot paper then in use for the purposes of the election; or

g) fraudulently or without due authority, as the case may be, attempts to do any of the foregoing acts or wilfully aids or abets the doing of any such acts.

(2) Any person guilty of an offence under this section shall—

- a) if he is a returning officer or an assistant returning officer or a presiding officer or a polling officer or any other officer or clerk employed on official duty in connection with the election, be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to two years, or with fine, or with both;
- b) if he is any other person, be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months, or with fine, or with both.
- 3) For the purposes of this section, a person shall be deemed to be on official duty if his duty is to take part in the conduct of any election or part of an election including the counting of votes or to be responsible after an election for the used ballot papers and other documents in connection with such election.
- 4) An offence punishable under clause (b) of subsection (2) shall be cognizable.
- 5) No court shall take cognizance of any offence under section 24, or under section 28, or under clause (a) of sub-section (2) of this section unless there is a complaint made by order of, or under authority from, the Election Commission.

Power to make rules

31. Power to make rules regulating the election of councillors and aldermen.—(1) The Central Government may make rules to provide for or regulate all or any of the following matters for the purpose of preparation, revision, and maintenance of electoral rolls of wards and holding elections of councillors under this Act, namely:—

- a) the particulars to be entered in the electoral rolls;
- aa) the preliminary publication of electoral rolls;
- ab) the manner in which and the time within which claims and objections as to entries in electoral rolls may be preferred;
- ac) the manner in which notices of claims or

objections shall be published;

- ad) the place, date and time at which claims or objections shall be heard and the manner in which claims or objections shall be heard and disposed of;
- ae) the final publication of electoral rolls;
- af) the revision and correction of electoral rolls and inclusion of names therein;
- ag) the manner in which and the purpose for which the electoral roll of 1 an assembly constituency may be used;
- ah) the correction of electoral rolls on change of extent or boundaries of wards;
- b) the appointment of returning officers, assistant returning officers, presiding officers and polling officers for the conduct of elections;
- c) the nomination of candidates, form of nomination papers, objections to nomination and scrutiny of nominations;
- d) the deposits to be made by candidates, time and manner of making such deposits and the circumstances under which such deposits may be returned to candidates or forfeited to the Corporation;
- e) the withdrawal of candidatures;
- f) the appointment of agents of candidates;
- g) the procedure in contested and uncontested elections and the special procedure at elections in wards where any seat is reserved for the Scheduled Castes and women;
- h) the date, time and place for poll and other matters relating to the conduct of elections including
 - i) the appointment of polling stations for each ward,
 - ii) the hours during which the polling station shall be kept open for the casting of votes,
 - iii) the printing and issue of ballot papers,
 - iv) the checking of voters by reference to the electoral roll,
 - v) the marking with indelible ink of the left forefinger or any other finger or limb of the voter and prohibition of the delivery of any ballot paper to any person if at the time such person applies for such paper he has already such mark so as to prevent personation of voters,
 - vi) the manner in which votes are to be given

and in particular in the case of illiterate voters or of voters under physical or other disability,

- vii) the procedure to be followed in respect of challenged votes and tendered votes,
- viii) the scrutiny of votes, counting of votes, the declaration of the results and the procedure in case of equality of votes or in the event of a councillor being elected to represent more than one ward,
- ix) the custody and disposal of papers relating to elections,
- x) the suspension of polls in case of any interruption by riot, violence or any other sufficient cause and the holding of a fresh poll,
- xi) the holding of a fresh poll in the case of destruction of or tampering with ballot boxes before the count,
- xii) the countermanding of the poll in the case of the death of a candidate before the poll;
- hh) the requisitioning of premises, vehicles, vessels or animals, payment of compensation in connection with such requisitioning, eviction from requisitioned premises and release of premises from requisition;]
- j) the fee to be paid on an election petition;
- any other matter 1 [relating to electoral rolls or elections] or election disputes in respect of which the Central Government deems it necessary to make rules under this section or in respect of which this Act makes no provision or makes insufficient provision and provision is, in the opinion of the Central Government necessary.
- In making any rule under this section the Central Government may provide that any contravention thereof shall be punishable with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees.

Councillors and aldermen

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32. Oath or affirmation.—(1) Every councillor and every person nominated under sub-clause (i) of clause (b) of sub-section (3) of section 3, before taking his seat, make and subscribe at a meeting of 3 [4 [the Corporation]] an oath or affirmation according to the following form, namely:—

"I, A. B. having been nominated under sub-clause (i) of clause (b) of nominated under sub-clause (i) of clause (b) of sub-section (3) of section 3 as representative in the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, do swear in the name of God that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the solemnly affirm Constitution of India as by law established and I will faithfully discharge the duty upon which I am about to enter."

(2) If a person sits or votes as a councillor or sits as a representative before he has complied with the requirements of sub-section (1) he shall be liable in respect of each day on which he sits or votes as the case may be, to a penalty of three hundred rupees to be recovered as arrears of tax under this Act.]

32A. Declaration of assets.—(1) Every councillor shall, not later than thirty days after making and subscribing the oath or affirmation under subsection (1) of section 32 and before the last day of the same month in each succeeding year, file with the Mayor a declaration in such form as may be prescribed by rules by the 6 [7 [Central Government]], of all the assets owned by him and members of his family and. such declaration shall form part of the records of the Corporation.

Explanation—For the purposes of this sub-section, "family" means the spouse and dependant children of the councillor.

- 2) A person shall be disqualified for being a councillor
 - a) if he fails to file a declaration referred to in sub-section (1); or

(b) if he files a declaration under that sub-section which is either false or which he knows or believes to be false.

32B. Vacation of seats in case of multiple membership.—No councillor shall be a member both of the Corporation and Parliament or the Legislative Assembly and if a person is so chosen, then at the expiration of fourteen days from the date of the publication in the Gazette of India, or as the case may be, in the Official Gazette, whichever is later that he has been so chosen, that person's seat in Parliament or the Legislative Assembly shall become vacant unless he has previously resigned his seat in the Corporation.

33. Vacation of seats.—(1) If a councillor 1***—

a) becomes subject to any of the disqualifications mentioned in 2 [section 9 or sub-section (2) of section 32A or],

- resigns his seat by writing under his hand addressed to the Mayor and delivered to the Commissioner, his seat shall thereupon become vacant.
 - If during three successive months, a councillor 3*** is, without permission of the Corporation, absent from all the meetings thereof, the Corporation may declare his seat vacant.
 - If any question arises as to whether a councillor 3*** has become subject to any of the disqualifications mentioned in section 9 or sub-section (2) of section 32A, the question shall be referred for the decision of the Administrator and his decision shall be final.]
 - Before giving any decision on any such question the Administrator shall obtain the opinion of the Election Commission and shall act according to such opinion.]

33A. Powers of Election Commission.—(1) Where in connection with the tendering of any opinion to the Administrator under sub-section (4) of section 33, the Election Commission considers it necessary or proper to make an inquiry, and the Commission is satisfied that on the basis of the affidavits filed and the documents produced in such inquiry by the parties concerned of their own accord, it cannot come to a decisive opinion on the matter which is being inquired into, the Commission shall have, for the purposes of such inquiry, the powers of a civil court, while trying a suit under the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908, (5 of 1908) in respect of the following matters, namely:—

- a) summoning and enforcing the attendance of any person and examining him on oath;
- b) requiring the discovery and production of any document or other material object producible as evidence;
- c) receiving evidence on affidavits;
- d) requisitioning any public record or a copy thereof from any court or office;
- e) issuing commissions for the examination of witnesses or documents.
- The Commission shall also have the power to require any person, subject to any privilege which may be claimed by that person under

any law for the time being in force, to furnish information on such points or matters as in the opinion of the Commission may be useful for, or relevant to, the subject-matter of the inquiry.

- 3) The Commission shall be deemed to be a civil court and when any such offence, as is described in section 175, section 178, section 179, section 180 or section 228 of the Indian Penal Code (45 of 1860), is committed in the view or presence of the Commission, the Commission may, after recording the facts constituting the offence and the Statement of the accused as provided for in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 (2 of 1974), forward the case to a magistrate having jurisdiction to try the same and the magistrate to whom any such case is forwarded shall proceed to hear the complaint against the accused as if the case had been forwarded to him under section 346 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973.
- 4) Any proceeding before the Commission shall be deemed to be a judicial proceeding within the meaning of section 193 and section 228 of the Indian Penal Code (45 of 1860).

33B. Statements made by persons to the **Election Commission.**—No Statement made by a person in the course of giving evidence before the Election Commission shall subject him to, or be used against him in, any civil or criminal proceeding except a prosecution for giving false evidence by such Statement:

Provided that the Statement— (a) is made in reply to a question which he is required by the Commission to answer; or

(b) is relevant to the subject-matter of the inquiry.

33C. Procedure to be followed by the Election Commission.—The Election Commission shall have the power to regulate its own procedure (including the fixing of places and times of its sittings and deciding whether to sit in public or in private).

33D. Protection of action taken in good faith.— No suit, prosecution or other legal proceedings shall lie against the Commission or any person acting under the direction of the Commission in respect of anything which is in good faith done or intended to be done in pursuance of the foregoing provisions of sections 33A to 33C or of any order made thereunder or in respect of the tendering of any opinion by the Commission to the Administrator or in respect of the publication, by or under the

authority of the Commission of any such opinion, paper or proceedings.


DMC ELECTION RULES

The preparations of electoral rolls and conduct of elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi are further governed by

DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION (Preparation of Electoral Roll) Rules 1975 and DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012, issued under the provisions of Section 31 of the DMC Act, 1957.



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CHAPTER-3

Important Judgments on Election Matters and Powers of Election Commission

SOME IMPORTANT JUDGMENTS OF SUPREME COURT AND HIGH COURTS IN ELECTION MATTERS - ESPECIALLY EMPOWERING THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSIONERS AT PAR WITH THE CHIEF ELECTION COMMISSIONER OF INDIA (under article 324 of the Constitution).

3.1 Union of India Vs Association for Democratic Reforms and another (No.7178 of 2001)

A Civil appeal was filed before the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India vide No.7178 of 2001 - **Union of India Vs Association for Democratic Reforms and another** - In this case, the Hon'ble Court had ordered the ECI to issue directions for filing of affidavits by candidates alongwith their nomination papers giving details of their criminal past, their assets and liabilities and educational qualifications. The ECI had pleaded that the provisions of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 and the rules made thereunder shall have to be amended by the Central Government for which a reasonable time would be necessary. As the Hon'ble Court was inclined to issue ECI orders immediately, it had given the following verdict : -

"The jurisdiction of the Election Commission is wide enough to include all powers necessary for smooth conduct of elections and the word 'election' is used in a wide sense to include the entire process of election which consists of several stages and embraces many steps.

The limitation on plenary character of power is when the Parliament or State legislature has made a valid law relating to or in connection with elections, the Commission is required to act in conformity with the said provisions. In case where law is silent, Art. 324 is a reservoir of power to act for the avowed purpose of having free and fair election. Constitution has taken care of leaving scope for exercise of residuary power by the Commission in its own right as a creature of the Constitution in the infinite variety of situations that may emerge from time to time in a large democracy, as every contingency could not be foreseen or anticipated by the enacted laws or the rules. By issuing necessary directions Commission can fill the vacuum till there is legislation on the subject. In Kanhiya Lal Omar's case (AIR 1986 SC 111), the court construed the expressions 'superintendence, direction and control' in Art 324(1) and held that a direction may mean an order issued to a particular individual or a precept which may have to follow and it may be specific or a general order and such phrase should be construed liberally empowering the Election Commission to issue such orders.

The word 'elections' includes the entire process of election which consists of several stages and it embraces many steps, some of which have an important bearing on the process of choosing a candidate. Fair election contemplates disclosure by the candidate of his past including assets held by him so as to give him a proper choice to elect a candidate according to his thinking and opinion. As Stated earlier, in Common Cause case [(1996l) 2 SCC 752], the court dealt with a contention that elections in the country are fought with the help of money power which is gathered from black sources and once elected to power, it becomes easy to collect tons of black money, which is used for retaining power and for re-election. If on affidavit a candidate is required to disclose the assets held by him at the time of election, voter can decide whether he could be re-elected even in case where he has collected tons of money."

3.2 Civil Appeal No.1553 of 1980 Jyoti Basu and Ors Vs. Debi Ghosal and Ors. (Case of Election Commission of India) Supreme Court of India Decision dated 26.02.82.

Judgment:

No one may be joined as a party to an election petition otherwise than as provided by Ss. 82 and 86(4) of the RP Act, 1951. It follows that a person who is not a candidate may not be joined as a

respondent to the election; petition (1981) 85 Cal WN 532 Reversed (Paras 9,13).

So far as elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi (local bodies) are concerned, an election petition can be filed before the District Judge, Delhi, within 15 days of the declaration and publication of result of election in Delhi Gazette as required in section 15 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended which provides that all candidates in the ward wherein petition has been filed, shall be joined as Respondents in the case. Rule 89(a) of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 provides that candidate would mean a person who has aspired for the said election i.e. the person/candidate who has filed his/her nomination. But as the petitioners do it in cases of election petitions, the State Election Commissioner, Delhi and the Returning Officer of the concerned ward, L.G., Delhi, Chief Secretary, Delhi etc. are also made respondents in the EP. which as per above legal provisions and the abovesaid judgment, an election petition can be filed by making only all the aspiring (nominated) candidates at an election to a ward of the DMC and if the above or other officers have been made respondents, these have to be excluded from the array of respondents forthwith.

In the above judgment, it is further clarified by the Hon'ble Court: "A right to elect, fundamental though it is to democracy, is, anomalously enough, neither a fundamental right nor a common Law Right. It is pure and simple, a statutory right. So is the right to be elected. So is the right to dispute an election. Outside of statute, there is no right to elect, no right to be elected and no right to dispute an election. Statutory creations they are, and therefore, subject to statutory limitation. An election petition is not an action at Common Law, nor in equity. It is a statutory proceeding to which neither the common law nor the principles of equity apply but only those rules which the statute makes and applies. It is a special jurisdiction, and a special jurisdiction has always to be exercised in accordance with the statute creating it. Concepts familiar to Common Law and Equity must remain strangers to Election Law unless statutorily embodied.

3.3 Mohinder Singh Gill And another Vs The Chief Election Commissioner. (Supreme Court Of India), Judgment Dated 2.12.1977

Subject: Filing of election petitions against conduct of election to a constituency - regarding.

Powers of Election Commission of India

In this case, some booth capturing was reported at certain polling stations of a constituency but the Election Commission of India had ordered for repoll in the entire constituency instead of certain specified polling stations which is a matter of challenge in this case.

MCD ELECTIONS-2022

Some important extract from the above judgment on the subject cited above

"The Act (Representation of the People Act, 1951 in case of Election Commission of India), provides for only one remedy and that remedy being by an election petition to be presented after the election is over, there is no remedy provided at any of the intermediate stages (Smt. Indira Gandhi Vs Raj Narain).

The compendious expression 'election' commences from the initial notification and culminates in the declaration of the return of a candidate. The paramount policy of the Constitution framers in declaring that no election shall be called in question except the way it is provided for in Art.329(b). The reason for postponement of election litigation to the post-election stage is that elections shall not unduly be protracted or obstructed.

In harmony with this scheme s.100 has been designatedly drafted to embrace all conceivable infirmities which may be urged.

In a democratic set up power has to be exercised in accordance with law. Since the conduct of all elections is vested under Art.324(1 `) in the Election Commission, framers of the Constitution took care to leaving scope for exercise of residuary power by the Election Commission, in the infinite variety of situations that may emerge from time to time. Yet, every contingency could not be foreseen and provided for with prevision. The Commission may be required to cope with some situation, which may not be provided for in the enacted laws and rules. The Election Commission which is a high powered as independent body, cannot exercise its functions or perform its duties unless it has an amplitude of powers. Where a law is absent the Commission is not to look to any external authority for the grant of powers to deal with the situation but must exercise its power independently and see that the election process is completed in a free and fair manner. Moreover, the power has to be exercised with promptitude.

3.4 N.P. Poonuswami vs Returning Officer, Nanakkal Constituency and others.

...The Commission is entitled to exercise certain powers under Art. 324 itself on its own right in an area not covered by the Acts and Rules.

whether an order passed is wrong, arbitrary or is otherwise invalid, relates to the mode of exercising the power and does not touch upon the existence of the power in an authority if it is there either under the Act or the Rules or under Art.324(1).

The contention that the Election Commission had no power to make the impugned order for a re-poll in the entire constituency, is without substance."

P.19 - Secondly, the pregnant problem of power and its responsible exercise is one of the perennial riddles of many a modern constitutional order. Similarly, the periodical process of free and fair elections uninfluenced by the caprice, cowardice or partisanship of hierarchical authority holding it and unintimidated by the threat, tantrum or vandalism of strong arm tactics, exacts the embarrassing price of vigilant monitoring. Democracy digs its grave where passions, tensions and violence, or an overpowering spree, upset result of peaceful polls and the law of elections is guilty of sharp practice if it hastens to legitimate the fruits of lawlessness.

3.5 Civil Appeal No.6790 Of 2013, Supreme Court of India (Election Petition No.14 of 2009) (Dated 26.8.2013) Nand Ram Bagri (Appellant) Versus Jai Kishan & Ors.

Sub: Reg. filing of affidavits for criminal backgrounds etc. of a candidate while filing nomination papers at an election to the Assembly/ parliamentary constituency.

P.39- It is not as if the respondent no.1 in the affidavit represented himself to be having no criminal past; he disclosed three cases pending against him. The case of the petitioner is of non-disclosure of certain other cases. However, all that the petitioner has been able to prove is, the information furnished by the Police Authorities under the RTI Act and the pendency of appeals against acquittal in some cases. However, the requirement under Form 26 is not of disclosure of all FIRs against the candidate but disclosure only of those FIRs in which 'charges have been framed' by the Court'. The petitioner has failed to prove that in the cases pertaining to the FIRs disclosed in response to the RTI query and which the

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respondent no.1 has not disclosed in his affidavit, charges have been framed and / or cognizance had been taken. As far as the pendency of the appeals is concerned, the same are admittedly against the acquittals and which though were under the Press Note dated 28.6.2002 required to be disclosed but are under Rule 4A or Form 26 supra, not required to be disclosed. The petitioner has also failed to prove that the notice of the said appeals had been served on the respondent no.1 prior to the submission of the Nomination Form, Thus, I do not find the petitioner to have prove any falsity, misrepresentation or suppression on this account also.

P.40- It is significant that the requirement is for disclosure of only those cases in which charge is framed or cognizance is taken by the Court of law and not on mere FIR on the basis whereof no charge has been framed or cognizance taken. This position has remained the same since the directions in Association for Democratic Reforms.

We have heard learned counsel for the appellant and carefully scrutinised the record. Learned counsel for the appellant could not advance any tangible argument to question the findings recorded by the learned Single Judge of the High Court. Even otherwise, we are satisfied that the detailed reasons recorded by the learned Single Judge for holding that respondent no.1 was not guilty of violating the spirit of the judgment in Union of India v. Association for Democratic Reforms (supra) or Section 123(2) and (4) of the Act are legally correct and the judgment under challenge does not require interference under Section 116-A of the Act.

With the above observations, the appeal is dismissed. "

3.6 Appeal (Civil) 5756 of 2005 Kishan Singh Tomar Versus Municipal Corporation of The City of Ahmedbad & Ors (Supreme Court of India) (Dated 19.10.2006)

Judgment:

DETAILING POWERS OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSIONS IN HOLDING ELECTIONS TO THE URBAN LOCAL BODIES AND THE PANCHAYAT BODIES ALSO - OBLIGATION UPON GOVERNOR OF THE STATE TO PROVIDE FUNDS, STAFF ETC. FOR HOLDING OF ELECTIONS TO THE SECS -REGARDING. In terms of Article 243K and Article 243 ZA (1) the same powers are vested in the State Election Commission as the Election Commission of India under Article 324. The words in the former provisions are in pari materia with the latter provision.

The words, 'superintendence, direction and control' as well as 'conduct of elections' have been held in the "broadest of terms" by this Court in several decisions including in Re: Special Reference No. 1 of 2002 (200-2) 8 SCC 237 and Mohinder Singh Gill's case (1978) 1 SCC 405 and the question is whether this is equally relevant in respect of the powers of the State Election Commission as well.

From the reading of the said provisions it is clear that the powers of the State Election Commission in respect of conduct of elections is no less than that of the Election Commission of India in their respective domains. These powers are, of course, subject to the law made by Parliament or by State Legislatures provided the same do not encroach upon the plenary powers of the said Election Commissions.;

The State Election Commissions are to function independent of the concerned State Governments in the matter of their powers of superintendence, direction and control of all elections and preparation of electoral rolls for, and the conduct of, all elections to the Panchayats and Municipalities.

Article 243K (3) also recognizes the independent status of the State Election Commission. It States that upon a request made in that behalf the Governor shall make available to the State Election Commission" such staff as may be necessary for the discharge of the functions conferred on the State Election Commission by clause (1). It is accordingly to be noted that in the matter of the conduct of elections, the concerned government shall have to render full assistance and cooperation to the State Election Commission and respect of latter's assessment of the needs in order to ensure that free and fair elections are conducted.

Also, for the independent and effective functioning of the State Election Commission, where it feels that is not receiving the cooperation of the concerned State Government in discharging its constitutional obligation of holding the elections to the Panchayats or Municipalities within the time mandated in the Constitution, it will be open to the "State Election Commission to approach the High Courts, in the first instance, and thereafter the Supreme Court for a writ of mandamus or such other appropriate writ directing the concerned State Government to provide all necessary cooperation and assistance to the State Election Commission to enable the latter to fulfil the constitutional mandate.

Taking into account these factors and applying the principles of golden rule of interpretation, the object and purpose of Article 243-U is to be carried out."

3.7 State of Goa & Anr. Vs. Fouziya Imitaz Shaikh

(in Civil Appeal No.881 of 2021; (2021) 8 SCC 401)

- The State Election commission has to be a person who is independent of the State Government or he is an independent constitutional functionary to oversee the entire election process in the state for Panchayat and Municipalities.
- The importance given to the independence of a State Election Commissioner is explicit from the provisions for removal from his office made in the proviso to Clause (2) of Article 243K.
- In so far as the manner and the ground for his removal from office are concerned, he has been equated with a judge of a High Court.
- Giving an additional charge of such an important and independent constitutional office to an officer directly under the control of the state Government is a mockery of the constitutional mandate.
- It is made clear that hence forth, all State Election Commissioners appointed under 243K in India have to be independent persons who are not occupying any post or office under the control or any state Government.

3.8 Suresh Mahajan Vs. State of Madhya Pradesh & Anr

(in Writ Petition (Civil) No.278 of 2022 (2022 LiveLaw (SC) 463)

- Constitution of India,1950; Article 243E, 243U
 Constitutional Mandate to hold local body elections in time inviolable- Neither the State Election Commission nor the State Government or for that matter the State Legislature, including this Court in exercise of powers under Article 142 of the Constitution of India can countenance dispensation to the contrary.
- Local Body Elections Ongoing activity of delimitation or formation of ward cannot

be a legitimate ground to be set forth by any authority much less the State Election Commission to not discharge its constitutional obligation in notifying the Election programme at the opportune time and to ensure that the elected body is installed before the expiry of 5 (five) years term of the outgoing elected body.

3.9 S. Rukumini Madegowda Vs. The State Election Commission & Ors

(In Civil Appeal No. 6576 Of 2022; (2022 LiveLaw (SC) 766)

- A false declaration with regard to the assets of a candidate, his/her spouse or dependents, constitutes corrupt practice irrespective of the impact of such a false declaration on the election of the candidate. It may be presumed that a false declaration impacts the election.
- The Election Commission has wide powers under Article 324(1) to issue directions necessary for conducting free and fair elections, subject to the contours of law. The power of the Election Commission includes the power to issue directions where the law is silent. The State Election Commission has the same powers under Article 243-K and 243-ZA (1) as the Election Commission of India has under Article 324(1).
- No legal or normative impediment for the State Election Commission to issue directions requiring disclosure of assets of the candidate, his/her spouse and dependent associates by way of affidavit - Purity of election at all levels, be it election to the Union Parliament or a State Legislature or a Municipal Corporation or a Panchayat is a matter of national importance in which a uniform policy is desirable in the interest of all the States.

3.10 Orders of the District Courts, Delhi on Various Election Petitions Filed Under Section 15 of DMC Act, 1957 & Under Rule 91 of DMC Rules, 2012

As per Section 15, no election of a councillor shall be called in question except by an election petition presented to the court of the district judge of Delhi within fifteen days from the date of the publication of the result of the election under section 14.

Rule 91 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012, prescribes that while filing an election petition before the District Judge, Delhi, in connection with election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, the petitioner is required to deposit a sum of Rs.5000/- as security of costs with the Election Commission and the receipt thereof shall have to be deposited with the Election Petition which is to be filed within 15 days of the publication of result of election in the Gazette. In the following cases, the petitioners did not deposit the security of costs and not enclosed the receipt of such deposit with the election petitions so filed before the DJ. Hence, the Hon'ble Court did not allow deposit after the due date and dismissed the election petitions:-

E.P. No. 1/22 Rekha Tyagi vs. Manisha Singh & Ors. 21.01.2023

Hence, in view of the law laid down by Hon'ble High Court and Hon'ble Supreme Court, the application for granting time to deposit the security cost is not maintainable and as the petitioner has failed to deposit the security cost alongwith election petition, the same is not maintainable in view of Rule 91 of Election Rules 2012 and is accordingly dismissed.

EP No. 01/2023 Dr. Komal Vashisht V/s SEC & Ors. 04.02.2023

Apparently, the Court has no discretion in this context to either allow deposit of the security amount or To entertain a petition which is not accompanied by the receipt for the requisite security deposit with the concerned authority. In this context, reference can also be made to the following Judgments :

Charan Lal Sahu vs. Nandkishore Bhatt & Ors., Civil Appeal No. 2411 of 1972, decided on 01.08.1973 of Hon'bleSupreme Court of India. In view of the discussions made above, it is evident that the petition filed on behalf of the petitioner is hit by limitation as it has been filed beyond the prescribed period as prescribed in Section 15 of Delhi Municipal Corporation Act. Not only that the relevant receipt of the security deposit has also not been annexed with the same and, therefore, in view of Rule 99 of the Rules and Section 15 of Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, the present petition is not maintainable. Accordingly, the same stands dismissed. File be consigned to Record Room.

Section 15 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957, prescribes that in the Election Petitions filed before the District Judge, Delhi in connection with elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, the petitioner shall join all the candidates nominated for election to a ward of the Corporation and no other officer or authority viz. the State Election Commissioner or the Returning Officer. In the following election petitions, the Hon'ble Court has ordered deletion of the names of the State Election Commissioner and the Returning Officer:-

EP No. 01/22 Pooja Dhondiyal Sharma Vs. State & Ors. 04.01.2023

Sh.Naveen Grover, counsel for the respondent no.

2 submits that he is not a necessary party to the present petition. He further submits that in view of the law laid down in B. Sundra Rama Reddy Vs. Election Commission of India & Ors. bearing Special Leave Petition (C) No.2127/91 dated 18.02.1991, respondent no.2 be deleted from the array of memo of parties.

Heard. Allowed, as prayed for.

Let amended memo of parties be filed.

EP No. 02/22 Naresh Vs. State Election Commission & Ors 04.01.2023

Sh. Grover, Counsel for respondents no.1, 3 and 4 submits that Election Commission is not a necessary party and has relied upon law laid down in B. Sundra Rami Reddy Vs. Election Commission of India & Ors. Civil Appellate Jurisdiction Special Leave Petition (C) No. 2127/91 dated 18.02.1991. Sh. Sharma on instructions from petitioner submits that respondents no. 1, 3 and 4 be deleted from array of respondents subject to just exceptions. Let amended memo of parties be filed within one week from today.

Delimitation of MCD Wards



Delimitation of MCD Wards

As per provisions of section 3 and 5 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 (as amended till date), the powers of the Central Government for delimitation of wards in MCD were delegated to the Lt. Governor of Delhi. Accordingly, the first delimitation of wards subsequent to the creation of the State Election Commission for Delhi, took place in 1993 on the basis of provisional census figures for 1991 (as final figures of population were not available at that time). No. of seats for scheduled castes was fixed as 25 out of 134, 9 seats of out of 25 were allotted to scheduled castes women and 37 seats were allotted to women of general category. The L.G. Delhi, first notified draft delimitation order and later final order after dealing with objections and suggestions received during the specified period, was issued on 30.12.1993.

The powers of the Central Government under section 3 & 5 of the DMC Act, 1957, for reservation of wards for specified categories, were delegated to the State Election Commissioner of Delhi. The order for reservation of seats in MCD for the specified categories and specified numbers was issued by the SEC on 23.3.1994. This order was prepared and issued for the initial and 5 successive terms i.e. for 30 years to ensure rotation of reservation of seats for each category at the successive stages of general elections. But this order was challenged in the High Court of Delhi in 1994 and the Hon'ble High Court pronounced its judgment agreeing reservations for only first term i.e. for election to be held immediately after announcement of the judgment. As such, the first general to MCD under the auspices of this Commission took place on 24th February, 1997.

The reservation of seats order was to be rotated for the next general election due in 2002 but the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs who enjoyed the powers for reservation of seats (although these were delegated to L.G. Delhi), froze to effect rotation of seats for 2002 election and election to M.C.D. were held on the basis of reservation of seats done on 23.3.94.In pursuance

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
to enactment of 'Delimitation Act, 2002' and its subsequent amendment in 2003, a Delimitation Commission was constituted by the Government of India with the following members :-

Justice Shri Kuldip Singh, a retired judge of the Supreme Court of India as its Chairman, Chief Election Commissioner or an Election Commissioner nominated by him, ex officio and State Election Commissioner of each State (for delimitation work in his State), ex officio as Members, to conduct delimitation of Parliamentary and Assembly constituencies in all the States and U.Ts.

The work of delimitation of parliamentary and assembly constituencies was completed in respect of N.C.T. of Delhi on the basis of Census figures for 2001 and final notification after disposal of objections and suggestions, was issued on 20.9.2006.

It will be significant to note that in NCT of Delhi, there are 7 Parliamentary Constituencies and 70 Assembly Constituencies (one parliamentary constituency comprises of 10 assembly constituencies). Only two Assembly constituencies fall in the areas of New Delhi Municipal Council and the Delhi Cantt. Board and all the 68 remaining Assembly constituencies fall within the jurisdiction of the M.C.D. As 68 assembly constituencies can not be equally divided into 134 wards, a proposal was initiated to increase the number of wards from 134 to 136. However, since it required amendment in the relevant provisions of the DMC Act, 1957 and it would have entailed a longer period to effect the amendment, the proposal for increase of number of wards was dropped.

The present term of M.C.D. was going to expire in March, 2007 and as such, there was not sufficient time available for delimitation and reservation of wards within the stipulated period, the delimitation of wards was started to form 134 wards, broadly dividing each Assembly constituency into two wards as far as practicable.



The Lt. Governor of Delhi, constituted a Delimitation Committee for delimitation of wards comprising of the following members: -

- State Election Commissioner as Chairman of the Committee
- An Addl. Commissioner of M.C.D. as Member
- A Joint Secretary of Delhi Government, Urban Dev. Deptt. as Member

Besides, 5 M.L.As and 5 Municipal Councillors were also appointed as "Associate Members" to assist the above said Committee in its task. The functions of the Committee right from the beginning till final order of Delimitation of Wards is issued, are enshrined in the Delhi Government Notification No.7(367)(8)/2002/UD/4593 dated 5.7.2006.

Meanwhile, an amendment was made in the DMC Act, 1957 to provide for a minimum number of wards as 272 and maximum of 300. The Committee prepared Draft Order for Delimitation of Wards for 272 wards i.e. to say that each Assembly constituency which was bifurcated into two wards, shall now have four wards in each constituency and notified it on 17th January, 2007, inviting suggestions and objections from the Public and Political Parties, etc.

The final order was issued on 7th February, 2007. Under the delegated powers of the Central

Government, the Lt. Governor of Delhi is competent to delimit the wards and to fix number of seats reserved for scheduled castes and for general women whereas powers to reserve seats for specified categories were vested with the State Election Commissioner. The SEC issued the order for reservation of wards on 17th February, 2007 which was challenged in the High Court of Delhi.

Even if there was very short time to deal with the writ petition yet the Hon'ble High Court agreed with the revised proposal of this Commission for reservation of wards and final order was notified on 6th March, 2007.

In December, 2011, the parliament passed 'The Delhi Municipal Corporation (Amendment) Act, 2011 (Delhi Act 12 of 2011)'. By said amendment act, instead of one three Municipal Corporations were provided for. Sub-section 1 of section 3 of DMC Act, 1957 provided that the name, area and limits of the three Corporations established under the said provision shall be as per Fourteenth Schedule. Sub-section 6 of section 3 as amended, provided that upon completion of each census after the establishment of Corporation, the number of seats shall be on the basis of the population of the area of the Corporation as ascertained at that census and shall be determined by the Central Government by

notification in the Official Gazette and the number of seats to be reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes shall, as nearly as may be, bear the same ratio to the total number of seats as the population of Scheduled Castes bears to the total population of Delhi. Sub-sections 7 & 8 of section 3 were amended to provide for reservation of seats for women which shall not be less than one half of the total number of seats reserved for scheduled castes or as the case may be, the seats other than those reserved for scheduled castes.

As per Notification of the Central Government, MHA, dated 19.10.1966, referred to above, the powers to delimit the wards for three Corporations vested with the L.G., Delhi. With approval of the L.G. Delhi, the Govt. of Delhi, had issued an order No.F.7(55)/ DLB/2015/Pt.1/4276-821 dated 18.9.2015 assigning the delimitation of wards of three Corporations with reference to Data of Census 2011, to the State Election Commission of N.C.T. Delhi. A total number of 272 wards were split up vide Fourteenth schedule annexed to DMC Act, 2011, into three Corporations having 104 wards in North Delhi, 104 wards in South Delhi and 64 wards in East Delhi Corporation.

After completing the entire process, the final Delimitation Order was signed by the L.G., Delhi, on 13.1.2017 and issued the same day. General Election to 272 wards of three Corporations was held on 23rd April, 2017.

The General Elections to the three MCDs were due in April, 2022. However, as the Government indicated its intention to make amendments to the DMC Act, 1957 to provide for unification of the then three Municipal Corporations of Delhi i.e. North Delhi Municipal Corporation, East Delhi Municipal Corporation & South Delhi Municipal Corporation, the said elections were deferred.

Thereafter the Parliament enacted Delhi Municipal Corporation (Amendment) Act, 2022 (10) of 2022 and notified in the Gazette of India on 18th April, 2022. The said Act has come into force w.e.f. 22nd May, 2022 vide notification dated 18th May, 2022 issued by the Central Government. As per the amendments vide said Act, the powers to delimit the wards for a unified single Corporation of Delhi and reservation of wards for specified categories of persons vest with the 'Central Government'. Further, the Act provided that the total number of seats of the Councillors and those to be reserved for Scheduled Castes shall be determined by the Central Government. Provided further that, the total number of seats in the Corporations shall not be more than 250.

In exercise of powers conferred by section 3, 3A and 5 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957, the Central Government, vide order dated 08.07.2022, constituted a Committee comprising of the following members to assist the Central Government in carrying out the Delimitation of Wards and other functions incidental or related thereto: -

- Shri Vijay Dev, State Election Commissioner, National Capital Territory of Delhi- Chairman;
- Shri Pankaj Kumar Singh, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, Government of India – Member;
- Shri Randhir Sahay, Additional Commissioner, Delhi Municipal Corporation—Member.

The said Committee was required to complete the above-mentioned exercise and submit its report within four months of date of the issue of the said letter.

The above Committee held its first meeting on 12.07.2022 and noted that during the process of previous delimitation of wards, the Government had conveyed the following to the Committee: -

- a) Number of seats for which delimitation of wards was to be done.
- b) Number of seats to be reserved for SCs.
- c) Detailed guidelines & methodology to be adopted for the process of Delimitation.
- c) The relevant census data which would form the basis for delimitation of wards.

The Committee also stressed the need of strengthening of IT and allied infrastructure in the office of SEC, Manpower assistance and Member Secretary of the Committee. Accordingly, the Committee wrote a letter dated 12th July, 2022 to the Central Government intimating that the Committee has conducted a meeting to find out the modalities for accomplishment of the Delimitation of wards. The Committee sought clarification and order of the Central Government on the following points to enable the Committee to proceed further in the matter:-

- 1. Number of wards to be delimited and the number of wards to be reserved for Scheduled Castes persons.
- 2. Guidelines for doing delimitation of wards

3. Adoption of census data for 2011 (latest census)

Subsequently, the Central Government vide letter dated 22.07.2022 intimated that the total number of municipal wards to be delimited shall be 250 and that the reservation of seats for scheduled castes shall be determined as per the provisions of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 based on Census data of 2011. The guidelines to be followed were also intimated. A copy of the said letter dated 22.07.2022 alongwith the Guidelines is enclosed herewith as **Annexure I.**

Having regard to the above guidelines, the Office of the Registrar General of India and Census Commissioner was requested to provide census figures for 2011 in terms of Wards/EBs along with Scheduled Castes population details. The said office was also requested to provide the maps of wards and along with Enumeration Blocks maps. Based on the statutory provisions of DMC Act 1957 and SC population, the Central Government notified the total number of wards at 250 and 42 seats as reserved for SC.

The population figures based on 2011 census were provided by the Office of the RGI, which were used to work out the Assembly Constituencies-wise population figures along with Scheduled Castes population. The said assembly-wise population was taken as the base for allocation of seats to each Assembly Constituencies comprised within the MCD's areas. The total population 1,64,18,663 of Delhi (excluding the population of NDMC and Delhi Cantt. Areas) was divided by 250 to obtain the average population of a ward in Delhi. This worked out to be 65,675. Thereafter, the population of each AC was divided by 65,675 to obtain allocation of seats in each Assembly Constituency. For this purpose, 10% plus/10% minus which is permissible under the guidelines was kept in view. Further as per guidelines, a minimum of 3 wards were provided for each AC. Thereafter, the delimitation of each AC was taken up having regard to the guidelines. Each assembly constituency was delimited into such number of wards as were allocated to it. After each AC was delimited into the wards the corresponding maps were also prepared. After doing this exercise in respect to all the 68 ACs, a consolidated map was prepared. Thereafter, the ward numbering was done starting from AC-1 to AC-70 (except ACs-38 Area of Delhi Cantt & 40 New Delhi). In the said whole process, the instructions were obtained

from the Committee on various aspects from time to time. Thereafter the draft proposal was placed before the Committee for its consideration. The Committee deliberated upon the various aspects involved in preparation of the said draft proposal and submitted its report to the Central Government on 25.08.2022.

The Central Government after careful consideration of all aspects published the Draft Delimitation-2022 in respect of 250 seats of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi as under: -

- 1. Wards Summary of population
- 2. Ward wise Enumerated Block (EB) extents and localities
- 3. Detailed Assembly Constituency (AC) Wise EB Extent and localities
- 4. Draft Maps of Individual 250 wards
- 5. Consolidated map of all 250 wards with Assembly Constituencies (ACs)

General public, Political parties etc. were requested to file their suggestions/ objections, if any, in respect of the said Draft Delimition-2022 to the Delimitation Committee at the following address:-

The above draft Delimitation-2022 is uploaded on the website of the Commission:

Accordingly, the Delimitation Committee issued a public notice that the Draft Delimitation Order as approved by the Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India has been put on the State Election Commission's website **"sec.delhi.gov.in"** and requested all the political parties, aspiring candidates for the General Election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi and the general public to visit the aforesaid website and view the details of proposed delimited wards with the request to send the objections/suggestions, if any, to the Delimitation Committee latest by **3rd October, 2022, 5:00 pm.** The said public notice was published in newspapers of English, Hindi, Urdu and Punjabi.

In response to the above notice, about 1730 suggestions / objections were received from

the Political Parties, aspiring candidates and general public. The said suggestions / objections were carefully considered by the Committee in consultation with the Central Government and the draft delimitation order for wards of Municipal Corporation of Delhi was amended wherever required, feasible and justified on reasonable grounds. The Committee sent the final proposals to the Central Government on **13th October**, **2022.** The Central Government, after careful consideration of all aspects, determined the extent of each of 250 wards as comprised within the Municipal Corporation of Delhi and notified the



Final Delimitation Order-2022 on **17th October**, **2022.** A copy of the ward-wise summary of the said order is enclosed herewith as **Annexure II.**

BACKGROUND NOTE

Elections to the Municipal Corporations of Delhi are being conducted under the provisions of the DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION ACT, 1957 (as amended from time to time). Under the provision of section 3(6) of the said Act, wards of the Corporations have to be delimited a new on completion of each Census (which takes place after every 10 years). As per provisions of section 3 (5), (6), (7) and (8) and section 5(2)(c) (d) and (e) of the DMC Act, 1957, the wards so delimited, have to be reserved for four categories viz. scheduled castes, scheduled caste women, only women and the general category. Total population of wards assigned to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi has to be divided by the SCs population and a ratio is obtained. On the basis of this ratio, the number of SC seats is arrived at.

Initially in 1993, when there were 134 wards and quota for SC women was 1/3 out of total SC seats and likewise, number of seats for only women was also fixed as 1/3rd of the balance number of seats (after deduction of SC seats), there were 25 seats for SCs (out of this number 9 seat were reserved for SC women) and 37 seats were reserved only for women as 1/3 of the balance seats). The number of total seats in the Corporation was increased to 272 by amending the Act, in 2007.

As per amendment made in the Act in December, 2011, the total seats were 272 but ratio of reservation of seats for SCs and women was increased to <u>not less than</u> 50% from 1/3rd of total seats and three Corporations were constituted in place of one in the names of North Delhi, South Delhi and East Delhi Municipal Corporations in 2011. Accordingly, as per ratio of SC population with the total population (Census 2011) 20 seats for SCs allocated to North Delhi MC, 15 to South Delhi MC and 11 to East Delhi M.C. Out of this allotment, not less than 50% were to be reserved for SC women and only women. As such, 10 seats in North Delhi, 8 seats in South Delhi and 6 seats in East Delhi M.C. were allotted to

SCWs. Likewise, out of the remaining seats in each Corporation, 42 seats out of 84 balance seats in North Delhi MC, 45 seats in South Delhi MC and 27 seats in East Delhi M.C. were assigned to 'women' category and balance left for General category.

The reservation of seats was done in 2017 on the basis of highest % of S.C. population firstly in Assembly Constituency & then the wards with highest S.C. population in the relevant AC. It was also decided that not more than 2 wards in one AC should be reserved.

In 2022, as no census took place in 2021, Reservation orders for 2022 for general election to three Municipal Corporations of Delhi was issued on 25/01/2022. However, consequent to the major amendments made in the DMC Act, 1957 viz. three Corporations were unified into single Corporation and that general election to the newly formed single Corporation would only be held after delimitation of wards is completed. Meanwhile, the total number of seats was also reduced from 272 to 250 wards. It may be pertinent to note that the earlier powers delegated to the L.G., Delhi (for delimitation of wards) and to the State Election Commission (for reservation of wards) were withdrawn and reverted back to the Central Government (MHA) VIDE amendment made on 18.4.2022 (and made effective w.e.f. 22.5.22, the day on which the terms of 5 years of the existing three Corporations were expired).

As per provision of section 5(2)(e), the manner to rotate reservation of wards was not defined. Hence, on each occasion (on delimitation of wards taking 10 years and on conduct of elections every 5 years, the wards have to be reserved by rotation criteria. As such, the method of rotation and reservation was different on each occasion as the reservation of seats was to be rotated to new wards which is explained as under:-

6.1 RESERVATION IN 1994

134 wards were divided in 4 groups of 32 wards each (total 128) and 5th group was formed for 6 wards only. Odd number wards were kept unreserved. First even number ward in each group was also kept unreserved. Out of even number wards of each group, 2,4,6,7,9,11,12,14,16 wards were reserved for women. Remaining even number wards in all groups were reserved for S.Cs. Out of all wards reserved for SCs, first and thereafter every third ward was reserved for SCW. The whole method and details for reservation of wards is contained in Commission's notification dated 21.9.95.

6.2 RESERVATION IN 2001

No reservation or rotation of seats took place in 2001 for elections to be held in 2002 as per Notification dated 27.11.2001 issued by the Central Govt., MHA which had freezed the process for reservation and rotation of seats for 2002 elections till next delimitation of wards would have taken place.

6.3 RESERVATION IN 2007

A list of 272 wards was prepared in sequence with descending order of percentage of scheduled caste population (on ratio based on total population divided by SC population). This list was prepared also in terms of the Assembly constituencies in which the wards were located. 2 wards in every assembly constituency were to be reserved for SCs. As such, 15 ACs will have 2 seats for SCs. The first of these 2 seats in each AC will be reserved for scheduled caste woman. 16th seat to go to SCW will be falling in the last AC have only one SC seat. Every 3rd seat out of 226 balance seats (unreserved) will be reserved for SCW to go to ward 271 and 76 seats for SCW to go to ward 272 Sonia Vihar.

6.4 RESERVATION IN 2012

There were three Corporations in Delhi each having 104 wards in North Delhi MC, 104 wards in South Delhi MC and 64 wards in East Delhi MC. Out of these numbers, 20 seats were allocated to North Delhi, 15 to South Delhi and 11 to East Delhi M.C. for scheduled Castes category. Out of these numbers, 10 wards in North Delhi, 8 wards in South Delhi and 6 wards in East Delhi MC were allocated for scheduled castes women being not less than 50% of the total seats allocated for SC category. Out of remaining 84 seats in North Delhi, 89 in South

Delhi and 53 in East Delhi MC were left unreserved. Out of these numbers, 42 seats were allocated for women in North Delhi, 45 in South Delhi and 27 in East Delhi MC. And balance number of seats viz. 42,44 and 26 were kept for General category respectively for each of the three Corporations. The method adopted for reservation of seats was that out of 26 Assembly constituencies in North Delhi, 20 were selected with highest percentage (in descending order) of scheduled castes in North Delhi, 15 in South Delhi MC and 11 in East Delhi M.Cs. Out of these selected A.Cs, the first ward with highest SC population was selected and reserved for SCs and so on in all the three Corporations. These selected wards were then taken in sequence and No.1,3,5 and so on were reserved for SCW and those falling in No.2,4,6 and so on were reserved for SCs in every Corporation. Thereafter, a list of wards in sequence minus those reserved for SC category, was prepared and wards falling at s.no. 1,3,5 and so on were reserved for Women category and remaining falling on numbers 2,4,6 and so on were assigned to the General Category.

6.5 RESERVATION IN 2017

All the 272 wards of three Municipal Corporations of Delhi, were delimited on the basis of Census 2011 vide L.G's order dated 13.1.2017. A list of wards with highest percentage of SC population was prepared in each of the three Municipal Corporations. First 20 wards on top were taken for SC category in North Delhi, 15 in South Delhi and 11 in East Delhi M.C. Out of these numbers, 10 wards for SC women category were reserved in North Delhi, 8 in South Delhi and 6 in East Delhi M.C. on the basis of number of wards in each list from top to bottom falling at sequence of 1,3,5 and so on and those falling at number 2,4,6 and so on for Scheduled Castes. The quota of reservation is 'not less than 50% of the total SC seats. Out of the remaining number of seats, the wards were taken in sequence in each Corporation and those falling at sequence of 1,3,5 & so on were reserved for 'women' category and those falling at no. 2,4,6 & so on went to General category.

6.6 RESERVATION IN 2022 (JANUARY-2022)

For reservation of 272 wards for three Corporations and complying to the legal provisions for rotation of reservation of seats, the fixed number of wards i.e. 20 for North Delhi, 15 for South Delhi and 11 for East Delhi M.C. reserved for scheduled castes category in 2017, were excluded and out of the remaining wards, the wards with highest percentage of scheduled castes population next to the last ward reserved in 2017 were taken and reserved for elections (to be held) in 2022. After deducting these reserved wards, in the remaining list of wards in sequence was prepared, the reservation status given in 2017 was reversed i.e. the wards reserved for women category were now reserved for General category and vice versa.

6.7 RESERVATION IN 2022 (OCTOBER -2022)

The Central Government, MHA, has unified three Municipal Corporations of Delhi into a single Corporation under the Delhi Municipal Corporation Amendment Act, 2022. notifying the same in the Gazette on 18.5.2022 (made effective w.e.f. 22.5.2022). The single Corporation shall have 250 wards. It is also ordered by the Central Government, MHA, that 250 wards shall be delimited on the basis of 2011 Census (as no Census took place in 2021 due to COVID 19. After completing all processes, publication of draft Delimitation Order for inviting objections etc., disposal of all objections and the final Delimitation Order was issued by the Central Government, MHA on 17.10.2022.

On the basis of Final Delimitation Order, the reservation of wards for specified categories viz. Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Castes women, only women and the general category, was to be done as per provisions of section 3 and 5 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended, by the 'Central Government' MHA. The Central Government had delegated its powers in this behalf to the State Election Commission of NCT of Delhi vide their notification F.No.14011/04/2022-Delhi II dated the 17th October, 2022 and directed the State Election Commission for reservation of wards. Accordingly, the Commission had formulated its proposal for reservation of wards as under: -

 The number of wards to be reserved for scheduled castes category was to be ascertained on the basis of ratio to the total number of seats as the population of Scheduled Castes bears to the total population of Delhi. Thus, the total number of seats to be reserved for scheduled castes category came to 42. As the total number of seats to be reserved for scheduled castes women should not be less than one half of the total number of seats as provided in sub-section (7) of section 3 of the DMC Act, 1957, 21 seats were kept reserved for SC Women out of 42. The seats to be reserved for only women has to be ascertained on the basis of one half of the total number of seats other than those reserved for scheduled castes category. The number of such seats came as 104 out of 208 seats left.

The reservation of seats was done on the following basis: -

i) A list of 250 wards showing also the relevant Assembly constituency, was prepared with percentage of scheduled castes persons in descending order and 42 wards were reserved for persons belonging to Scheduled Caste category on the basis of highest percentage of scheduled castes population in those wards. A list of such selected 42 wards was then prepared. Out of the aforesaid list of 42 wards reserved for persons belonging to scheduled castes category, not less than 21 wards have to be reserved for Scheduled Caste Women. The list of 42 wards is arranged in sequence of ascending wards numbers. 21 Wards falling in sequence number 1,3,5 and so on, of this ascending ward number list are reserved for 'women belonging to Scheduled Castes'. The remaining 21 wards falling in sequence number 2,4,6 and so on of ascending ward number list were reserved for persons belonging to 'Scheduled Castes' category.

ii) Out of the list of number of wards in serial order, other than those reserved for scheduled castes category of persons, 104 wards were taken for 'women' category on the basis of ward numbers falling in sequence of 1,3,5 and so on and those falling in this list in sequence of 2,4,6 and so on were taken out for 'general' category.

The final order for reservation of wards for the Corporation was prepared and notified on 20.10.22 vide No.F.4(307)/SEC/LAW/2022/163. **Annexure III** (Comprising of Annexure A -Statement of 42 Wards Showing Percentage of SC Population In Descending Order and Annexure B - Statement Showing Category of Status of 250 Wards).

Delhi High Court Judgements on Reservation Orders of State Election Commission

All Cases Decided In Favour of The State Election Commission particularly the Manner of Reservation Adopted – Extracts of Judgments: -

Legal Provisions

Section 5 (2) (e) of the DMC ACT, 1957 **As Amended Till Date**

"The Central Government formerly it was the State Election Commission, Delhi to whom the powers to reserve the wards by rotation was delegated initially by the Govt. of India, MHA and later by amendment in the Act in 2011, the words 'Central Government' were substituted by the words 'Government of Delhi' as then powers were delegated by Government of Delhi to the State Election Commission who shall, by order in the Official Gazette, determine the manner in which seats shall be rotated under sub-section (6) and (8) of section 3."

Reservation orders for seats in the Municipal Corporation were challenged every time in the High Court of Delhi – The Hon'ble Court had been accepting the Reservation Orders all the time. In Regard to the Manner of Reservation Adopted by The Commission every time, The Hon'ble Court had Categorically accepted that as no manner has been Defined in the Law. Hence the manner adopted by SEC is accepted with the following comments in each case: -

In 1995 – In Case 'Hem Raj Arya and Ors. Vs. Election Commission, Delhi.

"Para (14) – We are of the view that since no malafides on the part of the respondents have been pleaded or proved in adopting the stated method of reservation of seats, it is not for this court to go into the minute details of the manner of reservation particularly when the Court is neither conceived with any statutory formula which had to be applied to test the correctness of the method adopted nor any precise fool proof mathematical formula can be spelt out for the said purpose. The method adopted for reservation of wards cannot be struck

down merely because another method would be more fairer, scientific or logical. The court should interfere only if the impugned action is patently arbitrary, unconsciously unfair, discriminatory or malafide, which as already noted, is neither pleaded nor proved. In that view of the matter we do not find any ground to interfere. There is no merit in the petition and the same is accordingly dismissed. No costs."

IN 2002: The Central Government, MHA, vide Notification No.F.13(14)/2001/UD dated 27.11.2001, freezed the rotation and reservation of wards for 2002 elections.

In 2007 – In WP(C) 1331/2007 – Remesh Dutta & Ors. Vs Sec.

In para 38 - "Accordingly, I hold that these writ petitions are maintainable. I also hold that there is no statutory requirement for disclosing the manner of allotment of seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes or women in the notifications issued under section 5(2) of the DMC Act. However, such a manner must be discernible from the records of the Central Government (including its delegates). The manner must be reasonable and not arbitrary or discriminatory or mala fide. The manner indicated in the present case of identifying seats reserved for scheduled castes based on the twin criteria of ranking seats in decreasing proportion of population and limiting them to not more than two per assembly constituency cannot be interfered with as it is neither arbitrary nor discriminatory or malafide. Even the criterion of allotting every third seat from the list of wards arranged as per the serial numbers of the wards for women cannot be questioned."

In 2012 - in WP (C) 771/2012 Vikas Vs SEC & Others - the Hon'ble Court had rejected all the pleas of the petitioners with the remarks "we find nothing wrong with the action of the SEC qua the mode and manner of reservation of seats for the SC and the women and, thus, dismiss the writ petitions leaving the parties to bear their own costs."

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IN 2017 – W.P.NO.(C) 1291/2017 – We the Citizens through its Secretary Vs. Union of India & Ors (Including Sec, Delhi).

In para 51 – "In view of the aforesaid position, we do not find any merit in the present writ petition for we find that the SEC has followed a rational criterion in the de-limitation exercise in reservation of wads for the Scheduled Caste population as well as for women candidates in both General wards and wards reserved for Scheduled Castes. The criterion adopted is after wide consultation and discussion with the stakeholders including political parties and members of the public. There is no violation of the principle of rotation of seats as stipulated in subsection (6) and (8) of Section 3 and sub-section (2) of the Act and Article 243T of the Constitution."

In 2022 – In W.P.(C) 1892/2022 & CM Appls 5458-59/2022 – Pankaj Sharma Vs Sec Delhi & WP (C) 2027/2022 & CM Appl 5791-92/2022 – Manoj Kumar Vs Sec Delhi.

Paras 45 & 46. - Para 45 "The Division Bench observed in "We The Citizens Through its Secretary" (supra), that it is not for the Courts to interfere with the criteria adopted by the competent authority in this regard. Since, there is no prohibition in law pointed out by the petitioners to the implementation of the policy of rotation, the challenge raised by the petitioners is bound to fail., Pertinently, the petitioners have not been able to point out any arbitrariness or lack of application of mind on the part of the SEC, either in the manner of determination of the number of reserved seats for Scheduled Castes or women candidates- which is based on the latest Census figures available (since no Census was conducted in 2021 due to the pandemic), or in the matter of identification of the seats/wards which may be reserved for the Scheduled Caste/women candidates.

Para 46 – "We may also take note of the observations made by the Division Bench in para -40 of the aforesaid decision, which reads as follows: -

"40. However, it would be for the authorities to consider notifying the method or manner of rotation of seats in terms of clause (e) to Section 5(2), when they carry out a delimitation exercise and issue a notification for reservations of the wards/seats for Scheduled Castes as well as women candidates. If the manner and method of rotation is specified it would possibly prevent disputes and controversies of this nature and would ensure that there is proper rotation of reserved seats, which should be encouraged and is required under Article 243T as well as sub-sections (6) and (8) to Section 3 and, Section 5 (2) of the Act. The method indicated is not final and can be always modified and changed, if required, as is permitted and allowed by Section 6 of the Act."

It may be seen from above that the Hon'ble Courts have admitted that though the provision for rotation of seats exists in the Constitution as well as in the DMC Act, 1957 (as amended) yet the manner for rotation of reservation of seats has not been prescribed. It has been left to the authorities concerned as authorized under the election law or powers delegated by the concerned authorities. The Hon'ble Courts, however, emphasized that the criteria adopted should be transparent, fair, not arbitrary, mala fide, discriminatory and leaves no chance for pick and chose the wards for such reservation which may prove favour to a person or persons.





Preparation of Electoral Rolls



Preparation of Electoral Rolls

Electoral Rolls for Elections to The Municipal Corporation of Delhi

Section 7E of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 (as amended till date) provides that electoral rolls for elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, have to be prepared by the State Election Commission under the provisions of the aforesaid Act and the rules made there under namely "Delhi Municipal Corporation (Preparation of Electoral Roll) Rules, 1975 as notified by the Administrator of Delhi vide Notification No.F.2(30)/73-LSG dated the 19th March, 1975. It is also provided in section 7E ibid that the Election Commission can also adopt the electoral rolls of Assembly Constituencies as are in force for the time being, for elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi. As such, since first general election to the MCD held on 24.2.1997, this Commission has been adopting the electoral rolls of Assembly constituencies for use in the elections to the MCD

Rule 27 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Preparation of Electoral Roll) Rules, 1975, provides "Adoption of Electoral Rolls of Assembly Constituencies:-Notwithstanding anything contained in these rules it shall not be necessary to prepare afresh or revise the roll of a ward before a General Election to the Municipal Corporation or a bye-election thereto from a ward if an order under the proviso to Section 7E as made by the Election Commissioner directing the adoption of the Electoral Roll of the Assembly Constituency for the time being in force as relates to the ward or wards and the roll so adopted in pursuance of the said order shall be deemed to have been prepared afresh or revised and finally published in accordance with the provision of these rules."

Section 7G(3) of the DMC Act, 1957, provides "No amendment, transposition or deletion of any entry shall be made in the electoral roll prepared by the Commission or in the electoral rolls of Assembly constituencies adopted by the Commission, as the case may be, can be made after the last date for making nominations for an election in that ward and before the completion of that election"

As a regular practice, the Election Commission of

India directs for annual revision of electoral rolls with reference to the 1st January of the year in which the rolls are revised, to be undertaken by the Chief Electoral Officer, Govt. of Delhi (for NCT of Delhi) commencing from November to January next year (the year for which the rolls are revised). As such, these rolls are adopted by the Commission for elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, The adoption is done well before the elections which could be utilized for the upcoming elections and that the intending candidates could get the rolls and certified copy of relevant extracts to enable them to file the same with their nomination papers to prove that they stand voters in the current electoral roll. On every occasion of an election to MCD, the Chief Electoral Officer is requested to arrange supply of electoral rolls revised for the current year. However, CEO is also advised to arrange supply of supplements containing additions etc. in the electoral roll as per applications received under section 22 and 23 of the Representation of the People Act, 1950 which pour with the concerned Electoral Registration Officers throughout the year. It is also intimated to CEO that the Commission will accept such supplements only upto the last date for filing nominations for elections to the MCD.

It may be clarified that since the inception of the Commission in 1993, the electoral rolls of Assembly constituencies in Delhi are being adopted by the Commission for use in elections to the MCD and no difficulty or problem has never arisen in this context. These adopted electoral rolls are first bifurcated into relevant wards as per orders of Delimitation of Wards (latest), soft copies of each ward prepared and used by the Returning Officers of the wards for the elections and also sold to the intending candidates and the general public.

The SEC adopted Electoral Roll of Assembly Constituencies of Delhi for use in MCD general elections, 2022 vide Nofification No. F4(2)/SEC/ LAW/2022/7240 Dt. 19/10/2022. (Annexure-IV)



Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order MCD ELECTIONS-2022



Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order

ELECTIONS TO THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF DELHI -ALLOTMENT OF SYMBOLS TO THE CONTESTING CANDIDATES -PROVISIONS OF RULE 15 OF THE DELHI MUNICIPAL CORPORATION (ELECTION OF COUNCILLORS) RULES, 2012.

The symbols are allotted to the contesting candidates in accordance with the provisions of Rule 15 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 and the Symbol Order issued by the Election Commission from time to time - the latest being notified vide No.F.4(1)/OSD/ legal/SEC/2022/7492 dated the 2nd November, 2022. Rule 15 reads as under:-

"Rule 15 - Symbols.-(1) For the purpose of election to Municipal Corporation of Delhi, the National parties and State parties for the National Capital Territory of Delhi, as are recognized for the time being by the Election Commission of India in the National Capital Territory of Delhi, under section 29A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 and the rules and procedure made there under, shall be recognized as such by the Commission. The Commission shall recognize the parties and adopt symbols subject to the following conditions, namely:-

- a) The National Parties and the State Parties recognized by the Election Commission of India shall be recognized under the very same name by the Commission.
- b) The National Parties and the State Parties recognized by the Election Commission of India shall use only those very symbols which are reserved for them by the Election Commission of India and not any other symbol, and
- c) The facsimiles of the symbols thus allowed shall not be different from the facsimiles prescribed and recognized by the Election Commission of India.
- 2) A candidate shall be deemed to have been set up by a political party only if the candidate

has made a declaration to that effect in the nomination paper first filed by him and duly supported by all authorized to such effect by the party concerned.

- 3) The Commission shall also adopt free symbols as have been notified by the Election Commission of India for the time being in respect of elections to Lok Sabha and Legislative Assembly for the National Capital Territory of Delhi.
- 4) The Commission shall specify by notification in the official Gazette, the symbols that may be chosen by candidates and the restrictions to which their choice shall be subject.
- 5) Where at any such election, more nomination papers than one are delivered by or on behalf of a candidate, the declaration as to symbols, made in the nomination paper first delivered, and no other declaration as to symbols, shall be taken into consideration under rule 24 even if that nomination paper has been rejected.
- 6) A failure to complete, or a defect in completing the declaration as to symbols in a nomination paper shall not be deemed to be a defect of a substantial character within the meaning of sub-rule (4) of rule 22."

The Symbol Order is prepared as per above provisions and issued on every occasion the latest being on 2.11.2022 which is enclosed as **ANNEXURE-V**

A copy of the final Symbol Order is dispatched to all National and State Political Parties as are recognized by the Election Commission of India (latest symbol order of ECI is utilized for the purpose) so that State Political Parties outside Delhi (in other States and UTs) may also be able to participate in elections to the MCD if they so intend. Every State Party if it intends to field their candidates for MCD election, has to inform the Election Commission, NCT of Delhi within 3 days of issue of notification for calling upon the electorates of the wards to elect councillors and only then the reserved symbol of such a party is allotted to its candidates contesting the MCD election. However, unlike to National and State Party of Delhi, the candidates fielded by State Parties other than Delhi, have to file nomination papers with **10 proposers who should be electors in the same ward.**

As per above provisions of law, this Commission adopts only National and State Political Parties as are recognized as such by the Election Commission of India as on date. Rest all candidates are treated as 'INDEPENDENTS'. There is another class of political parties i.e. 'Registered but unrecognized political parties with the Election Commission'. As per ECI's directions, such parties are allotted a particular symbol as 'one time allotment' as these have to prove that they had contested the election to the State Legislative Assembly, secured a prescribed percentage of voting and returned specified number of elected member which are first steps for getting recognition in a State. Some such parties also approach the Commission to allot them a reserved symbol as they are 'registered parties with the ECI' but as there is no such provision in the abovementioned rule i.e. Rule 15, they are refused a 'reserved symbol' and their candidates are allotted a symbol out of free symbols of the ECI. Such candidates have to file nomination papers with 10 proposers, voters of the same ward, and they are not given any preference over the Independent candidates. Some such parties filed writ petitions in the High Court against the orders of the Returning Officer/SEC but the Hon'ble Courts have not acceded to their request in consideration of the present law.



Conduct of Elections



Conduct of Elections

The State Election Commission vide press note dated 04.11.2022 announced the Election Schedule for 250 Wards of Municipal Corporation of Delhi and also gave a brief overview of the election process - Electoral Rolls, number of Polling Stations and facilities available in the Polling Stations, Special arrangements for persons with disabilities (PwD) voters, use of electronic voting machines (EVMs), use of media/advertising, Model Code of Conduct guidelines for political parties & candidates and consolidated instructions for observance by all, measures to prevent public nuisance-restrictions for use of loud speakers, deployment of election personnel, law & order issues, security arrangements and deployment of forces, deployment of General Observers and Expenditure Observers, ROs, AROs, Sector Officers and Polling/Counting/ Reception parties and IT initiatives of the Commission etc.

On 07.11.2022, the Hon'ble State Election Commissioner issued schedule for holding General Election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi vide Notification No. F4(17)/SEC/Law/2022/(ii)/7686 (Annexure VI), in exercise of the powers conferred upon him under sub section 3 of section 11 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended.

An another notification No. F.4(17)/SEC/Law/2022/(i) 7685 dated 07.11.2022 was also issued calling upon the electorates of all the 250 wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, to elect Councillors in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, Rules and Orders made there under before the 15.12.2022.

For conduct of Election, the Commission had started work on the following activities well in advance:

10.1 Assessment of preparedness and interactions with Police and District Administration Various meetings were held with the District Magistrates and DCPs to assess and ascertain the



preparedness of administrative machinery and police for conducting smooth elections. High level meetings with Senior Officers from MHA, Delhi Police, Delhi Govt. and MCD were held for the purpose.

10.2 Preparation of Electoral Roll

As per Section 7 (E) of the DMC Act, 1957, the Electoral Roll for each ward shall be prepared before each general election in such manner as may be prescribed by Rules by reference to the qualifying date and shall come into force immediately upon its final publication in accordance with the Rule made for the purpose:

Provided that if the Election Commission is satisfied that, instead of preparing a fresh Electoral Roll of a ward before a general election, it would be sufficient to adopt the electoral roll of the assembly constituency for the time being in force as relates to the ward it may, by order, for reasons to be specified therein, direct that the electoral roll of the assembly constituency for the time being in force as relates to the ward shall, subject to any rules made for the purpose, be the electoral roll of the ward for the general election.

As preparation of fresh electoral roll for 250 wards of the MCD by the Commission entailed considerable time besides deployment of massive man power and incurring huge expenditure, the State Election Commission instead of preparing fresh electoral roll for the election of councilors of Municipal Corporation of Delhi adopted the Electoral Roll (ER) of the Election Commission of India in respect of NCT of Delhi, as revised with reference to 01.01.2022 as the qualifying date with all supplementary thereafter till last date of nomination under the proviso to Section 7E of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended from time to tome read with Rule 27 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Preparation of Electoral Rolls) Rules, 1975 vide notification dated 19.10.2022. For this purpose, the Commission approached the Chief Electoral Office, Delhi for obtaining the Electoral Rolls and the same was provided to the Commission with all requisite supplements i.e. upto the last date of nomination (14.11.2022) in soft copy SQL format.

As per Electoral Roll, provided by the CEO, Delhi, the detail of voters was as under:-

10.3 Arrangement of manpower for Elections

In any Election arranging of sufficient man power for conduct of elections is a mammoth task. As per Section 7(1) of DMC Act, 1957 read with rule 3 of the DMC (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 - the superintendence, direction and control of the preparation of electoral rolls for, and the conduct of, all elections to the Corporation shall be vested in the Election Commission of the National Capital Territory of Delhi consisting of an Election Commissioner to be appointed by the Administrator.

Further, as per section 7(3) of the DMC Act, 1957 - the Administrator shall, when so requested by the Election Commission make available to that Commission such staff which the Administrator considers necessary for discharge of the functions conferred on the Election Commission by subsection (1). Rule 113 of the DMC (Election of Councilors) Rules, 2012 also provides that; Every officer of the Government and every local and statutory authority in the National Capital Territory of Delhi shall, when so requested by the Election Commissioner make available to him such staff as may be necessary for the performance of any duties in connection with an election.

i) General Election Observers and Election Expenditure Observer:-

As per Rule-4 of the DMC (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 - the Election Commissioner may nominate an Election Observer who shall be an officer of Government to watch the conduct of elections in a ward or a group of wards of a Corporation and to perform such other functions as may be entrusted to him by the Election Commissioner.

The Services Department provided list of Senior Government Officers comprising of IAS, Senior DANICS, out of which 65 Officers were appointed as Election Observers vide notification number F.10(21)/SEC/MCD/Gen. Election-2022/7684 dated 06.11.2022 for all 250 wards.

The General Observers are the eyes and ears of the State Election Commission during the period of the election and provide direct inputs to the State Election Commission from the field as an interface with the election machinery, the candidates, parties and electors to ensure that the acts, rules, procedures, instructions and guidelines related to elections are strictly and impartially complied with by all concerned. They are always required to clearly and firmly bear in mind the fact that they are only the eyes and ears and not the mouthpiece of the State Election Commission. Their inputs/observations are confidential and solely for the use of the State Election Commission and not for any other agency including media. The Observers send their formal reports to the State Election Commission.

Besides the above, 68 officers of Govt. of NCT of Delhi of the level of Deputy Controller of Accounts/Sr. Accounts Officers, provided by the Finance Department were appointed as Election Expenditure Observers vide notification number 10(13)/SEC/MCD/General Election/2022/7455 dated 31.10.2022.

Similarly, the Election Expenditure Observers have to monitor the election expenditure of the candidates according to Rules-103 to 110 of the DMC(Elections of Councilors) Rules, 2012 and the guidelines issued by the Commission. Every candidate at an election to a ward shall, either by himself or by his election agent, keep a separate and correct account of all expenditure in connection with the election, incurred or authorized by him or by his election agent between the date on which he has been nominated and the date of declaration of the result. In the Delhi Municipal Election-2022, limit of Rs. 8,00,000/- for election expenditure by a candidate was fixed vide order No. F.SEC/ LAW/F.6/275/04/7405 dated 28th October, 2022, hence proper accounting/scrutiny of the expenditure was the foremost duty of the Expenditure Observer.

This time the Commission also appointed 15 Senior IAS Officers, made available by the M.H.A on the request of the Commission from the other States, as Observers vide letter no. 10(14)/GE-2022/SEC/7956-62 dated 14.11.2022 in addition to the Officers of the Delhi Govt., already appointed as General Observers for the purpose of overseeing and supervising the Election process of General Election DMC-2022.

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ii) District Election Officers

As per rule 6 (1) of the DMC (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 - the Commission may appoint as many District Election Officers as it may consider necessary, out of the officers working in the Commission, or from other officers of the Government or from a Municipal Corporation of Delhi to look after the work of electoral rolls and conduct of elections in a ward or wards. The District Election Officers appointed under sub-rule (1) shall function subject to the superintendence, direction and control of the Commission.

The Commission appointed all the 11 District Magistrates of the Govt. of NCT of Delhi (designated as District Election Officers by the ECI) as District Election Officers for Municipal Elections also vide notification number 4(3)/ SEC/MCD/Gen.Election/2022/7238 dated 19.10.2022. The District Election Officers had to look after the election work in the wards falling under their jurisdiction through the Returning Officers. Their main work was to coordinate among all election machinery like Election Observer, Police, Returning Officers etc. and supervise the election work so as to ensure smooth conduct of election in their respective districts like advance planning of detailed arrangements, building voter awareness, use of EVMs, Model Code of Conduct, law & order measures to prevent untoward incidents, security plan, check on advertisements of political nature on TV channels, cable network and radio, identification of counting centers/ strong rooms and security arrangements thereof, Randomization of EVMs/personnel etc.

Returning Officers and Scrutinizing Officers

As per rule 7 of the DMC (Election of Councilor) Rules, 2012 for every ward the Commission shall (a) designate or nominate a Returning Officer who shall be an officer of Government and

(b) appoint a Scrutinizing Officer for the purpose of scrutinizing nominations under rule 22 who shall be an officer of the Government:

This time the Commission appointed Sixty Eight (68) officers of Govt. of NCT of Delhi of the level of SDMs/ADMs/Asstt. Commissioner (T&T and F&S Deptt.), Dy. Commissioners (Industries)/SREO/



Administrative Officers/BDO etc (already appointed as Electoral Registration Officers by the ECI for respective Assembly Constituencies in Delhi) as Returning Officers/EROs for conduct of Elections for 250 wards of MCD vide notification number F. No. 10(3)/ SEC/MCD/General Election/2022/7239 dated 19-October, 2022.

The Returning Officers are the election officers who have to conduct the election in real sense. From the date of announcement of elections till completion of election process, he has to discharge all duties i.e. filing of nominations, scrutiny of nominations, preparation of list of contesting candidates, commissioning of EVMs, printing of Ballot papers, preparations of polling stations, strong room, counting room, logistic arrangements for polling parties, training of polling parties, poll day arrangements, counting arrangements, grant of different type of permissions, law & order issues etc.

Assistant Returning Officer

As per Rule-8 of DMC (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012- the Commission may appoint one or more persons to assist any Returning Officer in the performance of his functions provided that every such person shall be an officer of the Government.

The Commission appointed 250 AROs (one for each ward) vide notification number F. No. 10(4)/ SEC/ MCD/General Election/2022/7456 dated 31.10.2022 for MCD General Elections of 250 wards. ARO assists the Returning Officer in election work and discharges the functions of Returning Officer in emergency.

Master Trainer for EVMs

For the purpose of Commissioning of EVMs and EVM training of polling parties, the Commission appointed 185 master trainers who were lecturer/ Asstt. Professor of Deptt. of Training & Technical Education, Govt. of NCT of Delhi. All these Master Trainers were placed at the disposal of the concerned ROs as per their requirement. These Master Trainers were deployed with each RO in addition to the ECIL engineers.

Statistical Officers/Statistical Assistant

Further, services of 330 Statistical Assistants and Statistical Officers were also requisitioned from Planning Department, Govt. of NCT of Delhi for the purpose of counting duties and were placed at the disposal of Returning Officers as per their requirements.

Presiding Officers for polling stations

As per rule 11 of DMC (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 - the Returning Officer of a ward or wards shall appoint a Presiding Officer for each polling station and such polling officer or officers, as he thinks necessary, but he shall not appoint any person who has been employed by or on behalf of, or has been otherwise working for a candidate in or about the election:

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The Commission is completely dependent upon the Govt. of Delhi for providing of General Observers, Expenditure Observers, Returning Officers, Asstt. Returning Officers and other polling machinery like Presiding Officers, Polling Officers, Sector Officers, Counting Supervisor, Counting Assistant etc. For conduct of elections, the Commission required man power as under:-

The State Election Commission vide letter no. F.1(57)/SEC/Admn./2021/3463 dated 03.02.2021 requested Delhi Govt. for providing of 26500 Polling Parties including reserve staff [each party consisting of 05 officials - Presiding Officer (1), Polling Officers (3) and Helper (1)] and providing 3500 Reception and Counting Parties including reserved [each party comprising of 04 officers - Supervisor (1), Reception Supervisor (2) and Helper (1)] besides providing of other officers as mentioned above in the table.

As the Govt. of NCT of Delhi was able to provide 16500 Polling Parties and 2000 Parties for Reception and Counting, the Govt. of NCT of Delhi requested Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India for providing of 10000 Polling Parties and 1500 reception and counting parties.

The Services Department, Govt. of NCT of Delhi directed all the Departments, local bodies, DDA, Autonomous Bodies for providing the requisite number of Polling Parties and Sector Officers. The efforts for procuring the polling parties were started in December, 2021 as Commission had to conduct election in the month of March-April, 2022 because the 05 year terms of the then 03 DMCs was going to expire in May, 2022 but due to unification of MCD, the elections could not be held in April, 2022. However, the efforts were kept continued to arrange the polling parties from various Departments of Delhi Government, Central Government, PSUs, Banks, Autonomous Bodies etc. The Commission had requested several times all the Departments of Govt. of NCT of Delhi and Govt. of India, Autonomous Bodies, Local Bodies, in its own also. For providing the polling parties

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the Commission requested all the departments to appoint Nodal Officers for providing the details of polling staff online at Commissions web link https:// secdelhi.in. Accordingly, the Nodal Officers provided the detail of their employees for polling duties at the said link in a prescribed format devised by the IT Cell of the Commission. List of the Ministries/ Departments which provided the Polling parties, Reception/Counting parties, Sector Officers with their number is annexed as **Annexure VII.**

After consistent and continuous efforts, the Commission was able to arrange requisite polling personnel for 13638 polling stations with sufficient number of reserve staff. About 90,000 polling personnel were deployed for performing election duty at the polling stations. Total Polling personnel received from Central Government, Delhi Government as well as local bodies/Autonomous bodies - Presiding Officer-18249, Polling Officers - 54085, Helpers - 16215. Similarly for reception duties - 2877- Counting Supervisors, 7486 - Counting Assistants were appointed and the services of these officials were also utilized for counting duties.

The Central Government and Delhi Government also provided 2892 Officers for performing duties as Sector Officers. However, actual deployment of Sector Officers was 1850. Sector Officer is an important link between Polling parties and the Returning Officer. He is assigned 5 to 10 polling stations on an average. He co-ordinates among the polling parties and is also entrusted with the work of delivery of EVMs, important polling material like marked copies of the Electoral Roll, paper seal, etc to the polling parties. During the day he gives 2 hourly polling report to the RO as well to SEC head quarter. Besides, he has to ensure smooth polling in all polling stations under his jurisdiction from all angles including law & order.

As per Rule 114 of the DMC Rules, 2012, The Election Observers, Returning Officers, Assistant Returning Officers, Presiding Officers, Polling Officers and any other officials appointed by the Commission for the purpose of preparation of the electoral rolls and holding the election shall be deemed to be on deputation to the Commission from the date of their appointment till the assigned work is completed and shall, during that period, be subject to the control, superintendence and discipline of the Commission, in respect of work assigned to them by the Commission.

Accordingly, Services Department, Govt. of NCT of Delhi vide order No. F.2/01/2022/S.I dated 09.11.2022 placed the services of all Civil Staff/ Officers at the disposal of the State Election Commission on deputation for conduct of elections till elections are over. Similarly Home Department, Govt. of NCT of Delhi issued order in respect of Police.

10.4 Arrangement of Polling Stations



As per rule-10 of DMC (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012

"The Returning Officer of a ward shall provide a sufficient number of polling stations for the ward under his charge and shall publish in such manner as the Commission may direct in this behalf, the list showing the polling stations so provided and the polling areas and groups of voters for which they have respectively been provided. "

In this regard, Commission issued a time schedule for preparation of list of polling stations which was as under:

The Returning Officers were directed to publish the draft lists of polling stations so prepared and finalized by them for the assigned wards at their respective offices at a conspicuous place where aspiring candidates and general public could have an easy access, on all working days during office hours as per schedule given above.

It is also to be ensured that the entire ward as defined in the Delimitation Order dated 17.10.2022 is fully covered in the list of polling stations of that ward.

While preparing list of polling stations for a ward, care has to be taken that:-

- All polling stations are located on the ground floor of the building in the respective wards.
- ii) All sites for polling stations should be located in the same ward i.e. within the ward.
- iii) Room No. (except location) where polling station is to be set up in a building including mentioning of 'front side' or 'back side' or 'annexe building' etc in the column of location/place of polling station so that there is no confusion amongst the incoming voters etc.
- iv) Each polling station should not have more than 1500 voters.
- v) Directions were given to DEOs and ROs to do an advance exercise well before the election to have the condition of the polling stations physically verified by the field officials and get carried out necessary repairs in the said polling stations so as to make them suitable for polling with the assistance of work execution agencies like PWD, MCD etc.

Keeping in view of the above parameters 13638 polling stations were established in all 250 Wards and Commission also established 68 Pink Polling Stations and 68 Model Polling Station (one in each Assembly Constituency). Pink Polling station was manned by women polling staff only and Model Polling Stations were decorated with balloons and selfie points, proper seating and waiting facilities were arranged, special arrangements were made for voters coming with their children. All possible amenities were provided at these polling stations to make feel him/her proud of being part of democratic system.

Every DEO/RO was directed to provide the following Assured Minimum Facilities (AMF) at each polling station within his district/ward:

- a) Provision of ramp for persons with disabilities and old age electors
- b) Provision of drinking water
- c) Adequate furniture
- d) Proper lighting
- e) Help Desk
- f) Proper signage
- g) Toilet
- h) Sanitizer/Mask/Hand gloves for protection of Voters as well as Polling Staff.

10.5 Strong Rooms & Counting Centers

About 42 Strong Rooms/Counting Centers were established in the MCD General Election -2022. The arrangements like tentage, furniture, CCTV, security measures etc were made in the Strong Room/ Counting Centers by the vendors authorised by the Commission. Adequate security arrangements including deployment of CAPF were made by the Police authorities at all strong rooms/counting centers. CCTV camera (24 X 7) were installed in the rooms and corridors where polled EVMs were stored. Protocol as stipulated in the ECI guidelines for entering the strong room was followed. Returning Officers and DEOs were directed to





visit the storage campus frequently. Police and DEOs were personally responsible for security of Strong Rooms with in their districts and meticulous implementation of the protocol.

Detailed guidelines as issued by the ECI vide letter no. 464/L&O/2019/EPS dated 03.05.2019 were circulated to them in connection with arrangements and security measures for polled EVMs, stored in Strong Rooms for counting of votes. The Commission had directed all DEOs and ROs to identify and prepare strong rooms/counting centers for MCD General Election-2022 for storage of EVMs and other statutory stationery items. The DEOs were directed to house the counting halls/ strong rooms selected by the Returning Officers under their jurisdiction in big single premises as far as possible for convenience of all stake holders and for making effective police arrangements and other logistics arrangements.

10.6 Arrangement of EVMs/Polling Kits:

As per Rule 39 (1) of the DMC (Election of Councilors) Rules, 2012- at every election where a poll is taken votes shall be given by voting machine. Further, as per rule 40- every voting machine shall have a Control Unit and Balloting Unit and shall be of such design as may be approved by the Commission.

Since, the State Election Commission doesn't have its own EVMs, it requests Election Commission of India for providing of EVMs for Municipal Elections in Delhi and Chandigarh on Ioan basis. This time the Election Commission of India has provided 61560 ECIL make M-2 EVMs (29532 - CU & 32028 - BU). As per the directions of ECI, the delivery of EVMs was taken by the staff of the State Election Commission from the District Election Officers, by visiting personally various districts of Bihar. Transportation of EVMs was carried out by following the protocol as prescribed by the ECI. All transportation/labour cost in this regard was borne by the SEC, Delhi.

The EVMs were stored in the premises of State Election Commission at Kashmere Gate and Town Hall under the protection of local police and Nagaland Armed Police Force. The first level checking (FLC) of the EVMs was carried out by about 60-70 ECIL engineers and took more than one month time. During, first level checking of EVMs, representatives of the Political Parties were also invited to witness the FLC process and the entire process was carried out under CCTV camera and videography was also done.

About 38439 EVMs (19099-BU and 19340-CU) were actually used for conduct of poll in 250 wards comprising 13638 polling stations. Hands on training of the polling staff on EVMs was carried out by the respective Returning Officers on frequent occasions. Further, commissioning and sealing of EVMs was made by the Returning Officers with the help of Sector Officers, ECIL engineers and technical



staff/master trainers of Training and Technical Education, Govt. of NCT of Delhi in the presence of representatives of the candidates/political parties.

First Randomization of EVMs was made at SEC headquarter level and second randomization of the EVMs was made at the level of respective District Election Officers in the presence of concerned Returning Officers, General Observers and representatives of the Political Parties.

The Returning Officers arranged delivery of EVMs to the Presiding Officers at the polling station under his jurisdiction through concerned Sector Officers well before the commencement of the poll on 04.12.2022. It is worth mentioning that only one BU was used in all polling stations in all 250 wards in entire Delhi during General Municipal Election Delhi-2022

Power Packs for EVMs

Further, about 22000 Power packs/Batteries for EVMs were purchased from the ECIL as the EVMs were of ECIL make. It is general practice that as and when EVMs are commissioned, new power packs are put in the control units so as to ensure un-interrupted power supply to the CUs during poll day and counting day.

Indelible Ink

In the polling kits, sufficient indelible ink was supplied which was procured by the Commission from Mysore Paints and Varnish Ltd., Mysore, Karnataka. This Ink is used during casting of votes. The polling staff on duty applies it on the forefinger of the voter as a token of casting of vote by the voter.



Polling Kits

About 18000 polling kits (including reserve) were prepared by the staff at the Commission for 13638 polling stations. All the necessary items required for polling purpose i.e statutory and non-statutory forms, envelops, sign boards, stationery items, paper seal, address tag, voting register (Form-11A) etc were put in the polling kit and it was a herculean task which took about 40 - 45 days for preparation of polling kits. All polling kits had to be put in safe custody till the same were distributed to the Returning Officers for further distribution to the polling parties.

10.7 Arrangement of other services

Arrangement of other services like catering, CCTV, Videography/still camera, Web-casting, Computers, Printers, tentage, vehicles, Trucks, heavy vehicles, SVEEP activities, advertising/media, stationery etc were also made available to the DEOs/Observers/ ROs for conduct of elections. All ROs were also given certain amount for contingent expenditure during election so as to ensure smooth conduct of election.

10.8 Transport Arrangement for officers on election duty, Sector Officers, Polling Staff etc

The commission provided cars and equivalent vehicles to the General Observers, Special Observers, Returning Officers, Asstt. Returning Officers, Sector Officers so as to facilitate them to carry out their election related duties smoothly and efficiently.

All 1850 Sector Officers were provided vehicles like Maruti Van, ECCO, RTV and other similar vehicles so as to enable them to visit their areas to see the law & order situation, polling stations, counting centers, strong room as well as clusters of electors and transportation of EVMs and other election related essential items to the polling parties.

DTC Buses

Arrangement of 1850 buses with drivers equivalent to the number of Sectors were also arranged from the Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) by the Commission on the day of poll i.e. 04.12.2022 for carrying the Polling Staff and polled EVMs/material from the polling station to the reception centers for the convenience of polling staff and security of polled EVMs/material.



Besides the above, the DMRC and DTC were requested to make special arrangements for running of Metro Rail and Buses in early morning i.e. 04:00 am so as to facilitate the polling staff and other people connected with poll directly and indirectly to reach their polling station/work places in time on the day of poll. Similar arrangements were also made in the evening for safe and convenient return to their homes.

10.9 Model Code of Conduct and Enforcement

With the announcement of elections on 04.11.2022, Model Code of Conduct came into force with immediate effect which continued till completion of the election process. During election time the Government and the ruling party including the local bodies shall not announce any financial grant in any form or promises thereof. No foundation stone of any project or scheme of any kind shall be laid in these wards during the said period. No promises for works like construction of roads, new drinking water facilities, construction of playgrounds or launching new schemes or projects etc. will be made during the aforesaid period so as to attract/ influence the voters. However, the scheme/project of the government/MCD etc. already in progress may continue. Political Parties and contesting candidates are requested to also strictly abide by the provisions of the Delhi Prevention of Defacement of Property Act, 2007. Any violation of the said Act will be viewed seriously and penal/ remedial actions will be taken promptly.

The Commission had prepared booklets on Model Code of Conduct in English and Hindi languages and were made available on Commission's website. Political Parties and Contesting Candidates were provided copies of the same through the Returning Officers as well as from the Commissions head quarter.

All authorities concerned with the conduct of elections including District Election officers/ General

Observers/Returning Officers/Assistant Returning Officers, Police officers/Officers of civic authorities etc were directed to ensure immediate and strict compliance of the MCC from 04.11.2022 till completion of elections (MCC Guidelines annexed as **Annexure VIII**)

a) Restrictions on the use of loudspeakers

The Commission is genuinely concerned about the serious 'noise pollution' and great disturbance to the peace and tranquility of the general public by the reckless, widespread and flagrant use of loudspeakers during election canvassing and campaign by candidates, Political parties and their agents. To prevent such nuisance, particularly during the examination time, the Commission has directed that the use of public address system or loudspeakers or any sound amplifier, whether fitted on vehicles of any kind whatsoever, or in static position used for public meetings for electioneering purposes, during the entire election period starting from the date of announcement of election and ending with the date of declaration of results, shall not be permitted between 10.00 p.m. and 06.00 a.m.

Further, no loudspeakers fitted on vehicles of any kind or in any other manner whatsoever shall be permitted to be used during the period of 48 hours ending with the hour fixed for the conclusion of the poll in any Polling area.

b) Prevention of misuse of vehicles

Model Code of Conduct includes prevention of misuse of vehicles during the elections. There was restriction on number of vehicles during filing of nominations and maximum 03 vehicles were allowed to come within the periphery of 100 meters of the office of the Returning Officers. Similarly during electioneering there was check on number of vehicles being used by the candidates and their supporters. Cars/ Vehicles being used for electioneering purpose, under no circumstances, were allowed to move in convoys of more than 03 vehicles from the date of notification till the completion of election in any ward. All vehicles convoys were required to be broken up and such broken up of convoys were required to have a distance of at least 200 meters between them.

The permissions for use of vehicles by candidates and their supporters during the

elections were issued by the Returning Officers for their respective areas and at SEC Head Quarter for movement of election campaign vehicles in whole Delhi.

c) Prohibition on sale of liquor

Section 29 C of the DMC Act, 1957 as amended provides that no spirituous, fermented or intoxicating liquors or other substances of a like nature shall be sold, given or distributed at a hotel, eating house, tavern, shop or any other place public or private, within a polling area during the period of forty eight hours ending with the hour fixed for the conclusion of poll for any election in that polling area.

In view of the statutory provisions as above, the Commission directed that 'dry days' be declared and notified under the relevant State laws as is appropriate during 48 hours, ending with the hour fixed for conclusion of poll.

The Commission further directed that the days(s) on which the counting of votes is to be taken up shall be declared 'dry day(s)' under the aforesaid Act, till the counting of voters for a ward is completed & result declared.

The storage of liquor by individuals shall be curtailed during the above period and the restriction provided in the excise-law on the storage of liquor in unlicensed premises shall be vigorously enforced.

Steps shall also be taken to prohibit sale of liquor in adjoining areas of Delhi including areas covered under NDMC & Delhi Cantt Board so that there shall not be chances of clandestine movement of liquor from those areas which have no restriction.

The Commission directed the Government of NCT of Delhi to strictly implement the above measures. They were required to issue detailed and comprehensive instructions to all concerned authorities to take appropriate, legally effective measures to implement the above prohibitions and assist the election authorities in the peaceful and smooth conduct of free and fair poll. In this regard, detailed instructions, vide letter no. 10(32)/SEC/MCD/General Election/2022/8305 dated 22.11.2022, were issued to the Excise Commissioner, Govt. of NCT of Delhi as well as to the Chief Secretaries of the State of Uttar Pradesh & Haryana vide letter no. F.10(32)/SEC/MCD/GE-2022/8384 dated 24.11.2022 and letter no. F.10(32)/SEC/MCD/GE-2022/8385

dated 24.11.2022 respectively for keeping strict vigil at the bordering areas of Delhi regarding Law & Order and sale of liquor.

Restrictions on printing of pamphlets, posters etc.

Section 22 of the DMC Act, 1957 as amended prescribes restrictions on printing and publication of election pamphlets, posters etc and declares it a corrupt practice.

The following instructions on the subject were issued for strict compliance by all concerned:

- No person shall print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, any election pamphlet or poster which does not bear on its face names and addresses of the printer and publisher thereof
- ii) No person shall print or cause to be printed any election pamphlet or poster -
 - a) unless a declaration as to be identity of the publisher thereof, signed by him and attested by two persons to whom he is personally known, is delivered by him to the printer in duplicate; and
 - b) unless, within a reasonable time after the printing of the document, one copy of the declaration is sent by the printer, together with one copy of the document printed to the concern Police authorities.

The provisions of Delhi Prevention of Defacement of Property Act, 2007 should strictly be enforced.

e) Election related meetings and advertisements in news papers and other print media-election campaign-regarding.

Section-25 of DMC Act 1957 (as amended) Prohibition of canvassing/public meeting on the day of poll - no person shall-

- a) convene, hold or attend, join or address any public meeting or procession in connection with an election; or
- b) display to the public any election matter by means of cinematograph, television or other similar apparatus.
- c) propagate any election matter to the public by holding, or by arranging the holding of any musical concert or any theatrical performance or any other entertainment or amusement with a view to attracting the members of the public thereto, including star campaigning in

any polling area from 48 hours earlier to the close of poll, for election to a ward of Municipal Corporation of Delhi.

Further, the Commission vide order dated 24.11.2022 prohibited displaying of any election matter, including results of any opinion poll or any other poll survey in any media, including electronic in connection with General Elections to Municipal Corporation of Delhi from 1730 hrs 02.12.2022 to 1730 hrs 04.12.2022 in exercise of the powers under Article 243K read with Article 243ZA & Section 7 of the DMC Act, 1957.

Vide another separate letter dated 24.11.2022 Commission prohibited conducting of any exit poll & publishing or publicising by means of the print or electronic media & dissemination in any other manner whatsoever the result of any exit poll in connection with General Elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi during the period between 0800 hrs of 4th December, 2022 till 1730 hrs of 5th December, 2022 in exercise of the powers under Article 243K read with Article 243ZA & Section 7 of the DMC Act, 1957.

For effective implementation of the Model Code of Conduct, enforcement teams like VST, FST, SST were deployed in each ward by the respective Returning Officers under the supervision of DEOs concerned. With the assistance of Police and Para Military Forces, these teams were entrusted with the work of checking of movement of cash, anti-social elements and liquor.

The Commission also constituted following Committees/Cell at Head Quarter level as well as DEO/RO level to check the violation of MCC :

i) Complaint Redressal Cell

Complaint redressal cell was constituted at Head Quarter to examine and process the complaints received in SEC Head Quarter vide order no. F.10(20)/SEC/GE/2022/7498 dated 02.11.2022. Directions were also issued to the DEOs/ROs vide order number F.10(20)/SEC/ GE/2022/7499 dated 02.11.2022 for constitution of similar complaint redressal cell in their respective offices. To facilitate the individuals/ stake holders to lodge complaints regarding violation of MCC, the Commission developed an App named as "Nigam Chunav" which was linked to the SEC portal secdelhi.in. The complaints made on the said App were visible to all the election functionaries like DEOs, ROs, General Observers, Expenditure Observers, SEC HQ, Police etc. Initial action on the complaint was to be taken by the RO concerned at his own level or forward the complaint to the concerned agency (Police, Enforcement Cell etc.) for redressal of the complaint and uploading of the ATR. The mechanism to deal with all such complaints was totally on line. About 1395 number of complaints received online in the Complaint redressal cell during this period and forwarded to the concerned authorities for taking suitable action.

ii) Single Window Permission Committee

Single Window Permission Committee was constituted at Head Ouarter level vide order No.F.10(15)/Admn.//GE/2022/7683 dated 06.11.2022 for granting to permission to political parties for holding rallies , road shows, use of vehicles, star campaigners for Delhi as a whole. Similar committees were also constituted at the DEO/RO offices for grant of permissions for vehicles, Road shows, Rallies etc in their respective wards/areas. The mechanism to deal with all such permissions was completely online. About 31560 number of proposals came before the committee during this period and forwarded to the concerned authorities for taking suitable action.

Besides, a Screening Committee headed by Chief Secretary was also constituted with the following composition vide letter number F.SEC/ GE/MCD/MCC/2022/7707 dated 07.11.2022:

- a) Chief Secretary : Chairman
- b) Secretary/Pr. Secretary of the departments to which the proposal relates: Member
- c) Secretary/Pr. Secretary of the GAD/ Coordination department of Delhi : Member

The Committee was entrusted with the work to examine each proposal requiring approval of the Government during the period of operation of MCC for execution of any work, holding of any function etc. before sending to the SEC for its permission in the light of Commission's existing instructions/ clarifications available in the form of compendium/ instructions. Hence, all the Departments of GNCTD were advised not to forward any reference/proposal directly to the Commission seeking approval. The single window permission cell constituted at head quarter level used to examine such proposals recommended by the Screening Committee and granted approval/permission in the cases found in order.

iii) Media Certification and Monitoring Committee

For previewing, scrutinizing, verifying and granting permission to all advertisements and for scrutinizing of cases of paid news to be given by political parties in print/electronic media in MCD Election-2022, a Media Certification and Monitoring Committee at Head Quarter level was constituted vide order No.F.10(20)/SEC/GE/2022/7493 dated 02.11.2022. Instructions were also issued to the DEOs to constitute District level MCMC for the local channels and print media vide letter no. F.10(20)/SEC/GE/2022/7494 dated 02.11.2022.

MCC guidelines/instructions for candidates

- The timing for submission of nomination by the candidates shall be 11:00 am to 3:00 pm on all working days including Saturday in the office of the concerned Returning Officer.
- ii) All the candidates at the time of filing nomination papers with the concerned Returning Officers are required to file two Affidavits in the prescribed forms viz. Form 21 & Form 22 (available with the Returning Officers regarding their criminal background, if any, assets & liabilities and educational qualifications, etc.)
- iii) The candidates can file nominations in the office of the respective Returning Officers (already appointed by the Commission), whose names, designations and official addresses published in leading news papers and the same available on this Commissions' website www.sec.delhi.gov.in
- iv) In case a candidate of a National Party or of a Delhi State Party as recognized by the Election Commission of India for NCT of Delhi, desires to contest the above said election, he/she will be required to file his/ her nomination paper duly proposed by an elector from the same ward from which he/she intends to contest. Candidates of State Parties (not recognized for NCT of Delhi, but recognized in other States by the Election Commission of India) and other candidates including the Independent candidates will have to file nomination papers with 10 proposers being voters in the same Ward from where the candidate is being proposed. Other conditions are given in the Symbol order

issued by this Commission and was made available on Commissions website mentioned above. A security of Rs. 5000/— (Rupees five thousand only) for each candidate shall have to be deposited in cash with the Returning Officer at the time of filing of nomination paper and when the candidate is a member of a Scheduled Caste, this amount shall be 50% i.e. Rs. 2500/— (Rupees two thousand five hundred only).

- v) The maximum limit of election expenditure which a candidate can incur in connection with an election to a Ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi has been increased to Rs.8,00,000/-.
- vi) Every nominated candidate shall be required to maintain account of his/her election expenses from the date he/she is nominated till he/she has withdrawn or his/her nomination has been rejected/declaration of result of the election, as the case may be, in the prescribed form and manner and submit the same to the concerned Returning Officer within ten (10) days of the declaration of the result of the election. A register for the maintenance instructions on the subject and a Performa of Affidavits in Forms 20 to be filed by the candidates along with the register of accounts will be supplied to each candidate by the Returning Officer concerned at the time of filling nomination papers.

10.10 Security Management

In the Delhi Municipal Election-2022, there were 13638 polling stations for 250 wards across Delhi excluding the area of Assembly Constituencies of Delhi Cantt and New Delhi Municipal Council comprising of 14505358 electors. Security management and monitoring of law & order for smooth conduct of elections in free and fair manner was a challenge. The Security Forces started monitoring Law & Order from the very first day of announcement of elections because Model Code of conduct came into existence from that date. Effective enforcement of MCC without Police assistance is not possible.

Police Role during elections

To ensure free and fair elections Police plays an important role with following objectives:

a) The process of elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi is carried out peacefully in a free and fair manner.

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- b) To maintain proper Law & Order during the course of pre-poll campaign, polling day, post poll and on the day of counting in the entire area of National Capital Territory of Delhi.
- c) To take precautionary measures for the safety and security of candidates and polling officials.
- d) To ensure that all police officers and men detailed for duty in connection with these arrangements anticipate all possible situations in advance and take corrective measures well in time.
- e) To implement instructions issued by the State Election Commission from time to time and ensure observance of Model Code of Conduct.
- f) To make proper law & order, security and traffic arrangements for processions, meetings, canvassing and rallies, etc.
- g) To deploy the force as per scale laid down for the Polling Booths and Premises.
- h) To ensure smooth conduct of the poll.
- i) To ensure safe escorting of EVMs /VVPATs on the completion of polling to the respective Storagecum-Counting Centres.
- j) To ensure proper guarding of the storage centres.
- k) To make necessary law & order and security arrangements during the process of counting.
- To provide proper security for polling material during transit, at the booths as well as at the counting centres till the completion of counting.
- m) To ensure proper and safe custody of EVMs at the Reception Centres.
- n) Proper security arrangements be made and anti-sabotage, anti-explosive checks be made mandatory during the meetings, rallies of candidates and especially of star campaigners of political parties.
- o) To ensure proper Law & Order and security

arrangement at the time of victory processions.

p) Some areas/localities in Delhi are socially, economically and communally sensitive and susceptible to violence. These areas may be targeted by anti-social elements and other subversive forces. Such areas/localities need special attention and proper arrangements be made keeping in view of prevailing law and order security situation.

During the elections DEOs/ROs were asked to do a vulnerability mapping of villages/ electoral segments, vulnerable of threat and intimidation. The Commission also requested to the Delhi Police to identify trouble prone areas in advance and prepare elaborate Delhi Security Plan to ensure effective deployment of security personnels so that strict vigilance could be kept in those areas for maintaining of public order and strict implementation of MCC in Delhi. The Delhi Police had identified 493 locations having 3360 polling stations as critical polling locations/ stations in the MCD General Election-2022. The details of critical polling stations were shared with respective DEOs/Returning Officers for ensuring elaborate security arrangements by them in those polling stations.

In this regard, the Commission also made arrangements at all the sensitive/critical polling stations like (i) deployment of approx. 500 Micro Observers, (ii) web casting arrangements (iii) deployments of drones by the Delhi Police at the 55 critical locations having 753 polling booths (iv) deployment of extra security forces/CAPF/ Home Guards. In this way, the Commission left no stone unturned for ensuring the law & order situation during Municipal Election-2022.

Besides the above, Delhi Police also took the following security measures:

- Adequate police arrangements were made in and around the offices of Returning Officers/ Asstt. Returning Officers at the time of nominations which continued from 07.11.2022 to 14.11.2022 in all over Delhi. Police made proper barricading and frisking of all people coming to the offices of Returning Officers/ ARO in connection with filing of nominations. Similar police arrangements were also made during scrutiny of nominations and finalization of candidates.
- 2. Appointed Sector Police Officers with wireless facilities with the Sector Officers

- 3. Deployed police/security at all polling stations on 04.12.2022 at 05:00 am sharp. After the close of the poll, they accompanied the polling staff to Reception Centre for safe deposit of polled material.
- Deployed adequate police personnel in the area of these 250 Wards till the declaration of result of General Election on 07.12.2022 for maintaining peace and harmony throughout the election period.
- 5. Deployed patrolling units in the area of these wards to check and control any untoward incident during election period and particularly on the polling day.
- 6. Deployed adequate police personnel to provide proper security at the Strong Rooms and Counting Centers.
- 7. Armed Guards were also deployed at each Reception cum Counting Centre till declaration of results on 07.12.2022.
- 8. Deployed adequate police personnel at all the Counting Centres in early morning on 07.12.2022 till declaration of results.

In order to keep the law & order situation under control during election period and for smooth conduct of elections, the Commission through Delhi Police had deployed 170 companies of CAPF provided by MHA, arranged 14000 Home Guards from State of Rajasthan and State of Uttar Pradesh through Delhi Police. These arrangements were other than the deployment of local Police and Delhi Home Guards.

10.11 Counting of Votes

The Counting of Votes for 250 wards was carried out on 07.12.2022 from 08:00 am onwards in the respective 42 Counting Centers across Delhi. First of all, Postal Ballots were counted followed by counting of votes polled in EVMs. Elaborate arrangements were made at the counting centers by the DEOs/ ROs for counting of votes like arrangement of adequate counting staff, training of counting staff, arrangement of tentage, LED/CCTV, Media Center,



arrangements for seating of contesting candidates and their agents. Police also made foolproof security arrangements by deploying Police Force, Para Military Force, Barricading etc. in and around the counting centers. Entry at the counting centers was very restricted. Only Election Officers, Counting Staff, authorised representative/agents of political party, authorised Media Persons had the access to the Counting Centers. Counting of votes in respect of all wards was carried out in several rounds and the results of all the rounds were announced in open in the counting centers were flashed to the media for the information of all concerned. Proper arrangements at SEC head quarter were also made for collecting the round wise counting report from all Returning Officers and the same were compiled for press and media.

10.12 Return of Elections

In MCD elections-2022, total 1349 candidates contested the elections, including all parties, National Party, State Parties, Registered but unrecognized Parties and Independent. After counting of votes on 07.12.2022, 250 candidates were notified as elected councilors vide notification No.F.4(47)/SEC/LAW/2022/8954 dated 07.12.2022. List of all the elected candidates was sent to the MCD for further necessary action **Annexure IX**.

Lastly enforcement of Model Code of conduct was lifted on 12.12.2022 resultantly election process came to an end.













CHAPTER-11

Best Practices



Best Practices

11.1 Preparation of Intergrated Electoral Rolls

The Mother Electoral roll was adopted by the Commission from the rolls of CEO/ECI for the voters enrolled as on the date of announcement of the polls i.e. 04.11.2022. Further, one supplementary electoral roll was prepared for the intervening period from date of announcement of elections till 08.11.2022 (date of publication of integrated draft electoral rolls by the CEO office). Another supplementary electoral roll was prepared for the period 09.11.2022 to 14.11.2022 which was the last date of nomination (14.11.2022). As per conventional practice, supplementary electoral roll(s) were to be provided to the Returning officers along with mother roll and the RO was required to manually mark deletions from the mother roll on the basis of supplementary electoral roll.

However, the Commission, for the first time ever, prepared integrated Electoral Rolls after incorporating all additions/deletion till the last date of nomination i.e. 14.11.2022. As such, no separate manual deletion was required at the level of Returning Officer. **11.2 Facilitating Ease of Voting for Persons** with Disabilities and Electors over 80 Years



The Commission had issued instructions to ensure that as far as practicable, all polling stations should be located at ground floor and sturdy ramps should be provided for the convenience of disabled electors.

Special emphasis was laid by the Commission to facilitate hassle free & pleasant voting experience by PwDs and citizens over 80 years. The list of 72867 PwDs and around 2,00,000 citizens of age over 80 years was made available by the Commission for use by ROs for facilitating postal ballots by these voters.

The Commission roped in the services of NCC/NSS/ Scouts and Guides for aiding PwD voters on the day of poll. Arrangements were made for wheel chairs, ramps, toilets at the polling stations to facilitate PwD voters to cast their vote. The Commission also sensitized the concerned authorities manning the polling booths to escort the PwD voters and make available facility of transport /e-rickshaws wherever found desirable and feasible. The Commission had directed all DEOs/ROs to ensure that facilities for PwD, in addition to the Minimum Assured Facilities, are in place at the required polling stations. Leaving no stone unturned to ensure Participation of PwDs and voters of age over 80 years, the Commission had also extended the facility of postal ballots to these voters which obviated the need for physically visiting the polling stations. A dedicated team of officials for distribution and collection of postal ballots was deployed by the ROs for this purpose.

11.3 Postal Ballots

The Commission laid special emphasis on ensuring maximum use of postal ballots by service personnel who are deployed on election related duties. In this regard, the Commission had appointed a Nodal Officer to facilitate the processing of postal ballots. Since, a significant fraction of election functionaries consist of police personnel, special care was taken to ensure that all such police personnel who are on election duty are facilitated to enable them to cast their vote with ease and convenience. Delhi Police after consultation with the Commission had appointed a DCP level officer as Nodal officer to co-ordinate and facilitate casting of votes through postal ballots.

11.4 Randomization of Polling Parties

The Commission had prepared around 32000 polling/ counting /reception parties for conduct of elections. In order to ensure fairness in deployment of the polling staff, randomization of polling parties was done on two levels and actual deployment was informed to the parties only a day prior to poll.

The randomization of polling parties entailed collection of data of around 1,00,000 polling staff including their names, designation, phone number etc. All this data was uploaded on the election software of the Commission and the first randomization of parties was done using this software wherein personnel of the polling parties were allotted to the concerned Returning Officers but no polling station was allotted to the parties.

In the second level randomization which was done only a couple of days before the poll day, polling station wise allocation of polling parties was done through the Commission's portal.

11.5 Distribution and Randomization of EVMs

Around 56000 EVMs were sourced by the Commission for conducting elections. A total of 37810 EVMs (CU-19000 & BU-18810) were issued to the Returning Officers by the Commission

which were deployed at polling stations and also kept for reserve stock/training purpose. Similar to the randomization of polling parties, two level randomizations were also undertaken by the Commission for distribution of the EVMs to the polling staff.

The first level randomization was done by the Commission wherein ward wise allocation of the EVMs was done. The second level randomization of the Electronic Voting Machines (EVMs) was conducted by the respective District Election Officers on 26.11.2022 in the presence of General Observers appointed by the State Election Commission, Delhi. The representatives of Political parties and contesting candidates were also present during the process. After the second randomization of the EVMs, polling station wise allocation of the EVMs was done.

11.6 Polling Stations

The Commission upgraded the status of facilities at the Polling Stations from the earlier concept of Basic Minimum Facilities (BMF) to Assured Minimum Facilities (AMF). Accordingly, instructions were issued to the Commissioner of the Municipal



Corporation of Delhi and other concerned agencies to ensure that every Polling Station is equipped with Assured Minimum Facilities (AMF) like drinking water, shed, toilet, ramp for the physically challenged voters, a standard voting compartment etc. for the convenience and facilitation of voters.

The Commission had decided to set up at least one Model Polling station and one Pink Polling Station in each assembly constituency. Accordingly, 68 Model Polling station were set up to give a pleasant experience to the voters. Special waiting areas, helper to facilitate voting by senior citizen, Mobile deposit facility etc were provided at these Model Polling stations. 68 Pink Polling Stations were also set up to be manned exclusively by women officers/ officials. Facilities such as feeding room for lactating mothers/ creche facility for small kids/ candies for kids were provided at the Pink Polling Stations.

11.7 Law and Order, Security Arrangements and Deployment of Forces

The conduct of elections involves elaborate security arrangement by Delhi Police. Chief Secretary, Delhi,



Commissioner of Delhi Police, Additional Secretary (UT), and Joint Secretary (UT) of Ministry of Home Affairs were involved in putting in place extensive security arrangements. 170 Central Armed Police Forces (CAPFs) were deployed to supplement the local police force in ensuring a peaceful and conducive atmosphere for the smooth conduct of elections in a free, fair and transparent manner. Besides, 16600 Home guards (11000 from Uttar Pradesh, 3000 from Rajasthan and 2600 from Haryana) were requisitioned by the Commission and deployed at the polling stations/counting centres/ strong rooms.

Check posts were set up to check inter-state suspicious movement of men and material. On the basis of inputs received from Delhi Police and District Election officers, the Commission prepared a list of 3360 Sensitive/Hyper sensitive polling booths at 493 polling locations across the city and deployed 493 Micro-Observers to keep a close watch on poll day.

For the first time ever, the Commission had arranged for installation of facility of web casting at critical polling booths to monitor the proceedings at these stations so as to take timely action in case of any untoward incidence.

Taking into cognizance of communally sensitive situation in some parts of the city, the Commission also had deployed drones for aerial surveillance at all sensitive polling stations which proved to be an effective deterrent and no violence or disturbance was noticed in these areas.

11.8 Voter Awareness Media Campaign

The Commission pressed hard to enhance its interaction and involvement with all the



stakeholders in the electoral processes by using different media platforms. Motivate and inspire the voters, the Commission launched an intensive voter awareness multi-media campaign through the print/ electronic / digital, outdoor and social media having following highlights:

- Theme song: ''लोकतंत्र का सम्मान करें हम आओ मतदान करे हम''
- Radio jingles on FM channels
- AVs on TV channels
- Auto rickshaw/DTC buses wraps
- Hoardings/unipoles etc



- Display panels inside Metro and also at Metro stations
- Print media
- Cartoons by renowned cartoonist Sh. Irfan
- Use of Mascot during Election
- Social Media coverage through Twitter handle/ Instagram/Facebook etc.



11.9 Ban on Opinion Poll / Exit Poll

The State Election Commission, Delhi, took cognizance of the fact that the ECI has prohibited Exit Polls from 0800 hrs 12.11.2022 to 1730 hrs on 05.12.2022 in the State of Himachal Pradesh in view of elections in Gujarat Legislative Assembly and other bye-elections. The Commission noted that in the interest of free & fair poll which are uninfluenced & where electors are able to vote in an unbiased manner, it is imperative to regulate Opinion and Exit polls in the spirit of provisions enshrined in the RP Act, 1951.

Accordingly, in exercise of the powers vested under Article 243K read with Article 243ZA of the Constitution & Section 7 of the DMC Act, 1957, Hon'ble State Election Commissioner has prohibited displaying of any election matter, including results of any opinion poll or any other poll survey in any media, including electronic in connection with General Elections to Municipal Corporation of Delhi from 1730 hrs 02/12/2022 to 1730 hrs 04/12/2022.

Further, Hon'ble State Election Commissioner, NCT of Delhi also notified the period between 0800 hrs of 4th December, 2022 till 1730 hrs of 5th December, 2022 as the period during which conducting of any Exit Poll & publishing or publicising by means of the print or electronic media & dissemination in any other manner whatsoever the result of any exit poll in connection with General Elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi shall be prohibited.

11.10 IT Enablement of MCD Elections

The MCD elections were largely driven by use of innovative IT technologies which not only speeded up the process but also ensured that human errors are omitted. The Commission had adopted IT technology/customized software for undertaking all major election activities like Internal Management of EVMs, formation and deployment of polling parties/ reception parties/ Counting parties/ Sector Officers, preparation of polling stations/finalization of electoral rolls.

The Commission launched the Nigam Chunav Delhi app (available on android play store and apple Appstore) which has been integrated with the portal of the Commission. The 'Nigam Chunav Delhi' mobile App offered the convenience to all voters to find information on following:

- names in the electoral roll
- locate their Polling Station on Maps
- know about Candidate and their affidavits
- file complaints
- obtain contact information
- view results

As part of the electoral management tool, the Commission also provided for a Single Window System for ensuring a coordinated action by all election functionaries i.e. DEOs/ROs/AROs/Delhi Police/MCD etc in an integrated manner for grant of permissions and handling of complaints. The portal has facilitated the grant of permissions to candidates/political parties for holding rallies/use of vehicles/loudspeaker etc. About 31560 applications seeking permission were received from candidates/ parties and processed by concerned officers.



Role of IT and New Initiatives

Role of IT in the General Election to MCD-2022

For General Election to MCD-2022, various IT initiatives were taken for smooth completion of election process with in limited timeframe. Following is the brief description of each IT module:

12.1 Polling Party Management

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Data collection of approximately 1.0 lac personals were initiated before start of election process through dedicated web link provided to all Delhi and Central government departments. After collection, all data was randomized and distributed to all Returning officers as per their requirements through web portal. Returning officers then further processed this data and prepared Polling, counting and reception parties. **SMS facility was also provided to convey information regarding training schedule.**

12.2 EVM Management

EVM management was another milestone which IT cell had completed successfully right from data input of all EVM's received, FLC , Distribution to ROs after randomization, Second randomization in the presence of all Political parties and Observers, Distribution to Polling parties and further storage at strong room.

12.3 Polling Station Management

After finalization of Delimitation 2022, ward wise draft polling station list was prepared by IT cell using

software tools to identify localities according to Assembly Polling station list provided by CEO, Delhi. This list was uploaded on web portal for Returning officers to make amendments as per actual location of each polling station and input serial number of voters associated with that polling station. The same draft polling station list was then published at their office and on SEC website for inviting public objections and suggestions. After receiving objections and suggestions Final polling station list was prepared by ROs on the same web portal. This Final Polling Station list was again published at RO office and SEC website i.e. **sec.delhi.gov.in**.

12.4 Integrated Electoral Roll and Voter Slip Generation

Based upon Final polling Station list, IT cell generated Ward wise Integrated Electoral Roll after taking supplementary electoral roll from CEO, Delhi till last date of Nomination i.e. 14/11/2022. English, Hindi (with image and without image) Electoral roll was generated and uploaded on SEC website for public viewing and downloading. Ward wise Voter's data was also available on Nigam Chunav Mobile App for search using Name, Relative Name or Voter ID number.

12.5 Nigam Chunav Mobile App / Nigam Chunav Officers App

Nigam Chunav Mobile App (Android and iPhone) was the major initiative taken by SEC IT cell, to provide easy information to citizens of Delhi and to raise complaints in a very easy manner. Citizens

were able to search their name in Voter's list, to find their ward no and name, polling station name and location on google maps, Know about candidates contesting in their wards along with their affidavits, Live results, raise complaints along with image and video. Information about SEC officers deployed for General Elections was also available in this Mobile app. A total of 92,000 downloads was done till counting day i.e. 7.12.2022.

12.6 Online Voter's Complaint Management

After raising complaints through Nigam Chunav Mobile App, the complaint data popped up at RO web portal for further action on that complaint. ROs escalated complaints to Enforcement Cell, Police Cell or SEC for further action. These cell uploaded Action Taken Report and the Final status informed to complainant through SMS or on Nigam Chunav App. Offline complaints was also uploaded on the web portal so that all complaints were addressed at single portal. Image / Video taken by complainant and location of complainant was part of the complaint through out this procedure.

12.7 Online Permission Management

SEC IT cell provided Online Permission link at SEC web site for Candidates to submit permission for any event to be organized by them during campaign period. All submitted permissions popped up at DEO web portal for approval and disapproval by team constituted by DEO. Candidates received status and ATR on SMS and SEC web site. A total of 32000 permissions were received and disposed.

12.8 Nominations/Rejections/Withdrawal/ Final List of Contesting Candidates

Nomination process was entirely made hassle free by initiatives taken by SEC IT cell which includes input of nomination data into web portal along with affidavits, taking print out of daily nominations (Form 3), sign and stamp by RO and upload on web portal for SEC. All candidate Information was instantaneously updated on Nigam Chunav Mobile App along with affidavits. Information regarding daily Nominations, Rejections, Withdrawals and Final list of Contesting Candidates was also updated on Nigam Chunav Mobile app through web portal.

12.9 Observer Report upload on Web Portal

SEC IT cell provided facility to all Observers to upload periodic reports during election process on Web portal. SEC reporting cell was able to view and monitor reports uploaded by Observer.

12.10 Voter slip distribution status by BLO through Mobile App

A new initiative was taken by SEC IT cell to monitor Voter Slip distribution by BLOs. Nigam Chunav Officer's app was provided to each BLO to update status after voter slip handed to voter. This helped SEC reporting cell to monitor exact status of distribution ward wise.

12.11 Votes polled on Polling day through Mobile App

To monitor Polling Day activities of each polling station, SEC IT cell provided Nigam Chunav Officer App to all Sector Officers to update information after every event i.e. Safe arrival of Polling Party, Mock Poll done, Start of Poll, 2 hourly votes polled data, Polling end etc. Live status of all Polling day activities was displayed on web portal to Hon'ble SEC and other officers.

12.12 Live results on Mobile app and Web portal

To display Live results, SEC IT cell had provided facility at all Counting Centres to update results on web portal after every round. This facility enabled SEC to display live results at various Display centres for Media and Public i.e DEO office, Counting Centres, SEC Media Cell, Nigam Chunav Mobile App etc.

12.13 Voter slip on WhatsApp, Nigam Chunav Mobile App, SEC Website

A facility was provided by IT cell to get Voter slips



To increase Voting percentage, SEC IT cell send Whatsapp and SMS messages to all mobile users of Delhi to cast their votes on poll day.




Party Wise Votes Share



I am directed to refer to your letter F.No.4 (307)/SEC (Law)/2022-6108 dated 12.07.2022, on the above subject and to State that:

- 1. The total number of municipal wards to be delimited shall be 250 wards.
- 2. Reservation of seats for scheduled castes shall be determined as per the provisions of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957.
- 3. Census data of 2011 shall be used for the delimitation.
- 4. Guidelines for delimitation exercise are enclosed. However, these guidelines are indicative only and the committee may, if need arises, seek clarification from the Ministry of Home Affairs.

GUIDELINES AND METHODOLOGY

1. CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS

Clause (1) of article 243R of the Constitution provides that save as provided in clause (2) all the seats in a Municipality shall be filled by persons chosen by direct election from the territorial constituencies in the Municipal area and for this purpose each Municipal area shall be divided into territorial constituencies to be known as wards.

2. STATUTORY PROVISIONS

- I. Sub-section (5) of Section 3 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act 1957 provides that the total number of seats of councillors and the number of seats reserved for the members of the Schedule Castes the Corporation, shall, at the time of establishment of the Corporation, be as determined by the Central Government by notification in the official Gazette.
- II. Sub-section (6) of Section 3 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act 1957 that upon completion of each census after the establishment of the Corporation, the number of seats shall be on the basis of the population of Delhi as ascertained at that census and shall be determined by the Central Government in the Official Gazette and the number of seats to be reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes shall as, as nearly as may be, bear the same ratio to the total number of seats as the population of Scheduled Castes bears to the total population of Delhi.

Provided that the total number of seats shall in no case be more than two hundred and fifty and the number of seats in the Corporation shall be determined by the Central Government at the time of the establishment of the Corporation;

Provided further that the determination of seats as aforesaid shall not affect the then composition of the Corporation until the expiry of the duration of the Corporation;

Provided also that the seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes may be allotted by rotation to different wards in such manner as the Central Government may, by order published in the Official Gazette, direct

III. Sub-section (7) of Section 3 the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957, provides that seats shall be reserved for women belonging to the Scheduled Casts, from among the seats for the Scheduled Castes, the number of such seats being determined by the Central Government by order published in the Official Gazette which shall not be less than one-half of the total number of seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes.

IV. Sub-section (8) of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957, provides that Seats shall be reserved for women, the number of such seats being determined by order published in the Official Gazette by the Central Government which shall not be less than the one-half of total number of seats other than those reserved for the Scheduled Castes.

Provided that such seats reserved for women shall be allotted by rotation to different wards in such manner as the Central Government may, by order published in the Official Gazette, direct in this behalf.

- V. Section 5 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957, provides that for the purposes of election of councilors, area of the corporation shall be divided into single-member wards in such a manner that the population of each of the wards shall, so far as practicable, be the same throughout Delhi.
- VI. In Sub-section (2) of the above section, provides that the Central Government shall, by order in the Official Gazette, determine
 - a. the number of wards;
 - b. the extent of each ward;
 - c. the wards in which seats shall be reserved for the Scheduled Castes;
 - d. the wards in which seats shall be reserved for women and;
 - e. the manner in which seats shall be rotated under sub-section (6) and (8) of section 3.

3. Principle and Guidance for Delimiation

- All the wards are to be delimited on the basis of 2011 census. The census figures of 2011 as published by the Census Commissioner/ Registrar General of India, are, thus, alone to be taken into account for this purpose.
- ii). The wards shall be so delimited that population (on the basis of 2011 census) of each ward in the corporation shall, so far as practicable, be the

same throughout the area of the corporation. All the wards shall, as far as practicable, be geographically compact areas and in delimiting them regard shall be had to the physical features, existing boundaries of administrative units, facilities of communication and publice convenience.

- iii). The total population of the corporation (2011 Census) shall be divided by the total number of wards and average population of each ward shall be obtained. This average shall be the guiding factor for delimiting the wards in such a manner that each ward, so far as practicable, has equal population limiting the number of Wards not more than 250.
- iv). As each Assembly constituency shall be divided into minimum three wards, the principle of average population may not be maintained throughout; therefore, a deviation to the extent of plus or minus 10% from the Corporation area average population may be acceptable to the Central Government, if the geographical features, means of communication, public convenience, contiguity of the areas and necessity to avoid Freaking of administrative units so warrant.

- v). Boundary of a ward in the Corporation should be carved within the boundary of the relevant Member of Legislative Assembly constituency and shall not cross it.
- vi). The Committee shall first prepare DRAFT DELIMITATION ORDER for the Municipal Corporation, showing the number and extent of wards in the Corporation, maps of each ward indicating clear boundaries on the North, West, East and South of a ward in the Corporation.
- vii). After the approval of the draft Delimitation Order by the Central Government, the Committee shall give the matter wide publicity through press media etc. for inviting objections and suggestions. The objections and suggestions shall be disposed of with prior approval of the Central Government. The final proposal shall be sent to the Central Government for consideration, approval and publication in the official Gazette.
- viii). After the publication of the Delimitation Order in the Gazette, if any question arises as to the interpretation of the Order, as to the boundary or extent of the boundary, the matter shall be referred to the Central Government.

RESERVATION ORDER (To be published in an Extra-ordinary Gazette (Part IV) of Government of Delhi)

NO. F.4 (307)/SEC/LAW/2022/163

WHEREAS the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended by the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Amendment) Act, 2022 (10 of 2022) has come into force w.e.f. 22.5.2022vide Ministry of Home Affairs', Govt of India Notification No. F. No. 14011/4/2022-Delhi-Ildated 18.5.22;

AND WHEREAS consequent to the above- said amendment, the delimitation of wards for the Municipal Corporation of Delhi and reservation of wards for specified categories of persons has to be determined by the 'Central Government' as per provisions of section 3 and 5 of the aforesaid amended Act;

AND WHEREAS vide notification no.14011/04/2022-Delhi-II dated 10.09.2022 the Central Government has determined the total number of wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi as 250 which have since been delimited. Out of 250 wards, 42 wards have been reserved for persons belonging to the Scheduled Castes having regard to scheduled caste population.

AND WHEREAS section 3 of the said Act provides that seats shall be reserved for women belonging to Scheduled Castes, from among the seats reserved for Scheduled Castes, which shall not be less than one half of the total number of seats reserved for Scheduled Castes. As such, out of the 42 wards not less than 50% have to be reserved for "Women belonging to Scheduled Castes' which comes to 21 and remaining 21 wards for 'Scheduled Castes'.

AND WHEREAS section 3 of the said Act also provides that seats shall be reserved for women, which shall not be less than one half of the total number of seats other than those reserved for Scheduled Castes. As such, the remaining number of wards i.e. 208 have to be divided on the basis of not less than 50% for only 'Women' category i.e. 104 wards and remaining 50% shall be for 'General' category of persons i.e. 104 wards.

AND WHEREAS sub section (2) of section 5 of the said Act provides for determination of the wards in which seats shall be reserved for Scheduled Castes and for Women.

AND WHEREAS powers have been delegated relating to Reservation of Wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi as prescribed in Section 3 and 5 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 to the State Election Commissioner of N.C.T. of Delhi vide Notification No.F.13 (20)/UD/MB/2012/1103 dated 24.01.2012 and F. No. 14011/04/2022-Delhi-II dated 17.10.22.

NOWTHEREFORE, I, Dr. Vijay Dev, State Election Commissioner for N.C.T. Delhi, do hereby categorize 250 wards for specified categories of persons viz. Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Castes Women, Women and for General category as under: -

NOW, THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers conferred upon the Election Commission under the proviso to Section 7E of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended from time to time read with Rule 27 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Preparation of Electoral Rolls) Rules, 1975, I, Dr. Vijay Dev, State Election Commissioner of the National Capital Territory of Delhi, hereby direct that the electoral rolls of such Assembly Constituencies, for the time being in force and as these relate to the above-mentioned 250 wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, shall be the electoral rolls for the said Municipal Wards, for the purpose of the ensuing general election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.

No.F.4(1)/OSDI/Legal/SEC/2022/7492 WHEREAS the superintendence, direction and control of elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi are vested in the State Election Commissioner of NCT of Delhi vide Section 7 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended till date.

AND WHAREAS it is necessary to provide for the choice and allotment of symbols to the contesting candidates sponsored by political parties (National and State) and to the independent candidates for election to the Municipal Corporation of National Capital Territory of Delhi.

Now, therefore in exercise of the powers conferred under Section 7 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act 1957, (hereinafter referred to as the 'ACT') read with Rule 15 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012 (hereinafter referred to as 'Rules') and all other provisions enabling it in this behalf and in supercession of all earlier Notifications on the subject, the State Election Commissioner of the National Capital Territory of Delhi hereby makes the following order:-

1. Short Title, Application and Commencement

- a) This order will be called the "Municipal Corporation of Delhi Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order, 2022". It extends to the whole areas of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi and applies in relation to elections to the wards of the said Municipal Corporation of Delhi to be held hereafter.
- b) It shall come into force on the date of its publication in the Gazette of NCT of Delhi.

2. Definitions, Interpretation

- a) In this order, unless the context otherwise requires, the words 'the Commission' means the State Election Commission of the National Capital Territory of Delhi.
- b) "The Municipal Corporation" means the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.
- c) The 'ward' means a Ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.
- d) "'National Party' means a party registered and recognized by the Election Commission of India as such under section 29A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 read with provision of "The Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order, 1968.", to which a reserved symbol has been allotted for election to Lok Sabha/ Assembly Constituency in the NCT of Delhi by the Election Commission of India.
- e) Delhi State Party means a State Party registered and recognized by the Election Commission of India under section 29A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 read with provisions of "The Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order, 1968" to which a reserved symbol is allotted for election to Lok Sabha/Assembly Constituency in the NCT of Delhi.
- f) Other 'State Party' means a party registered and recognized by the Election Commission of India in a State or States (Other than N.C.T. of Delhi) by the Election Commission of India as such under section 29A of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 read with provision of "The Election Symbols (Reservation and Allotment) Order, 1968." to which a reserved symbol is allotted for election to Lok Sabha/Assembly Constituency in that State or States.

- g) 'Act' means The Delhi Municipal Corporation Act, 1957 as amended till date.
- h) 'Rules means Delhi Municipal Corporation (Election of Councillors) Rules, 2012;

3. Recognition of National and State parties

- a) The National Parties recognized as such for the time being by the Election Commission of India in respect of election to Lok Sabha and State' Legislative Assemblies in India, and as per Symbol Orders of Election Commission of India vide Notification No. 56/2021/PPS-I11 dated the 23.09.2021 as amended from time to time thereafter by the Election Commission of India, are hereby recognized as such by this Commission for purposes of elections to the above said Municipal Corporation of the National Capital Territory of Delhi to be held hereafter under the provisions of Rule 15 of the aforesaid Rules.
- b) The Commission hereby also adopts for the National Parties and Sate Parties those very symbols which are reserved for these parties by the Election Commission of India and not any other symbol.
- c) The facsimiles of the symbols reserved for the National Parties and State Parties (in size and shape) as prescribed for elections to Lok Sabha and State Assemblies by the Election Commission of India as well as those prescribed for other candidates (independents) in the list of Free Election Symbols are adopted and prescribed as such by this Commission for purposes of the elections to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, to be held hereafter. The names of such National Parties and State Parties and symbols prescribed for them are mentioned in Table-I & Table II of Schedule-I annexed.
- d) "Aam Aadmi Party" is recognized for N.C.T. of Delhi by the Election Commission of India as 'Delhi State Party' and Symbol allotted to this party is "Broom" which is also adopted by this Commission under rule 15 of the said "Rules" for purpose of aforesaid elections
- e) A list of 'free symbols' to be chosen by other candidates (independents) etc. as prescribed by Election commission of India is contained in Table-III in the Schedule-I and these are also adopted by this Commission for purpose of aforesaid election under Rule 15 of the said "Rules"

4. Choice of Symbol by candidates of National and State Parties and allotment thereof

- a) For every contested election of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, a symbol shall be allotted to each contesting candidate in accordance with the provisions of the said Rules, this Order and the instructions issued by the Commission from time to time in this regard.
- b) A candidate set up by a National Party and Delhi State Party at an election to a ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi shall choose, and shall be allotted, ONLY the symbol reserved for that party by Election Commission of India and no other symbol.
- c) If a candidate set up by a State Party other than Delhi State Party (N.C.T. of Delhi) contests election to a ward of a Municipal Corporation of Delhi which party is not recognized in the National Capital Territory of Delhi by Election Commission of India, intends to choose or chooses a symbol reserved for it in the State or States in which it is recognized as 'State Party' (see schedule-I table-II) then such candidate shall be allotted that symbol to the exclusion of any other candidate and no other symbol on fulfillment of each of the following conditions, namely:
 - that an application is made to the Commission by the State Party for exclusive allotment of that symbol to the candidate set up by it at an election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi not later than the third day after publication in the official gazette of the Notification calling the election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi;
 - ii) that the said candidate has made a declaration in his nomination paper that he has been set up by that party at the election to a ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi and that the party has also fulfilled the requirements of clauses (b),(c),(d), & (e) of paragraph 5 of this Order;

- iii) that, in the opinion of the Commission, there is no reasonable ground for refusing the application for such allotment.
- iv) In case more than one State Parties having the same 'reserve' symbol as per Election Commission of India's order, choose the 'reserve' symbol it shall be allotted to a candidate of a State Party by draw of lot and in no other manner. All or any other State Party whose candidate does not get the 'reserve' symbol as explained above shall be allotted a 'free symbol' of his choice by the Returning Officer in preference to the independent candidates.
- v) Candidates sponsored by recognized National Parties & Delhi State Party will have to file nomination paper with one proposer and their choice of symbol to be indicated in the nomination paper(s) shall be restricted to the Symbol reserved for it by the Election Commission of India.
- vi) Candidates sponsored by such State Parties (other than Delhi State Party) will have to file nomination papers with ten proposers and their choice of symbol to be indicated in the nomination paper(s) shall be restricted to the symbol reserved for it in the State or States in which it is so recognized by the Election Commission of India.
- d) The candidates belonging to unrecognized parties registered by Election Commission of India shall be treated as independent candidates for all purposes including number of proposers required i.e. 10 proposers of the ward to which the nomination is filed and for allotment of symbols. They shall not be given any preference over other independent candidates in allotment of free symbols or allotment of only one free symbol to all its candidates in any ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.
- e) i) Any candidate at an election to a ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi other than a candidate set up by a National Party, Delhi State Party or State party (other than "Delhi State Party") i.e. Independent Candidates etc. shall choose and shall be allotted in accordance with the provisions hereafter set out in this paragraph, one of the symbols specified as 'free symbols' as per this Order.
 - ii) A different symbol to each contesting candidate will be allotted in conformity as far as practicable, with his choice as per three preferences mentioned in his/her nomination paper.
 - iii) If more contesting candidates than one have indicated their preference for same symbol, the Returning Officer shall decide by lot to which of such candidates the symbol will be allotted.
 - iv) Other contesting candidates not covered in (ii) or (iii) above, can be allotted a symbol out of list of left out symbols as per their choice as far as practicable.

If a candidate still insists to have a symbol out of his three preferences only, as given by him in his first nomination paper, allotted and he refuses to give his choice for any other symbol left out in that ward, the Returning Officer shall allot him a 'free symbol' out of the remaining symbols and his decision in this context shall be final unless action of the Returning Officer is contrary to the foregoing direction.

5. Authorization by National and State Parties for allotment of Symbols

- a) For the purpose of this Order, a candidate shall be deemed to have been set up by a recognized political party if and only if the candidate has made a declaration to that effect in the nomination paper filed by him/her.
- b) The candidate or substitute candidate has chosen only the 'reserved' symbol of his party in his/ her nomination paper filed and no 'other symbol'.
- c) A notice in Form 'B' of setting up the candidate has been delivered not later than 3.00
 P.M. on the last day of filing nomination, in writing, to the Returning Officer of the ward to which the candidate is contesting and State Election Commission of NCT Delhi by the party concerned.
- d) The above said notice is signed by a person authorized in Form 'A' by the President or the Secretary of the party, in ink. Facsimile signatures shall not be accepted. Similarly fax, Photostat, cyclostyled copy of such forms i.e. (form A & B) are also acceptable if the same is signed by the authorized person of the National/State Political Party in ink/ball pen.

- e) The name and specimen signature of such authorized person in Form A are communicated to the Returning Officer concerned and the State Election Commission of the NCT Delhi not later than 3.00 P.M. on the last date fixed for filing nominations.
- f) Any subsequent authorization by a National or State Party cancelling or substituting the earlier authorization in Form 'B' shall be sent to the Returning Officer concerned and the State Election Commission of NCT of Delhi also so as to be received by the Commission and the concerned Returning Officer not later than 3.00 P.M. on the last date for making nomination. Such subsequent authorization in Form 'B' is to be signed by the authorized Office bearer whose name has been duly intimated in Form 'A' and is to be unambiguous and clearly showing that it either cancels or substitutes the earlier authorization, as the case may be.
- g) If more than one notice in Form 'B' are received from a National or State Party by the Returning Officer/Commission in respect of two or more candidates in a ward from the same political party and that political party fails to indicate in such notices in Form 'B' that one of these notices is cancelled or supersedes all other previous notices, the Returning Officer shall accept the notice in Form 'B' in respect of that candidate whose Nomination Paper was first delivered to him, and the remaining candidates in respect of whom also notices in Form 'B' have been received by him, shall not be treated as candidates set up by such political party and their nomination(s) shall also be rejected
- h) Form 'A' and 'B', as applicable, are prescribed as in Schedule II with this order.

6. Power of Commission to issue instructions and directions:

The Commission may issue instructions and directions -

- a) for clarification of any of the provisions of this order.
- b) for the removal of any difficulty or doubt which may arise in relation to the implementation of any such provisions, and
- c) in relation to any matter with respect to the reservation and allotment of symbols and recognition of political parties, for which this order makes no provision or makes insufficient provision, and provision is, in the opinion of the Commission, necessary for the smooth and orderly conduct of elections.

MODEL CODE OF CONDUCT Consolidated Instructions STATE ELECTION COMMISSION N.C.T. OF DELHI

INSTRUCTIONS OF THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSION, NCT OF DELHI IN REGARD TO ENSUING GENERAL ELECTION TO 250 WARDS OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF DELHI, ISSUED UNDER THE POWERS CONFERRED UPON THE STATE ELECTION COMMISSIONER OF NCT OF DLEHI, UNDER ARTICLE 243-K & 243-ZA OF THE CONSTITUTION OF INDIA READ WITH SECTION-7 OF DMC ACT 1957 AS AMENDED BY DMC (AMENDMENT) ACTS TILL DATE.

I. Subject: Prevention of misuse of vehicles during elections.

The Commission has, in the past, issued various instructions from time to time regarding applicability of Model Code of Conduct on prevention of misuse of vehicles during elections. For convenience of all concerned, these instructions have now been consolidated for observance during the period when the Model Code of Conduct is in force. These instructions regarding restriction on misuse of vehicles during elections have been issued under the Constitution and the DMC Act 1957 as amended and all other powers enabling the Commission in this behalf.

During Polls:

- i) Corrupt practices are listed in Section 22 of the DMC Act, 1957 (As amended) and include Bribery, appeal to or use of religious Symbols, also statements of false facts, using & hiring vehicles not permitted by instructions, consumption of liquor in meetings etc.
- ii) For an election to a ward of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi on the date of poll in that ward each contesting candidate is entitled to:
 - a) one vehicle for his own use;
 - b) one vehicle for use of his election agent.
 - c) in addition, one vehicle for use of party workers.
- iii) The permits for the vehicles indicated above will be issued by the Returning Officer/concerned officer. The candidates are required to register their vehicles with the Returning Officer concerned and display the permits issued by the Returning Officer on the wind screen of the vehicles. No other vehicle shall be allowed to be used by the leaders of the political parties including Ministers, workers, agents and sympathizers of any candidate. No exception shall be made, irrespective of the status of the candidate.
- iv) It is clarified that, henceforth, the candidate or his agent or party workers or workers will be allowed to use only four/three/two wheeler vehicles i.e. cars (of all types) taxies, auto rickshaws, rickshaws and two wheelers. In these four wheel vehicles not more than 5 persons including driver will be allowed to move on the day of poll. It is further clarified that on the day of poll no other person will be allowed to use the vehicle allotted for candidates or his election agent's use.
- v) These instructions on plying of vehicles will be applicable on all two wheelers like motor cycles and scooters (except bicycles) also and shall be made applicable for a period of 24 hours before the time fixed for closure of poll and till the completion of poll. These restrictions would not, however, apply

to any Govt. servant on duty or in case where such vehicle is being used to transport a patient or old/ infirm person.

- vi) Penal action, under Chapter IXA of the Indian Panel Code shall be taken against any one offending the above directions, in addition to action under the Motor Vehicles Act. All vehicles being used in violation of these directions shall be confiscated.
- vii) There is, however, no intention on the part of the Commission to put a complete ban on all vehicular traffic on the polling day and thereby create difficulties or cause harassment to the public. For genuine bona fide use for purposes other than election, the following types of vehicles shall also be allowed to be plied on the day of poll and there will be no exception:
 - a) Private vehicles being used by the owners for their private use, not connected with election;
 - b) Private vehicles being used by owners either for themselves or for members or their own family for going to the polling booth to exercise their franchise, but not going anywhere within a radius of 200 meters of a polling station;
 - c) Vehicles used for essential services namely hospital vans, ambulance, milk vans, water tankers, electricity emergency duty vans, police on duty, officers on election duty;
 - d) Public transport carriages like buses plying between, fixed terminal and on fixed routes;
 - e) Taxis, three wheeler scooters, rickshaws etc. for going to airports, railway stations, interstate bus stands, hospitals for journeys which cannot be avoided;
 - f) Private vehicles used by sick or disabled persons for their own use.

During Filing of Nominations.

viii) The maximum number of vehicles that will be allowed to come within the periphery of 100 meters or Returning Officers/Assistant Returning Officers shall be three.

During Period of Electioneering

- ix) It has been experienced that during the period of electioneering private vehicles are used by the candidates, their agents and party leaders and supporters for carting the supporters of a candidate within the ward and on many occasions anti-social elements with muscle power are openly paraded to instill a sense of fear in the minds of the electorate, so that they either vote in favour of particular party/candidate or abstain from voting altogether. These vehicles are also used sometimes to smuggle illicit arms and ammunition with a view to creating disturbances during election. In order to curb such undesirable/illegal activities, the Commission further directs that the District Administration and Police shall keep a close watch on the vehicles used by persons accompanying the contesting candidate and their party's leaders for any possible mischief, including criminal activities like carrying of illegal arms and weapons. If any of these vehicles, either of a party or a private owner, is found to be involved in any such actor for carting anti-social elements with a view to intimidating or creating terror in the mind of the electorate, it shall be the duty of the local administration/Police to impound such vehicles and not to release them till the process of election is completed. In addition, criminal action against the owner, the occupant(s) and the candidate/political party which is involved in such illegal activities shall also be taken as per law.
- x) So as to ensure free, fair and peaceful elections, the Police/Traffic Police shall launch such drive for checking the vehicles immediately upon the announcement of the General election and shall continue the drive till the completion of the process of election. Cars/vehicles being used for electioneering purposes shall, under no circumstances, be allowed to move in convoys of more than three vehicles from the date of notification till the completion of election process in any ward. All bigger convoys shall be broken up, even if they are carrying any Minister of Central or State Govt. This shall, however, be subject to any security instructions issued in respect of any such individual. In other words the convoy shall not in any case exceed three vehicles of any person plus the security vehicles allowed in view of the security gradation of that particular person. Such broken up convoys must have a distance of at least 200 meters between them.

- xi) If any person moves in a convoy of vehicles exceeding the limits prescribed above, inspite of the convoy having been broken, it shall be the duty of the local Police/Administration to ensure that such vehicles are not allowed to be used by flouting the Commission's directions till the process of election is completed.
- xii) From the date of notification of the election till the completion of election process in any ward, the district administration and Police/Traffic Police shall keep a close watch on vehicles used by contesting candidates, persons accompanying the contesting candidates and other party leaders and ensure that the Commission's instructions are being followed strictly.
- xiii) The contesting candidates be asked to get the details of all the vehicles that they are using in the election campaign lodged with the Returning Officer concerned before the campaigning commences. Any further deployment of any additional vehicle can take places only after notice to this effect is given by the candidate or his agent well before the actual deployment of the vehicle.
- xiv) The details so obtained should be conveyed by District Election Officer/Returning officer to the Election Expenditure Observers. The vehicles employed for election campaign as per intimation given by the candidates or their election agents to the district administration should not be requisitioned by the administration. Any vehicle that has not been registered for campaigning with the district administration if found being used for campaigning, shall be deemed to be unauthorized campaigning for the candidate and may attract penal provisions of chapter IX A of the Indian Penal Code and shall therefore by immediately taken out of the campaigning exercise.
- xv) A cycle rickshaw is also a vehicle as defined in Section 160 of Representation of People Act, 1951, which may be used for election campaign. If it is being used, then a candidate has to account for its expenditure in his account of election expenses. To ensure this, the candidate should give details of such rickshaws being used for his election campaign and, if the rickshaw does not have any municipal registration/permit for its identification, the rickshaw driver/Puller may be given a permit in his personal name by the Returning Officer which the rickshaw driver should carry on his person while using that rickshaw for campaign purpose. However, rickshaws being used for normal purposes of carrying passengers in ordinary course etc. may be exempted, if they are displaying only one poster showing the name or party symbol of a candidate, presuming they are doing so on their own free will.
- xvi) It is clarified that Ministers and Public Officials, who are using official vehicles, may use their official vehicles from their residences to their offices for official work. No Public official can combine official work with electioneering or any other political activity to justify use of official vehicle for political purposes till the Model Code of Conduct is in force.

II. Subject: Use of Loudspeakers for election campaigns - Consolidated instructions

- 1. All political parties, candidates and their workers, supporters and sympathizers are using loudspeakers for their electioneering campaigns. These loudspeakers are not only used from fixed rostrums but are also used mounted/fitted on vehicles like trucks, tempos, cars taxis, vans, three wheeler scooters, cycle rickshaws, etc. These vehicles move on all roads, streets and lanes and also around villages, basties, Mohallas, colonies and localities with the loudspeakers broadcasting at very great volume. This results in serious 'noise pollution' and causes great disturbance to the peace and tranquility of the general public. The student community, in particular, gets seriously disturbed as their studies are badly hampered because the loudspeakers start blaring from vey early hours in the morning and continue to do so throughout the day and till extremely late hours in the night. The aged, the infirm and the sick whether in institutions, hospitals, etc. or at home are also put to severe discomfort.
- 2. The Commission is aware that the use of loudspeakers cannot be stopped altogether during the election period as the loudspeakers are one of the means of election propaganda and imparting information to public. But at the same time, indiscriminate and unfettered use of loudspeaker at odd places at very high volumes which have the effect of disturbing peace and tranquility and causing annoyance to the general public, the sick, and the student community in particular cannot be permitted. Some reasonable restrictions are essential.

- 3. After considering all aspects of the matter, the Commission, in exercise of its powers DIRECTS that the use of loudspeakers shall be strictly regulated as follows:-
 - The use of loudspeakers, whether fitted on vehicles of any kind whatsoever, or in static position used for public meetings for electioneering purposes, during the entire election period starting from the date of announcement of election and ending with the date of declaration of results shall be permitted only between 6.00 AM to 10.00 PM. for which permission of police authority is essentially required

"A public address system or loudspeaker or any sound amplifier, whether fitted on vehicles of any kind whatsoever, or in static position, used for public meeting for electioneering purposes, shall not be used at night between 10.00 p.m. and 6.00 a.m."

- ii) All loudspeakers whether used for general propaganda or for public meetings or procession, and whether used on moving vehicles or otherwise, shall be used during the restricted hours only mentioned above and never beyond or before.
- iii) All loudspeakers being used beyond or before the hours as prescribed above, shall be confiscated along with all apparatus connected with the use of these loudspeakers.
- iv) All political parties, candidates and any other persons using any loudspeakers on moving vehicles including but not restricted to trucks, tempos, cars, taxis, vans, three wheeler scooters, cycle rickshaws, etc. shall intimate the registration identification number of those vehicles to the Police authorities granting permission to use the loudspeakers and such registration identification numbers of the vehicles shall be indicated on the permits granted by the authorities concerned.
- v) Any vehicle on which a loudspeaker is used without the said written permit shall be confiscated forthwith along with the loudspeakers and all the apparatus used along with it.
- vi) All political parties, candidates and even other persons using loudspeakers either on a moving vehicle or at a fixed place shall intimate, the Police authorities, in writing, the full details of the permits obtained by them before using any of those loudspeakers.
- vii) It shall be the responsibility of the Police authorities granting permits for use of loudspeakers and the Police authorities to strictly enforce that no loudspeaker is used by anyone in violation of any of the above directions,
- 4. No loudspeakers fitted on vehicles of any kind or in any other manner whatsoever shall be permitted to be used during 48 hours earlier to the hours fixed for the end of poll in areas of the ward where election is being held. Use of loudspeakers is generally regarded as source of public nuisance and can often give rise to tension in a politically surcharged atmosphere. The Police authorities should, therefore, consider any application for permission to use loudspeaker after the aforesaid restricted hours on merit of each application and keeping in view the need to maintain proper law and order till the completion of election.
- 5. The above directions of the Commission, which will check noise pollution and disturbance of public peace and tranquility must be scrupulously implemented and strictly enforced by the Police authorities concerned. Any violation thereof will be viewed by the Commission with grave concern and will invite severe disciplinary action against the defaulting officers.

III. Subject: Prohibition on the sale of liquor.

- 1. Section 29 C of the DMC Act 1957 as amended provides that no spirituous, fermented or intoxicating liquors or other substances of a like nature shall be sold, given or distributed at a hotel, eating house, tavern, shop or any other place public or private, within a polling area during the period of forty eight hours ending with the hour fixed for the conclusion of poll for any election in that polling area.
- 2. In view of the statutory provisions as above, 'dry days' shall be declared and notified under the relevant state laws as is appropriate during 48 hours, ending with the hour fixed for conclusion of poll with respect to each polling day for any election in that polling area.
- 3. The Commission further directs that the day(s) on which the counting of votes is to be taken up shall be declared 'dry day(s)' under the aforesaid Act, till the counting of voters for a ward is completed & result declared.

- 4. The storage of liquor by individuals shall be curtailed during the above period and the restriction provided in the excise-law on the storage of liquor in unlicensed premises shall be vigorously enforced.
- 5. Steps shall also be taken to prohibit sale of liquor in adjoining areas of Delhi including areas covered under NDMC & Delhi Cantt Board so that there shall not be chances of clandestine movement of liquor from those areas which have no restriction.
- 6. The Commission directs that the Government of NCT of Delhi shall strictly implement the above measures. They are required to issue detailed and comprehensive instructions to all concerned authorities to take appropriate, legally effective measures to implement the above prohibitions and assist the election authorities in the peaceful and smooth conduct of free and fair poll.

IV. Subject: - General Election to 250 wards of The Municipal Corporation of Delhi, 2022-Restrictions on the printing of pamphlets, posters etc.

Section 22 of the DMC Act, 1957 as amended prescribes restriction on printing and publication of election pamphlets, poster etc. and declares it a corrupt practice.

The following instructions on the subject are issued for strict compliance by all concerned.

- i) No person shall print or publish, or cause to be printed or published, any election pamphlet or poster which does not bear on its face names and addresses of the printer and publisher thereof
- ii) No person shall print or cause to be printed any election pamphlet or poster
 - a) unless a declaration as to be identity of the publisher thereof, signed by him and attested by two persons to whom he is personally known, is delivered by him to the printer in duplicate; and
 - b) unless, within a reasonable time after the printing of the document, one copy of the declaration is sent by the printer, together with one copy of the document printed to the concern Police authorities.
- iii) For the purposes of these instructions
 - a) any, process for multiplying copies of a document, other than copying it by hand, shall be deemed to be printing and the expression "printer" shall be construed accordingly; and
 - b) "election pamphlet or poster" means any printed pamphlet, hand bill or other document distributed for the purpose of promoting or prejudicing the election of a candidate or group of candidates or any placard or poster having reference to an election, but does not include any hand bill, placard or poster merely announcing the date, time, place and other particulars of an election meeting or routine instructions to election agents or workers.
- 2. It has been observed that surrogate advertisements appear in print media, especially newspapers, for and against particular political parties and candidates during election period. In many cases such advertisements are for the prospects of election of particular candidates. As per rule 105 of the DMC Rules, 2012, expenditure involved in such advertisements in connection with the election of any candidate has to be added to the account of election expenses of the candidate, required to be maintained under that Rules. Further, Section 171H of I.P.C. prohibits incurring of expenditure, on inter-alia, advertisement, circular or publication, for the purpose of promoting or procuring the election of a candidate without authority from the candidate. The surrogate advertisements defeat the purposes of the aforesaid provisions of law.
- 3. In order to sub serve the requirements of the provisions of law as mentioned above, the Commission directs that in the case of any advertisements/election matter for or against any political party or candidate in print media, during the election period, the name and address of the publisher should be given alongwith the matter/advertisement.
- 4. The following points may be noted in respect of the advertisements that appear in the print media, especially newspapers, for and against particular political parties and candidates during election period:

- a) In the case of advertisements, the source of which is traceable, the following action may be taken:
 - i) if the advertisement is with the consent or knowledge of the candidate, it will be treated to have been authorized by the candidate (s) concerned and will be accounted for in the election expenses account of the candidate(s).
 - ii) If the advertisement is not with the authority from the candidate, then action may be taken for prosecution of the publisher for violation of Section 171 H of IPC-(incurring expenditure in advertisement without written authority from the candidate(s) concerned).
- b) If the identity of the publisher is not indicated in the advertisement, then the Police authorities and Election Expenditure observer may contact and get the information from the Newspaper concerned, and consider appropriate action, as above.
- 5. The provisions of Delhi Prevention of Defacement of Property Act, 2007 should strictly be enforced.

V. Subject:- Election related advertisements in newspapers and other print media-election campaign- regarding.

"Section-25 of DMC Act 1957 (as amended) Prohibition of public meetings on the day of Poll.

- 1) no person shall
 - a) convene, hold or attend, join or address any public meeting or procession in connection with an election; or
 - b) Display to the public any election matter by means of cinematograph, television or other similar apparatus.
 - c) Propagate any election matter to the public by holding, or by arranging the holding of any musical concert or any theatrical performance or any other entertainment or amusement with a view to attracting the members of the public thereto, including star campaigning in any polling area from 48 hours earlier to the close of poll, for election to a ward of Municipal Corporation of Delhi.
- 2) Any person who contravenes the provisions of sub-section (1) shall be punishable under the law.
- 3) In this section, the expression "election matter" means any matter, intended or calculated to influence or affect the result of an election."
- 4) Queries have been raised from some States whether broadcasting of election related matter over TV Channel/Cable networks and Radio could be done during the aforesaid period i.e. from 48 hours earlier to the hour fixed for close of the poll.
- 5) It is clarified that radio would be treated as 'other similar apparatus' for this purpose and hence broadcasting/propagating any election matter through TV Channel/Cable network Radio would not be permissible during the aforesaid period.
- VI. Subject: Preventive Action to ensure conduct of peaceful, free and fair poll during the forthcoming General Election to 250 wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.
 - 1. The Commission being deeply aware of the increasingly vitiative role of criminality and muscle power at elections and directing the taking of a number of measures over and above the purview of normal law and order arrangements, for augmenting the peaceful, free and fair poll. These measures include the deployment of Central Police Forces during the process of elections to assist the Local law and Order machinery in prevention of pre-poll, during the poll and post-poll violence and inspire confidence in the impartiality of election machinery among the common electorate, regulation of vehicular traffic, regulation and ban on the sale of liquor in close proximity with the dates of poll and counting, seizure of illicit and licensed arms, etc.
- 2. These extra measures taken by the Commission cannot absolve the normal law and order outfit from taking such preparatory steps as are necessary for generation of an atmosphere conducive to the conduct of peaceful free and fair poll during the run up period to the elections. It is indispensable to tighten the local law and order outfit and enforce with adequate strictness the day-to-day criminal administration with a view to mitigating the requirement of the aforesaid extra measures.

- 3. The Commission desires that the Govt. of NCT Delhi, shall undertake the following prophylactic measures immediately and report regularly to the Commission the progress and effect of these measures in the context of possibilities of holding peaceful, free and fair elections:
 - 3.1 A special drive should be launched to compile a list of such persons as are reported to have indulged in electoral offences like booth capturing, intimidation, impersonation in each police station of each and every M.C. ward during the past at least two elections and a list thus compiled of each ward made available to the concerned District Election Officer and the Returning Officer of each M.C. ward to be forwarded to the Commission if and when asked for.
 - 3.2 A special drive should be launched to update the lists of history sheeters declared absconders, fugitive criminals in each police stations falling in each and every ward and record of such updated lists handed over to the Returning Officers concerned, ward wise, a view to be kept ready for dispatch to the Commission, if and when asked for.
 - 3.3 A special drive should be launched to effect the service of all pending warrants and challans in each police station of each and every ward and fortnightly updated ward- wise information of unserved warrants be made available to the concerned Returning Officer and Returning Officer to forward to the Commission if and when asked for.
 - 3.4 A special drive should be launched to unearth illicit arms and ammunition in each police station of each and every ward and information of seizures should be made available fortnightly to the concerned Returning Officer to be forwarded to the Commission if and when asked for.
 - 3.5 A special drive should be launched to unearth illicit liquor making factories and information about seizures made available to the concerned Returning Officer fortnightly to be forwarded to the Commission if and when asked for.

Subject: Clarification-regarding Model Code of Conduct enforced during the General Elections to 250 wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi 2022.

State Election Commission, NCT of Delhi, had issued the Model Code of Conduct for the guidance of political parties and candidates. This was followed by the consolidated instructions of Model Code of Conduct. After the withdrawal of the candidatures it has become necessary to issue further consolidated instructions during the campaign period to ensure that there is free and fair poll.

- As per The Delhi Prevention of Defacement of Property Act, 2007, all structures, walls, electric poles, trees, fences are treated as property and defacement by way of putting up banners, hoardings, writing by ink, chalk, paint or any other material is not permitted. However, taking into consideration the need for allowing the candidates to campaign, it has been decided that "party flags" can be put up at the following locations:
 - a) Only one flag can be installed at the residence of the candidate.
 - b) Party Office of the candidate including temporary office in the Ward (The size of the flag should not be more than 3 ft x 2 ft). Five temporary offices can be established by each candidate in a Ward.
 - c) Party flag can also be put up on the three vehicles which are permitted for campaigning by the candidate. However, flag on the car should only be $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft x 1ft.
- 2. It is clarified that no hoardings, banners are allowed anywhere except at places authorized by the Municipal Corporation for which separate permission from the M.C. has to be taken. All other posters will be removed and cases registered under The Delhi Prevention of Defacement of Property Act, 2007.
- 3. Distribution of small pamphlets in house to house campaign can be permitted provided they are not distributed in public places so that proper cleanliness and hygiene is maintained.
- 4. Some sitting councilors and public persons have put up sign boards in Wards in the past indicating their names & name of work done. There have been complaints that this would intervene with the free and fair poll. It is therefore, ordered that the Municipal Corporation and Police would remove all

these sign boards wherever they are found, wherever any name of the councilors and/or other public men are found on the sign board.

5. Political parties are permitted to use Vans/LMV for election campaign. These will be limited to area of the Municipal Corporation where election is going to be held fitted with equipment like TV, DVD, projector, speakers, photographs of leaders & election symbol and one party flag (size 3 ft x 2 ft) & election symbol is allowed subject to prior approval of Police and Transport Department & compliance of conditions like timing & areas as imposed by them. If party candidates' names, photos etc. are carried of these Vans/LMV, the proportionate cost of use of vehicles will be reflected in the expenditure incurred by the candidate in a particular Ward. The application for permission should be made to DCP (Election Cell), Police Headquarters, L.P. Estate, New Delhi 110002 and to Commissioner (Transport) or any designated officer of Transport Department, Govt. of NCT of Delhi, 5/9, Under Hill Road, Delhi- 110054.

Subject: Further Clarifications regarding Model Code of Conduct in the General Election to 250 Wards of the Municipal Corporation of Delhi.

The State Election Commission, N.C.T. of Delhi had issued the Model Code of Conduct for the guidance of political parties and candidates, followed by the Consolidated Instructions thereon, related to various aspects pertaining to the campaigning period. After discussion with the Delhi Police, the following further instructions are issued in respect of observance of campaigning procedure during the ensuing campaign:-

- 1. While taking out procession/padyatra during the campaigning, it has been decided that a candidate and his workers can hold flags upto maximum five (5) in numbers for one procession. The size of-the flag will be 3 ft by 2 ft.
- 2. Use of the drums and other musical instruments is not allowed during the processions/padyatras.
- 3. The banners would normally be party banners in the case of a recognized national party or a state party. In the case of unrecognized but registered party, the party could use the symbol of its party or the symbol of the candidate allotted by the Returning Officer.
- 4. It is clarified that rickshaw is also treated as a vehicle in earlier instruction regarding restricting processions to the three vehicles per candidate. The instruction regarding three vehicles to be allowed per candidate would also be applicable to a rickshaw. Hence no separate flags on rickshaws are permitted.

The above instructions are issued for strict compliance of all concerned.

DIRECTION

Subject: General Election to 250 wards of The Municipal Corporation of Delhi -2022- Preventive measures near Polling Booth on poll days-Setting up of Election Booths by Candidates/Political Parties.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon me under Section 7 of the Delhi Municipal Corporation Act 1957 as amended till date, I, Dr. Vijay Dev, State Election Commissioner of NCT of Delhi hereby direct as under:-

- 1. No candidate booth shall be set up within a distance of 100 yards from the Polling Stations. Even where more than one polling station has been set up in the same Building location or premises, there shall be only one booth of a candidate for such group of Polling Stations beyond a distance of 100 yards from such premises.
- 2. Only one table and two chairs shall be provided at each such booth with an umbrella or a piece of tarpaulin or cloth to protect the two occupants of those chairs at the booth from weather conditions. Such booth shall not been closed by Kanats or tentage, etc.
- 3. Each candidate wishing to set up such booths shall intimate, in writing, in advance, to the Returning Officer, the names and Sl. Nos. of the Polling Station where such booths are proposed to be set up by him/her. He/she shall also obtain the written permission of the concerned Govt., authorities or local authorities like Municipal Corporation, under the relevant local laws before setting up of such booths.

Such a written permission must be available with the persons manning the booth for production before the police/election authorities concerned on demand.

- 4. Such booths shall be used only for the sole purpose of issuing unofficial identity slips to electors. These unofficial identity slips shall be printed strictly on plain white paper only having particular of voters, place of polling without the name or Symbol of the candidate or the name of the political party.
- Only one banner to display the name of the candidate, his party and the election symbol allotted to him shall be allowed at each such booth, provided that such banner shall not be more than 3 feet X 4.5 feet in length and breadth. Any banner set up in violation of this restriction will be removed by authorities maintaining the law and order.
- 6. No crowds shall be allowed to collect at such booths in any circumstances, nor shall any person who has already cast his vote at the polling station be allowed to come to the booth. This would be evident from the indelible ink mark on his left forefinger or any other finger as specifically prescribed for that election for the ward in which the polling station is located.
- 7. The persons manning the booths shall not cause any obstruction whatsoever in the way of electors proceeding to the polling stations or prevent them from going to the booths of other candidates or create any other sort of hurdles whatsoever in the right of voters to exercise their franchise according to their own free will. More specifically, no elector shall be influenced in any way whatsoever to either come and collect the unofficial identify slip for the particular booth or if he comes to such booth of his own accord to vote in favour of or against any party/ candidate contesting the election.
- 8. The Commission hereby warns all concerned that any violation of the above directions will be viewed by the Commission with the utmost gravity and most stringent action possible under the law, including but not restricted to the removal of such booths forthwith will be taken against the candidates and / or their agents / workers responsible for any such violations.
- 9. If any officer is found to have failed to take prompt and expeditious action to ensure the strict compliance of the abovementioned directions, he will render himself liable to strict disciplinary action apart from any penal action as may be called for against him for failure to discharge the official duty.
- 10. In order to maintain peace and calm in the polling stations during polling period on the date of poll and to maintain law and order, the Commission hereby directs that use of cell phones shall not be permitted and people should not use them inside the polling premises and these instruments should be kept in silent mode inside the polling station. If there is any violation of this, the Presiding Officer of the polling station can seize the instrument till the completion of poll.
- 11. No cellular phones, cordless phones, wireless sets etc. in any case, be allowed inside counting halls during the Counting of votes for 250 wards of the Municipal Corporation. These restrictions, however, will not apply to the officers-in-charge of law and order and security personnel put on duty as well as observer appointed by the State Election Commission and the officers-in-charge of counting center.
- 12. The polling agents may be allowed to carry their copy of electoral rolls inside the polling station and make tick marks whenever voters cast their vote, However, it is clarified that under no circumstances, the polling agents can be allowed to carry the electoral roll copy available with him outside the polling station during the course of the polling and till the polling is closed either by himself or through the relieving agent. It is also clarified that, under no circumstances, the agents can be allowed to note down or to send slips outside indicating the Serial Numbers of the voters, who have voted or not voted.
- 13. It has been brought to the notice of the Commission that some anti-social and Goonda elements may be used by political parties/candidates to man the booth office (beyond 100 yards having, one table and two chairs). Such elements presence in the vicinity of the polling station is intimidating and vitiating the atmosphere for a free and fair poll. Having considered this, the Commission directs as under:
 - i) The persons who are nominated by the political parties/candidates to man such booths shall be a voter in the same polling station area. He shall also have an EPIC and whenever any Sector

Officer/Sector Police Officer/Observer/RO/ARO asks the person to disclose his identity, he will show the EPIC.

- ii) The political parties/candidates shall take care to ensure that they do not put any person with criminal antecedents on the job to man such booths. In case these instructions are not followed by any political party/candidate, immediate action shall be taken by the Returning Officer/ Police authorities. Besides, the local police shall keep a close watch over the movement of such persons so that they do not create any disturbance in the polling area or in the vicinity.
- 14. The candidates of various parties including independent candidates set up and operate temporary office for the purpose of local campaign. The Commission, after taking into consideration all relevant factors, prescribes the following guidelines to be followed in this regard:
 - i) No such office will be opened by way of any encroachment either on public or private property.
 - ii) No such offices will be opened in any religious places or campus of such religious places.
 - iii) No such offices will be opened contiguous to any educational institution /hospital.
 - iv) No such offices will be opened within 100 yards of an existing polling station.
 - v) Such offices can display only one party flag and banner with party symbols/photographs.
 - vi) The size of the banner used in such offices should not exceed '4 feet x 8 feet' subject to the further condition that if the local laws prescribe a lower size for banner/hoarding etc; then the lower size prescribed by local law shall prevail.

Subject: Ensuing General Election to the Municipal Corporation of Delhi, Directions of the Commission in regard to observances of prohibition of canvassing relating to said election.

The poll for General Election for 250 wards, cited in the above subject, is going to be held in the near future. It is directed that holding of election meetings and canvassing for votes is prohibited 48 hours earlier to the end of Poll i.e. by 05.30 PM on the hour and day fixed for the close of the poll. The State Election Commission, taking into consideration the advice and recommendation of the Delhi Police, has decided that no political party, contesting candidate, or any other persons shall convene, hold or attend any public meeting within a Ward, 48 hours earlier to the hours fixed for close of the poll. The above decision has been arrived at considering the law and order situation and to ensure free, fair and peaceful poll. All concerned are directed to strictly comply accordingly as per schedule given above.
